Cabra Area Office Report

MAIN DEVELOPMENTS

Broome Lodge

Works have now started.

Dalymount Park

Dublin City Council has published its outline plans for the re-development of Dalymount Park which will also include the provision of community facilities.

Liam Whelan Bridge

The new rails on the bridge will be up in the next two weeks. LUAS are still waiting on a reply in relation to the safety aspect of putting cladding on the bridge.

Drainage works are ongoing throughout the cutting. Works are starting on the repair works to the great western railway walls this month. Work has also commenced on the foundations for the depot building at Broombridge. LUAS are waiting on the design for the boundary walls and hope to hold a meeting with residents in the coming weeks.

LUAS officers visited St Finbarrs Boy's National School on Kilkiernan Road on Friday 4th March and had site safety talks with 5th and 6th class students as part of Engineers Ireland Week.

Shandon Boundary wall

Works are under way on the Shandon Boundary Wall Replacement Project. Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) intends to replace the existing boundary treatment with a full height cavity block wall; the new wall will replicate the height of the existing boundary.

Waterways Ireland

Following the retirement of the Area Engineer, Sean Barry, Waterways Ireland has advised that due to budgetary constraints he will not be replaced. Because of this and other non-replacements there will be a cutback in the support Waterways Ireland are able to deliver in terms of management, maintenance, event support, community liaison and development of the both Royal and Grand Canals. Until they have some level of replacement they will not be in a position to provide support to the level that was done over the last few years.

COMMUNITY & DEVELOPMENT

The Cabra 1916 Proclamation Commemoration Event.

The event will take place in Cabra Parkside Community & Sports Centre on Tuesday 15th March from 11am to 1pm. Most of the schools are organising their own celebration that morning and inviting parents to attend. Some of the pupils have put together their own proclamations for the present day and will read them as part of the celebrations. Scoil Mhuire and Gael Scoil Bharra have agreed to allow their pupils to participate in the community event from 11- 12 noon. They will then return to take part in their school celebrations.

There will be traditional music, poetry and a reading of the 2016 Proclamation, by Coláiste Mhuire, and a member of the Irish United Nations Veterans Association as Bearla agus as Gaeilge, 1916 Short Drama, Historical Talk, Traditional music of the time.

Canon Burke House

The Cabra 1916 Commemoration Committee has submitted an application for permission to hang a banner depicting the Proclamation and its signatories on the gable wall of Canon Burke Sheltered Housing Complex during the period 13th March 2016 to 30th April 2016 inclusive. The Executive Manager of the Housing & Residential Services Department, having considered this application and all supporting documentation submitted with the proposal, has given approval for the erection of the banner.

1916 Walk & Talks Programme

The next walk in the north west area will take place on Saturday 16th April. Starting at 11a.m, meeting outside St Peters Church and will take in the Phibsborough area. It will be led by Pat Liddy, and will finish outside Mountjoy Prison. The community staff have organised for local community groups to provide complimentary refreshments following the walk.

The Mount Bernard Park project will commence shortly. The community staff and the Play Officer will set up meetings with the community to discuss possibilities for improving the facilities and improving opportunities for creative play in the Park.

Rapid Build Housing

<u>Delivery of 22 Rapid Build Housing Units (Modular Housing) in Poppintree, Ballymun, Dublin 11.</u>

The delivery of 22 units of Rapid Build Housing in Poppintree is close to full completion. The 22 houses are two-storey units, with three bedrooms and will provide temporary accommodation for families who are experiencing homelessness and who are currently accommodated in commercial hotels by the local authority, on an emergency basis.

Work is ongoing with Dublin City Council's Homeless Central Placement Service (CPS) to assess and appropriately place families in the new units in Poppintree. The CPS are working with families to ensure suitability of placement, considering key elements such as vicinity to local schools and existing family supports.

Initiation of competition for further 131 Rapid Build Housing Units.

Dublin City Council initiated a competition for 131 Rapid Build Housing Units, on Wednesday 2nd March 2016.

In order to facilitate optimum market participation in the competition, Dublin City Council will look for expressions of interest with individual completion dates for specific sites. This will take into consideration the specific number of units to be built on each site.

There are four sites selected and located in the Dublin City Council administrative area, they include:

- 1. **Drimnagh** site will commence work in the beginning of April 2016
- 2. Belcamp, Malahide Road site will commence work in the beginning of July 2016
- 3. **Ballyfermot** site will commence work in the beginning of April 2016
- 4. **Finglas** site will commence work in the beginning of April 2016

The intended timelines of this competition are working towards the completion of all units by Autumn 2016.

The four Dublin local authorities are working towards the further delivery of a further 350 units approximately across the Dublin region to address the temporary accommodation needs of families in commercial hotels. Further detail in relation to this will be provided.

Housing Allocation Directive for Homeless Priority Households.

The Dublin local authorities continue to implement the ministerial directive which requires that 50% of allocations are utilised for homeless households and other vulnerable groups.

<u>Tusla</u>

A Homelessness Liaison Officer has recently been appointed with Tusla, and has the remit of co-ordinating child and family resources to dedicated supported family accommodation settings, particularly in relation to child protection. The Homelessness Liaison Officer links with the Dublin Region Homeless Executive around access for children and families to Family Resource Centres. It also provides guidance for Home School Community Liaison and School Completion Staff on helping children and families experiencing homelessness to maintain regular school attendance. School Completion Programmes have been asked to prioritise homeless children for services such as breakfast and homework clubs.

An Riasc

Tuath Housing has carried out interviews with prospective tenants for the first fourteen homes at An Riasc. Letters of offer will be sent to the successful applicants within the next two weeks. It is proposed to have the first six tenants in their homes by the second week in April and the remaining eight to follow two weeks later.

The second phase is due to be completed May/June.

Finglas South Safety Forum

The Finglas South Safety Forum meeting took place on 22nd February in St. Helena's Family Resource Centre. Local issues were discussed including the green area at Scribblestown and a request for a pedestrian crossing at the entrance to Tolka Valley Park.

Kippure Park

There are ongoing complaints about a gang of youths gathering in the Kippure Park area causing a nuisance to residents. A number of tenants were interviewed in December and were asked to make sure their children were not part of this gang. In recent reports some of the same names were given as still causing trouble in this area and also some new names were given. The Area Office is now in the process of writing to the tenants whose children were named as part of this gang and will interview them. A decision will then be made as to what action, if any, will be taken in each case.

Summer Projects

Dublin City Council Community and Social Development team in conjunction with Crosscare have held a number of meetings with summer projects committees with a view to organising Finglas Summer Project 2016.

These meetings will continue over the coming months to support the development of appropriate Summer Project Programmes for the Finglas area.

Positive Ageing Events 2016

The Finglas Positive Ageing Committee has met to discuss a programme of events for this year's positive ageing weeks. Activities will take place over two weeks commencing Monday 26th September 2016.

Events will include the annual senior ball, over 55's table quiz, over 55's pool tournament, afternoon tea dance and a series of talks.

Preparation meetings will continue over the coming months.

Pavee Point/Triple P

The Community and Social Development Team supported Pavee Point to deliver the Triple P Programme. Triple P gives parents simple tips to help manage the big and small problems of family life. Problems like toddler tantrums and teenage rebellion.

The programme commenced on Wednesday 9th March 2016 at 10.00a.m and will continue to run monthly until Wednesday 1st June 2016 in the Finglas West Community Hub.

International Women's Day

Holistic Day

The Community and Social Development Section supported the Fingal Centre Holistic day which took place on Tuesday 8th March at the Fingal Centre, Cardiffsbridge Road from 11a.m.-1.00p.m. The Marie Keating Foundation was present and provided information on Breast Cancer Awareness. Mindfulness and pampering also took place as part of the event.

Cumann na mBan Lecture

As part of the 1916 centenary events and to celebrate International Women's Day the Community & Social Development Section held a lecture on Cumann Na mBan and the role of women in the rising. This event took place on Thursday 10th March in the Finglas Civic Centre with over forty people in attendance.



Environmental/Resident Engagement

In conjunction with the Community and Social Development Section, Global Action Plan will be facilitating a planting workshop/information session for resident committees within the Finglas Area. The main aim of this workshop is to encourage residents groups to look towards developing their planting ideas and encourage the groups to think about sustainable planting projects. All residents groups in Finglas will be sent an invitation to attend the project. This event will take place on Wednesday 13th April 2016 at 7.00p.m in the Finglas Civic Offices. Age Friendly Cities

With reference to the proposed grant of a further licence for the rear of the premises 5 Cardiffsbridge Road, Finglas, Dublin 11.

The City Council is the owner of the property No. 5 Cardiffsbridge Road, Finglas, Dublin 11. By way of Agreement dated 25th November 2010 the rear of the premises which is more particularly delineated on Map Index No. PD2007-0236 was licensed by Dublin City Council to Finglas Childcare Limited for a period of 5 years from 8th September 2010 and subject to an abated licence fee of €250 per month.


This licence expired on 7th September 2015 and Finglas Childcare Limited has applied for a further licence.

Accordingly it is proposed to grant a further licence of the rear of No. 5 Cardiffsbridge Road, Finglas, Dublin 11 which said property is more particularly delineated on Map Index No. PD2007-0236 to Finglas Childcare Limited subject to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. The licence fee shall be the sum of €5,500 (five thousand five hundred euro) per annum.
- 2. So long as the premises shall be used solely as a childcare facility this fee shall be abated to €3,000 (three thousand euro) per annum payable quarterly in advance.
- 3. The proposed licence shall be for five years commencing on 8th September 2015.
- 4. The licence can be terminated by either party on giving the other one months notice in writing.
- 5. The licensee shall be responsible for all rates, taxes and other outgoings.
- 6. The licensee shall keep its part of the premises in good condition and repair during the term of the licence.
- 7. The licensee shall indemnify the City Council against any and all claims for compensation, which may arise from their use of the property.

- 8. On termination of the licence, the licensee shall be responsible for the removal of all their materials from the premises.
- 9. Nothing herein contained is intended to create or shall be taken as creating a relationship of Landlord and Tenant between the licensor and the licensee. For the avoidance of doubt, the licensee will sign a Deed of Renunciation.
- 10. The licence will be subject to any terms and conditions deemed appropriate by the Council's Law Agent in agreements of this type.

A. PROGRESS METRO DUBLIN DEVELOPMENT

Dublin City Council Planning SPC	Motion: that they "would like to see the City Council explore the potential for cooperation between Metro Dublin & Dublin City Council to secure the potential benefits of Metro Dublin for the City", Nov. 2015

B. SOME QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. Does Metro Dublin conflict with other transport proposals?

 $\label{eq:metric} \mbox{Metro Dublin boosts the utility/business cases for DART Underground and for Bus Rapid Transit schemes.}$

For instance, should DART Underground precede then platform to platform access will be available to/from the DART Heuston Station to Dublin City University, Dublin Institute of Technology, Dublin Airport and St James's Hospital, and to/from the DART Christchurch Station to O'Connell Street, Croke Park stadium, Whitehall, Beaumont Hospital and to Terenure and Rathfarnham.

Metro Dublin upgrades the TII (RPA) Metro North Luas to full metro, thus, boosting operation quality and reducing operation costs by at least 15% and power consumption by 10%.

2. Why are the Adamstown and the Blanchardstown lines included?

To underpin high usage of public transport Metro Dublin needs the availability of a 'critical-mass of public transport infrastructure'. This will facilitate Irish Rail to run high frequency/quality services on these lines and on the rest of the Development (all lines need to be used to their maximum).

3. Are their conflicts with the existing intercity rail services?

No. Metro Dublin track layout is such that its services are run on grade separated (bridged-over) tracks from the Irish Rail intercity trains – conflicts are thus avoided.

4. Is purchase of state land required for stations?

All land portfolios associated with the Development will be in the ownership/control of the State. Land 'way-leaves' will be limited to construction, maintenance and access to stations.

5. What is the Metro Dublin Development?

It is a world-class integrated public transport development that serves both Dublin and the country. It can be seen to hit many of the buttons for proper planning and sustainable development in Dublin. It has 59 stations. Works involve the upgrade of existing lines 28 km, new lines 17 km on surface and 45 km in tunnel.

6. How does it serve Dublin?

It efficiently extends and integrates the existing public transport services, see maps overleaf. It joins up the city and national railways.

Compared to the shelved metro plans, vast additional areas are served, patronage is significantly increased. It connects Dublin city centre with its suburbs of Adamstown, Ashbourne, Ballymun, Blanchardstown, Castleknock, Clondalkin, Croke Park, Dublin Airport, Finglas, Dublin City University, Dublin Institute of Technology, Greencastle, Harold's Cross, Howth Junction/Donaghmede, Harolds Cross, Malahide, Rathfarnham, Swords, Terenure and Whitehall and major traffic generators, such as the Dublin Institute of Technology, Dublin City University, Dublin Airport, Beaumont Hospital and the St James's/New National Children's Hospitals.

7. What are the benefits of the Metro Dublin Development?

It delivers on the long accepted social, economic and environmental case for a metro in Dublin. Major benefits include:

- Quality of life improvements and the ability to enhance Dublin as a residential and investment location;
- An affordable world-class public transport system that integrates and enhances existing public transport services.

8. Does Metro Dublin expect the involvement of Dublin Local Authorities?

Yes (just as cities authorities world-wide are part and parcel of their public transport delivery) and is now exploring the scope for partnership collaboration and/or co-operation to secure potential benefits.

9. How can the Local Authorities get involved?

They can be involved through the State Authorities (Public Private Partnership Arrangements) Act 2002. The Act provides certainty as to the powers of Irish State authorities to enter into Partnerships and gives local authorities the power to enter into joint ventures. It strikes a balance between the needs and interests of the public sector, and ultimately those of the Exchequer, and the private sector. (Source: the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.)

10. What are the advantages of Local Authorities involvement?

An extensive and affordable metro can be in operation in 2021 (as against a single metro line in 2027), which can be seen to have a profoundly positive impact on the proper planning and sustainable development of Dublin and a positive impact on the country.

11. Has the Metro Dublin Development the team and finance lined up to deliver?

Metro Dublin's capability and credibility to complete the proposed development is fully supported by its core development team, financiers and track record.

Its core development team met with the An Bord Pleanála Pre-Application Consultations Board last October. Its core development team are world leaders in terms of metro fast delivery, low outcome/final all-in cost and quality. They have delivered extensive high quality metro projects similar to the Metro Dublin Development many times. They participated as the management team of the Madrid Regional Government in all phases of implementation of its new metro infrastructure, since its initial conception to commissioning to commercial operation.

Its core team will take the Metro Dublin Development through its delivery - from the start of its development and due process to procurement to contract to commissioning. Their ability, experience and delivery record fits the Metro Dublin development needs - to do everything through EU procurement methods, to procure fast, appoint contractors, and supervise delivery and commissioning the full development – (see Slide at meeting).

The Metro Dublin financial team have the capability to provide the finance to fund the development, and the Metro Dublin track record included the bona fide development proposal which it developed with a Japanese Consortium and presented to the Taoiseach and his Cabinet Committee on Infrastructure and Public Private Partnerships. The Japanese Consortium built the Dublin Port Tunnel.

12. What is the context of the Development?

The context of the Development is that it is introduced:

- Under the Transport (Railway Infrastructure) Act 2001 and the Planning and Development (Strategic Infrastructure) Act 2006 – they facilitate 'any person' to make an application for a Railway Order;
- Under Government policy and objectives to deliver sustainable infrastructure, as promoted by the Government and the EU. They set out to attract private proposals that address the deficit of investment for sustainable urban public transport infrastructure;
- To ameliorate the situation where major infrastructure projects were developed and then shelved. This situation is widely recognised as one that provides justification for entering into direct discussions with State Authorities;
- In an open transparent and value for money competitive manner that is open to scrutiny, debate and criticism. For instance, EU tenders will be used for all contracts; and
- To exploit unique innovative methods that improve benefits, reduce costs all of which are in the public interest.

13. What would be the burdens on public bodies?

At this stage it suffices to say here that the Metro Dublin sees that the Development and operation will at all times accrue net income for the Exchequer and the Local Authorities.



DUBLIN - NEW URBAN RAILWAY NETWORK





Creating and delivering a metro for Dublin's future

Metro Dublin is a new mass rapid transit network to serve Ireland's capital city and the country. Cormac Rabbitt, Managing Director of the scheme, explains for *Eurotransport* why and how Metro Dublin propose to create and deliver a cost effective transit metro network for Dublin's future

Metro Dublin will extend to 92km with 57 stations when eight shared stops are included. Works will involve the upgrade of 28km of existing lines, 17km of new surface lines and 45km of tunnels. It will run on grade separated tracks from the Irish Rail intercity trains. The network could best be seen as an extended Dublin urban railway network, as shown in Figure 1 on page 59.

For development purposes, Metro Dublin is divided into six contract sections as shown in Figure 2 on page 60, with the existing DART line marked '7'. The sections are:

- 1. Glasnevin/Heuston/Docklands 7.2km
- 2. Malahide/Swords/Glasnevin 21.2km

- 3. Adamstown/Heuston/Phibsboro 15.8km
- 4. Blanchardstown/Glasnevin/Docklands 13.5km
- 5. Ashbourne/Finglas/Glasnevin 17.2km
- 6. Howth Jn/O'Connell St/Rathfarnham 17.1km

What's different about Metro Dublin is its gestation in a private initiative with a relatively low all-in capital cost when compared to previous proposals.

First, a rhetorical question – what could a new low all-in capital cost metro mean for you? If you are a supplier of metro systems I think that it could mean a lot. For example, if two metro lines can be built for the

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price of one (with better technology and management methods) then the ongoing supplier market will grow significantly for you.

Back in 1998, Metro Dublin, along with others, successfully lobbied the Government to undertake an independent examination between underground metro and over-ground tram options. Government consultants recommended the tram option. The Government rejected their recommendation and favoured a metro, because they believed that a planned Sandyford Line extension southwards to Lahaunstown (which is now a large urban development)

and northwards to Dublin Airport needed a full metro.

This explains why Dublin's Sandyford and Tallaght tram lines did not join – a decision based on sound principles of planning. A similar situation arose in Vienna in the early 1970s when they started to build a super-tram system, parts of which were underground. Halfway through the project they abandoned it in favour of a metro system. The reasons given for this were: a) to preserve Vienna's

dignity; b) to retain the atmosphere of the old city; and c) the realisation that the super-tram would be inadequate to deal with traffic problems.

Two years later, from a presentation that we made with a Japanese consortium to the Irish Cabinet Committee for Infrastructure and Public

Private Partnerships, the Government taking account of our estimated costs decided to proceed to upgrade the Sandyford Green Line to a full metro and to continue it northward from Ranelagh under the city centre to Dublin Airport and Swords (Plan).

In 2002, the Irish Railway Procurement Agency (RPA) came up with a modification of the Plan, calling it Metro North, to build a line just from Stephen's Green (1km north of Ranelagh) to the Airport and Swords. Their plan was for a 14km tram metro line with 6km of it underground and with 14 stations, of which seven were underground, at an estimated all-in cost with funding requirements over 15 years of €4.88 billion with a capital estimate of €3.89 billion in the then current money value.

Looking back on this now I just couldn't fathom it as Madrid had then recently completed an all underground 11.1km, 13 stations underground extension to its Line 7 – see Figure 3 on page 61, at a cost of €424 million. The cost included all design, procurement, construction and management related costs. The line was built in four contract sections, which enabled the works to be completed, from signing of contract to operation, in 28 months. My conclusion was that the RPA's estimate for their Metro North was questionably significantly larger than the outcome cost of Line 7.


To understand why, I travelled to Madrid and met Professor Manuel Maynar Melis, Director General of Transportation in Madrid. He showed me his new MetroSur Line 12, which has 40.5km underground with 28 stations which he had almost completed. Its all-in final cost excluding financing interest and fees was €1.86 billion and took

35 months to complete.

Again, I made a comparison and my calculations were that the RPA Metro North Capital estimate was questionably more than what Madrid incurred. The reason why the cost of Line 12 was so much lower then Dublin (and other metro systems), I concluded, was the skills that the management team had to manage the system delivery in a short timeframe, and definitely nothing to do with ground conditions as Dublin's substrata for metro construction is better than Madrid's.

I think that an important point to note here is that the Madrid Metro is built to one of the highest standards in the world. For example, a good comparative measure of quality is that, in 2010, the combined number of escalators and lifts in the New York, London, Moscow and Tokyo metro systems were respectively 88% and 40% that of Madrid.

My next step was to request the Irish Parliament Joint Committee on Transport to examine the situation. They brought over a Metro de Madrid delegation and then commissioned a Consultant's Report (O'Reilly) resulting in the estimate cost of Dublin's Metro North being reduced by some 30% and a recommendation that my (trading as Metro Dublin) 'undoubted knowledge and many skills that are appropriate for the building

tunnel) and 14 stations with a capital estimate of €2.5 billion, and to DART Underground for a 7.6km line with six stations with a capital estimated of €3.5 billion - a figure that included additional works on other lines to make it work. The estimated timescale to construct both was six years. In September 2015, both of these schemes were sent back to the drawing boards with the expectation now that only Metro North will open in 2027.

In the foregoing environment (timeline, estimated cost and that only one part of the city would have a new metro line),

Metro Dublin recently stepped back into the breach and met with the

the Dublin City Council Planning Strategic Planning Committee passed a motion to "...explore the potential for cooperation between Metro Dublin and Dublin City Council to secure the potential benefits of Metro Dublin for the City...".

In Ireland, development proposals are encouraged and facilitated within the Transport (Railway Infrastructure) Act, 2001. The act provides that 'any person' may apply for a railway order. A late Government Minister invited the private sector "to take part in the upgrading of the transport system" and "play a part in developing a more modern transportation system for the city and country."

It is widely accepted in Ireland and in other countries that there is a strong case for a Government to consider a private initiative in circumstance such as:

- When major infrastructure projects are developed and then shelved (as happened Dublin's Metro North and DART Underaround Developments)
- Under probity of open market requirements as promoted by the Government and the EU and in particular to address the deficit of investment in environmental transport infrastructure
- Where innovative proven ideas with unique elements and intellectual property rights that are in the public interest can be


introduced in an open, transparent and value for money competitive manner

- Where it serves a 'public interest' and Government policy, objectives and strategy to deliver sustainable infrastructure
- Where developments include unique elements that provide justification for entering into direct discussions with the State Authorities and Agencies
- Can be delivered through a transparent and competitive process.

Metro Dublin's application for a Railway Order is being developed through the consultative and developmental process set out in Irish Acts and Regulations - a process that is open to scrutiny, debate and criticism. The development works will be transparent through the utilisation of the competitive EU e-tender procurement processes for Multiple Framework Contracts, and dived into nine 'contract groups' to facilitate construction completion over 35 months.

Through such processes, Metro Dublin fits in with the Government's priority to achieve value-for-money outcomes. It will provide fair and equal opportunities for private and public sector participants to partake through open competitive tenders.

On the question of land acquisition, Metro Dublin needs, for most of its development, only to acquire the necessary way-leave land rights to enable its construction, ongoing maintenance and access to stations.

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As stated already, the Metro Dublin Development does not conflict with the existing rail services. It runs on grade separated (bridged-over) tracks from the Irish Rail intercity trains and can be seen as complementary to the plans for the Irish Rail DART Underground and the Swiftway bus rapid transit systems. (For instance for people who know Dublin; should DART Underground proceed then platform-to-platform access could be available from the DART Heuston Station directly to the development's stations at the Dublin Institute of Technology, Dublin City University, Dublin Airport and St James's Hospital (and the New Children's Hospital), and from the DART Christchurch Station to O'Connell Street, Croke Park Stadium (capacity 82,300), Beaumont Hospital, Terenure and Rathfarnham),

Metro Dublin with consortium members will fund and bridge-finance the development and after at least two years of metro operation will bring part, or all, of it to market. Metro Dublin has a core team that has capability and credibility to complete its metro development in 2020/2021.

The State, local government and semi-state sector's main contributions are expected to come in the form of permits, licenses, and assets. The European Union is anticipated to provide finance through the European Investment Bank (EIB) which can be repaid from Local Authority planning development levies (system to do so is already activated). income

from railway associated property developments, naming rights, etc. Some of the cash flows from the forgoing are projected to purchase $\frac{1}{2}$

part of the development (asset) over a period of 20 years. The metro is likely to be eligible for funds ear-marked for key railway infrastructure as a cross-border rail project that provides a link to Ireland's major international airport and to help reduce carbon emissions.

The European guidelines for the State aid to railway undertakings (OJ: C 184 of 22.7.2008) state that where infrastructure use is open to all potential users in a fair and non-discriminatory manner, and access to that infrastructure is charged for at a rate in accordance with community legislation in force, the Commission considers that public financing of the infrastructure does not constitute State

aid. If such financing is considered to constitute aid, it may nevertheless be authorised if the infrastructure in question meets the needs of transport coordination.

The state is a significant holder of land on and near the Metro Dublin lines. It owns this land directly/indirectly through Local Authorities, NAMA (Docklands) and state companies like CIÉ/Irish Rail, Dublin Airport Authority, etc. Metro Dublin will open up these lands for more intensive development and considerably add to their values and exchequer cash flow. It will, for instance, help supply the high quality, well-located office locations that the Irish Industrial Authority says are necessary to continue to attract and maintain Foreign Direct Investment and rates for Local Authorities. This along with the underpinning of business rates, increased property transaction taxes such as capital gains and stamp duty taxes mean that the Exchequer will be in positive cash flow during all stages of the development construction and operation. This event will take place on Saturday 26th March 2016, between 11am and 1pm. There is still time for community/environmental groups to register at www.teamdublincleanup.ie or by phoning 01 222 2222 and selecting a particular street or area that they wish to clean. Dublin County Council Waste Management will provide cleaning equipment to all groups and will arrange for litter to be collected afterwards.

National Spring Clean Up

April is the month for the National Spring Clean, when community/environmental groups are asked to participate in clean ups in their own area. Over 5,000 events were held nationwide in 2015, collecting over 5000 tonnes of litter.

Groups register online at www.nationalspringclean.org or at 01 4002219 and receive clean up kits and information. We will contact residents associations and environmental groups in the area with a view to maximising participation within the area and will make arrangements for the collection of litter.

Enforcement

Targeted enforcement action is continuing in selected residential locations within the area. Residents are initially informed of the requirement that they as a holder of waste must have their waste collected by an approved collector or disposed of at an approved facility. Surveys are then conducted to identify households who may not be in compliance. Authorised Officers will then call to households to check for compliance, issue warning letters to give householders an opportunity to put a waste collection system in place and then if necessary fines for breaches of the bye-laws will be issued.

Lane Enhancements

Enhancement/cleanup works have been conducted in a number of laneways in the North West Area. Fergal's Lane, off Wellmount Road, which is heavily used by children travelling to and from local schools, has been cleaned, had its walls and utility boxes repainted and bushes cut back. It will be monitored in the coming weeks and graffiti painted over as required. Annamore Lane has been cleaned, had bushes cut back and bollards repositioned to enhance vehicular access for cleaning. Work is also due to commence shortly on further restricting vehicular access to prevent fly tipping in the lane at Cabra Park.

Improvements in Drumcondra

Dublin City Council Contractors have recently completed a deep cleaning of Drumcondra Bridge. This bridge is especially prone to discoloration from exhaust fumes generated by the high level of passing vehicular traffic. Works to replace the four seats on the outbound side of Drumcondra Road Upper, opposite the Cat and Cage pub are due to commence shortly.

Anti Graffiti Measures

Extensive work has been conducted around the area to combat the ever present problem of graffiti. A large amount of graffiti has been removed from around the Ballymun Shopping Centre and along the Swords Road near the Omni Shopping Centre. Wall painting was also undertaken on the Tolka Valley Road, which has both enhanced the location and aided the future removal of tagging as it occurs. It should be noted that some locations within the area are especially prone to graffiti and a considerable level of resources are dedicated to combating this problem.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Dublin City Council (DCC) is preparing a Local Area Plan (LAP) for Ballymun. The preparation of an LAP is identified as an objective of the current Dublin City Development Plan 2011-2017.

The proposed plan area covers an area of approx. 270 hectares (see Appendix no. 1). On the eastern side of Ballymun Road, the boundary is set by Santry Avenue to the north and by the residential estates of Shanliss and Oldtown to the east and south. On the western side of Ballymun Road, the area is bounded by the realigned St. Margaret's Road to the north, Jamestown Road to the west and the residential estates of Oakwood, Cedarwood, Pinewood and Willow Park to the south. Both the northern and western boundary corresponds with the administrative boundary between Dublin City Council and Fingal County Council.

In 1997 a government decision was made to regenerate the area of Ballymun. Dublin City Council set up Ballymun Regeneration Limited (BRL) to oversee and implement the regeneration process. The Ballymun Masterplan was produced in 1998 following consultation with the local community, and over the next 17 years BRL successfully implemented the key objectives of this plan which sought to enhance the economic, social, environmental and physical character of Ballymun. With the winding down of Ballymun Regeneration Limited and the transfer of it functions and responsibilities to Dublin City Council it is timely that a new plan for Ballymun is prepared which will build on the successes of the Masterplan and address its future challenges. The preparation of the Local Area Plan will safeguard the significant investment made in the area to date and ensure the regeneration is brought to a successful conclusion.

The LAP will review the progress made in implementing the aims and objectives of the Ballymun Masterplan, and provide an updated strategy for the future development and management of the area to meet the needs of the existing and future population.

1.1 The Role of the Issues Paper

An important step in making a Local Area Plan is to identify the issues for the local area from the point of view of local residents, business people, land owners, state bodies operating services in the area, and other interested stakeholders.

To assist this process, Dublin City Council called for submissions on matters which the plan should address and prepared an Issues Paper document to assist and encourage such submissions. This process ensures that important and informed local issues identified from a

wide variety of sources are identified at an early stage to help the preparation of the draft plan.

1.2 Public Consultation on the Issues Paper

A presentation was given to the North West Area Committee (NWAC) on the 16th June 2015, regarding the stages involved in making a Local Area Plan, the proposed process for predraft public consultation, and important items to be included in the published Issues Paper were discussed.

The Issues Paper (i.e. pre-draft local area plan) public consultation was launched on the 5th November 2015 with the publication of a public notice and the Issues Paper document. A display was provided in the Civic Offices in Wood Quay and at the Civic Offices, Main Street, Ballymun. The NWAC Councillors were circulated with a copy of the Issues Paper and the statutory notice. The Ballymun Civic Alliance (see section 2.4) and a range of pertinent stakeholders including social and community groups, schools, businesses and sport clubs were notified (with assistance from the Ballymun and Finglas Area offices). The Issues Paper and details on how to make a submission were posted on the Dublin City Council website. Use was also made of the DCC social media accounts (facebook and twitter) to help to notify members of the public. Posters on the consultation process were erected in eleven locations throughout Ballymun, including AXIS, Ballymun Library, Poppintree Sports and Community Centre and also the local shops and community buildings. Members of the Planning Department were available locally in the area to assist with any queries on the following public consultation dates: -

1. Friday 6th November: 10am - 1pm

2. Thursday 12th November: 1pm - 4pm

3. Saturday 21st November: 10am – 12pm

4. Thursday 26th November: 7pm - 9pm

23 people signed the attendance sheets over the four periods.

A total of four weeks (from Thursday 5th November 2015 to Thursday 3rd December 2015) was allowed for making submissions.

2.0 SUBMISSIONS RECEIVED

A total of 29 submissions were received by Dublin City Council during the consultation period. The purpose of this report is to briefly summarise these submissions and present the Chief Executive's recommendation. Those issues raised by elected members and prescribed bodies are summarised individually while all other submissions are summarised under the various themes which emerged.

2.1 List of Submissions Received

2.2 Summary of Issues Raised by Elected Members

A number of issues were raised by the elected representatives, noted below.

Cllr. Noeleen Reilly (Submission 4)

Concern regarding unfinished regeneration process

Economic Development & Employment

- Ballymun Shopping Centre, old Garda station and Health Centre need to be demolished
- Development of Balcurris site for retail and office space to provide a low cost supermarket
- Provision of additional shops for clothing, footwear, hardware, café etc. and limit the number of existing businesses
- Resolution of legal disputes of vacant commercial units and leasing of these units
- Review of the rents of the Dublin City Council properties
- Improvement of car parking facilities at shopping centre in the short-term
- Develop M50 lands as industrial cluster, with greater co-operation between DCC and FCC

- Training for unemployed
- Improve maintenance of vacant land

Housing and Tenure Diversity

- All private housing developments should have an element of social housing
- Issue of tenure diversity should be addressed through job creation
- Rent Allowance ban should be lifted no impact on existing tenure diversity
- Portion of available land in Shangan should be utilised for one bedroom senior citizen housing to facilitate downsizing
- Additional student housing

Social, Community, Recreation and Cultural Development

- Provision of additional playing fields
- Relocation of Ballymun Kickhams into the heart of Ballymun Balbutcher Lane flats cited as a possible location
- Transfer of land around Setanta GAA to the club
- Improve security for Poppintree Park

Infrastructure and Movement

Completion of Hampton Wood link road

Cllr. Andrew Montague (Submission 19)

 Sets out a vision for the area. Highlights the positives and achievements, and the failures and concerns of the area.

Economic Development & Employment

- Focus development on Main Street and M50 lands
- Address shortcomings of the Poppintree industrial estate rezone to residential or mixed-use
- Provision of jobs that match the skill sets of the unemployed
- Missing services in the area include restaurants, cafes, pubs, bookshops, supermarket, hardware, dry cleaning etc.

Housing and Tenure Diversity

- Additional senior citizen, co-operative and student housing
- Provide different houses sizes and types
- No change to the rent supplement policies
- Family friendly home zones car parking is kept separate from the residential streets
- Provision of purpose built rental accommodation where the developer builds and maintains the accommodation

Infrastructure and Movement

- Connect Shangan Rd to slip road at the back of the Civic Centre
- Reduce speeds and car domination on Main Street segregated bike lanes, narrowing of carriageways for cars
- Bus service improvements: No. 4 should extend to the airport; No. 17A should extend to the DART in the east; More direct link to Blanchardstown SC
- Dublinbike stations on Main Street and in each of the neighbourhood centres
- Segregated bike lane provision on Ballymun Rd, Santry Avenue, Balbutcher Lane,
 Balbutcher Lane North, Sillogue Rd, Shangan Rd
- New cycle route along Santry River to Saint Anne's Park which connects into Ballymun through Santry Woods

Design, Public Realm and Environmental Improvements

- Ensure new developments 'design out' anti-social behaviour (e.g. overlook public spaces or re-imagine vacant land/spaces for community gardens etc)
- Upgrade plaza
- Improve public realm in the courts
- Universal access in all new buildings
- Taller buildings and higher densities along Main Street
- Plant more trees
- Improve Balcurris Park, Shangan Park, Whiteacre Park
- Examine the land and use of the spaces at: -
- (a) Educational Training Board (ETB), Main Street

- (b) Virgin Mary NS and St. Joseph's NS
- (c) St. Margaret's Halting Site

2.3 Summary of Issues Raised by Prescribed Bodies / State Agencies

(a) Fingal County Council (Submission no. 10)

- Fingal County Council (FCC) and Dublin City Council (DCC) should agree clear objectives for the development of the DCC owned lands (located within the administrative boundary of FCC).
- When a clear planning strategy is in place for Ballymun (lands both within DCC and FCC), FCC and DCC might consider a joint initiative to attract economic development in Ballymun.
- Planning strategy for Ballymun should aim to optimise the relationship of future development with new Metro North and to maximise the benefits of having a high capacity public transport system running through the area.

(b) Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht (Submission no. 12)

- LAP should comply with the new Dublin City Development Plan 2016-2022.
- LAP is adjacent to Santry Demesne, a proposed Natural Heritage Area; bats may be an issue and should be considered in the LAP.
- LAP is adjacent to the Santry River and its role as an ecological corridor as envisaged under Article 10 of the Habitats Directive should be maintained and enhanced.
- Additional guidance provided in relation to nature conservation and the making of the LAP.

(c) Irish Water (Submission no. 15)

- Irish Water is currently carrying out a Drainage Area Plan for the Sutton Pump Station which will include the North Fringe Sewer (NFS) and the North Dublin Drainage Sewer (NDDS).
- Irish Water are preparing to carry out investigate surveys and drainage models that will take account of the future development requirements in Ballymun.

(d) Environmental Protection Agency (Submission no. 25)

 'Integration of Environmental Consideration' document provided to be taken into account in the preparation of the Strategic Environmental Assessment and the Draft Local Area Plan.

(e) National Transport Authority (Submission no. 26)

- 'Draft Transport Strategy for the Greater Dublin Area 2016-2035' (published October 2015) includes a proposal for a light rail line from St. Stephen's Green to Swords, via Dublin Airport and Ballymun, known as the new Metro North.
- The new Metro North will require a new route options assessment exercise and the preparation of a new planning application.
- Clarity on the new Metro North in terms of alignment, station locations and construction type (underground, at grade or elevated sections) will emerge in late 2016.
- Taking this into account, the practical approach may be to align the LAP and the new Metro North preliminary design work as closely as possible, and the Draft LAP is finalised once the preliminary design drawings are available for the section within the Ballymun LAP lands.

2.4 Ballymun Civic Alliance

Ballymun Regeneration Limited (BRL) has wound down and all of the roles and responsibilities of the regeneration company are transferred into Dublin City Council. The Ballymun Civic Alliance was set up to assist this process and ensure that the aims of the Ballymun Masterplan were pursued locally. The Civic Alliance comprises Elected Members, local authority representatives, pertinent stakeholders and local people. There is an overall Board with three thematically focused sub-committees: -

- 1. Economic
- 2. Social
- 3. Physical

Updates are provided by the Planning Department at each of the Physical Sub-Committee meetings, which take place every eight weeks, regarding the preparation of the LAP and also on the Retail Study (A separate retail study is being carried out by consultants on behalf

of Dublin City Council to accurately measure and evaluate the retail market in Ballymun. This information will assist the preparation of the LAP and will be included as an appendix to the LAP). A planning update was also provided to the overall Civic Alliance, which take place approximately once a quarter, on the 1st October 2015 and the 28th January 2016.

The Economic Sub-Committee provided a submission on the Issues Paper and the main points are as follows: -

- Ballymun is a low income community with limited disposable income. Aims for improving the area are as follows: -
 - (a) increase the level of income by creating employment opportunities
 - (b) increase the overall population
 - (c) improve the tenure diversity
 - (d) improve educational standards
- Achieve the above by attracting private investment into the area and/or developing Ballymun as a destination (e.g. building on existing initiatives such as the Rediscovery Centre – greenway cluster and AXIS)
- The LAP can stimulate development of the vacant sites by clearly identifying the land uses.
- Consideration should be given to the City Council's role in: -
 - (a) Becoming a developer of the remaining sites as opposed to relying on the private sector this could be a innovate and bold move, and
 - (b) Making the vacant sites more saleable
- Creation of a focal point in the heart of Ballymun to attract passing trade and visitors.
 Improve the physical attributes of the Plaza and redevelop the shopping centre site to create a vibrant village streetscape along Main Street
- M50 lands should be utilised for employment generating uses for large commercial activities. Residential uses should be closer to the town centre
- Resolution of the ongoing legal issues of the unoccupied retail space and incentivise their occupancy (e.g. voucher towards marketing, fit out the unit etc)
- Establishment of an enterprise park incorporating food-start up space
- Further develop links with DCU and provide start-up space for enterprise

- Production of a marketing brochure of the comparative advantages of locating in Ballymun and circulation to IDA etc. Additional marketing and branding can be achieved once free WIFI is available on the plaza.
- Missing services/businesses include food, clothing, retail, cafes and restaurants
- Co-op housing to help retain local people in the area who have a viable option of purchasing

2.5 Summary of Key Issues Raised by Members of the Public / Interested Parties, by Theme

Having reviewed all of the submissions, a number of key themes were identified as matters to be considered in the preparation of the Draft Local Area Plan. The themes closely follow the issues and matters identified in the Issues Paper and reflect a good understanding of the matters to be addressed.

- 2.5.1 Vision for Ballymun
- 2.5.2 Economic Development and Employment
- 2.5.3 Housing and Tenure Diversity
- 2.5.4 Infrastructure and Movement
- 2.5.5 Social, Community, Recreation and Cultural Development
- 2.5.6 Public Realm and Environmental Improvements
- 2.5.7 Key Sites
- 2.5.8 Implementation of the LAP

2.5.1 Vision for Ballymun

Having regard to the submissions received there is a desire to: -

- 1. Improve the image of the area
- 2. Create a centre / heart / focal point / CBD in Ballymun
- 3. Provide local employment

The disappointment regarding the lack of development on the shopping centre lands and the poor retail offering was clearly conveyed in the submissions. Demolishing the shopping centre and the adjoining buildings is seen as one of the priority projects for the area and developing a proper Main Street.

Additional measures are needed to tackle anti-social behaviour, especially for young people. Education and employment are viewed as two key drivers in addressing this issue and achieving successful social regeneration.

2.5.2 Economic Development and Employment

There is a desire to see economic development in the area. The main focus for development is identified as being on the shopping centre site and M50 lands. These sites are highlighted as being the hub locations for local employment.

The submissions were extremely strong on the need for local employment and economic activity in the area to: -

- (a) Improve the image of the area
- (b) Improve the business atmosphere
- (c) To reduce anti-social behaviour

The strategic location and the local authority ownership of the land were noted as being advantageous in a number of submissions. The LAP should consider opportunities for the local authority to retain ownership of the land and to develop the land in tandem with state agencies to provide employment. There is a desire for the LAP to support collaboration between agencies to provide locally based employment initiatives and longer-term strategies to improve the skill levels and assist local communities in accessing future labour markets.

In terms of the green economy, a submission from The Green Way proposed the generation of renewable energy on a commercial sale (solar or wind) within some of the sites in Ballymun, namely the M50 lands. This provision could be examined at the Development Plan level or within the confines of the LAP providing site specific objectives. Innovate Dublin recommended that Ballymun become a test bed for innovation and provide more flexible and competitively priced space for the location of start-ups. 'Destination Ballymun', one of previous aim's of the Ballymun Masterplan was reiterated as a means of attracting investment and reducing the dependency on local authority supports.

The level of vacancy in commercial properties was noted. Requests were made to address the legal matters precluding the use of some of the vacant units and activating these units for innovative uses, start-ups, advertise local events, and local social / community uses. More favourable rental or lease agreements were cited as possible means of improving the occupancy of these units. There was also a recommendation to penalise the owners of the units that are left vacant.

The development of a new shopping centre is identified in numerous submissions as a requirement for the area. The submissions identify that additional retail (supermarket and clothes shops), cafes; restaurants; public houses are required in the area. In terms of the provision of complementary leisure uses, one of the submission notes that the leisure element (i.e. cinema and bowling) is provided in two adjoining centres — Omni and Charlestown, and as such is not required in the area. Furthermore the provision of the shopping centre should be integrated with the provision of additional office space providing local employment (emphasising the desire for local employment).

2.5.3 Housing and Tenure Diversity

Submissions on housing stressed the need to provide additional housing in the area, with student, private and social housing required. More mixed housing options, innovative housing ownership models such as co-operatives and new housing finance models supporting home ownership and local people who have the economic capacity to live in the area were highlighted in a number of submissions.

Tenure Diversity was stated as a means of assisting local business and new residential developments. The Santry Cross Managed Company highlighted again the strategic location of Ballymun as an advantage of attracting residential development and improving tenure diversity.

New Generation Homes suggested that some of the western lands of the Poppintree Industrial site; i.e. the former 'Mouldpro' site is considered for redevelopment (i.e. housing

and health/community uses) and that the employment/enterprise generating land use is unnecessarily restrictive.

In relation to the existing housing stock, requests were made to generally improve the maintenance of the existing housing stock including improvements to the existing 1960's housing of Sandyhill and Shangan.

2.5.4 Infrastructure and Movement

Metro North

Submissions welcome the new Metro North proposal and request that the Metro is fully integrated into the heart of Ballymun fully servicing the area. The Worker's Party Dublin North West would like the metro to be located at surface and a park and ride.

Bus

A request was made by the Worker's Party Dublin North West not to privatise the bus networks.

Movement

A submission was received to improve transport links between the City and Fingal County. A separate submission specially highlights the creation of a link from Ballymun into Santry Demesne (i.e. within the administrative area of FCC).

2.5.5 Social, Community, Recreation and Cultural Development

Social and Community

The submissions stressed the importance of education as a key element of social regeneration, while simultaneously addressing/assisting employment prospects and economic development. J.U.S.T considers that a visible and centrally located education/lifelong learning facility would assist this process and make a major contribution to the area.

Funding is required to support the local social and community sectors. The LAP should ringfence the monies obtained from land sales for social regeneration, in a similar fashion to the model utilised by BRL.

New Generation Homes called for additional health/community and leisure facilities specifically within the Jamestown area and on the former 'Mouldpro' site in Poppintree industrial estate.

Recreation

The provision of additional community facilities for young people should be provided for by the Local Area Plan. Further playing pitches were also requested, based on the census figures and the level of social housing in the area. Options which were presented include the land at Naul Park; the former Balcurris flat sites (i.e. the last flat block demolition) and the provision of an all-weather pitch(es) in the Shangan area. Willows Football Club requested the use of the site adjoining their club house on Jamestown Road and 3 Bridges Boxing Club requested a club premises, as they are currently based in Virgin Mary School. One submission called for the inclusion of outdoor sports equipment in the local parks, as provided in Malahide Park and along Clontarf strand.

Cultural Development

AXIS provided a detailed submission on how the LAP can promote culture and tourism in the area. There is a desire to brand Ballymun as a hub for cultural, arts and innovation with AXIS becoming the lead agent and the resource for the north side of the city. This idea is explored further with potential ideas of creating a cultural corridor on the north side with AXIS and Rediscovery Centre, linking into Grangegorman, Parnell Square and out to the Docklands; or the idea of twinning Ballymun and Docklands together as the two main access points into the city – i.e. the port and the airport.

2.5.6 Public Realm and Environmental Improvements

A number of the submissions received would like to see the retention and improvement of the space in front of AXIS as a cultural, performance and external café space. To assist this, improved signage and architectural treatment would be required. The potential of linking this into a smaller space on the opposite side of the road was also promoted.

The provision of a local collection point for bulky goods (i.e. goods that don't fit into the black bins) which is tied into a local environmental initiative was recommended.

2.5.7 Key Sites

The shopping centre and the M50 lands are seen as key sites in the area. One of the submissions suggested the exploration of 'meanwhile' uses for the Shopping Centre site that includes and involves the community.

In relation to future of the key sites, Innovate Dublin recommends the establishment of a participatory consultation process inviting non-traditional stakeholders into the process.

2.5.8 Implementation of the LAP

With regards to the implementation of the LAP one submission states that there should be more involvement of local people in the social/economic/political development and establishment of a Ballymun "Central Committee".

3.0 CONCLUSION AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S RECOMMENDATIONS

All submissions received have been reviewed and all the comments received will be taken into consideration in the preparation of the Draft Local Area Plan.

The comments received and key themes identified will be important in the preparation of the Draft Local Area Plan and in particular will be considered in the formulation of policy in several areas including: -

- Strengthening the economic role of the area
- Improving retail provision
- Fostering and strengthening the public transport provision in the area
- High quality urban design implementation
- Community/cultural/recreational focal points
- Prioritising remaining projects for the area and progressing remaining demolitions
- Reviewing housing models and options for the area
- Improving the public realm

It should be noted that receipt and analysis of these submissions forms one important part of the overall pre-draft preparation stages. The Local Area Plan team will continue to consult and meet with all relevant stakeholders and state bodies up to the publication of a Draft Local Area Plan.

These meetings will seek to achieve a balance and consensus in progressing policies and action on the issues raised during the Issues Paper consultation, and having regard to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.

The proposed Draft Local Area Plan will be presented to the Area Committee prior to its official display. This is envisaged to be later in 2016, having regard to the preparatory work yet to be undertaken, and the submission received by the National Transport Authority.

Chief Executive's Recommendations:

It is recommended to the Council that



1. Community Update

The New Community Development Team has met with a number of community groups in relation to the following:

<u>1916 Commemoration Events:</u> The Community Development Team has been liaising with all 23 community organisations that received funding through the 1916 fund so as to better support and promote their event where necessary.

Community Garden proposal for Sandyhill Area: The Community Development Team has met with the community garden committee in relation to a proposal that was sent in before Christmas which outlined a plan for upgrading the grassed area in front of Sandyhill Gardens by including community allotments in the area. Since then, a number of site meetings have taken place and commitment has been made by Housing/Public Domain to improve the dumping and footpath situation. A revised plan for upgrading smaller grassed areas in the Sandyhill area in being considered by the group.

<u>Older Persons Dance Project</u>: Two meetings were attended in relation to this joint project by Arts Office, Sports Development and Community Development.

<u>Environmental Initiatives</u>: The team are linking in with the Seven Oaks Environmental Group who is looking to plant small shrubs, and pruning trees to enhance their area.

A team member has been linking with IKEA sustainability officer, around an environmental initiative whereby 50 trees will be donated and planted in the local area. This has been linked to the new residents of Rapid Housing Project for homeless families. It has been agreed that the trees will be planted in the back gardens of each new unit.

Work has also commenced with residents around a planting project in Marewood Crescent.

Rapid Build Housing, Poppintree (22 new Units): Two meetings were attended centrally in relation to the new Rapid Build Housing Units. Subsequent follow up work for the Community Team involved putting together an information booklet for new tenants of the area and a number of visits to the site. The Community Team members will assist the new residents to assimilate into the area by providing ongoing information and invites to community events. They will link closely with dePaul's local outreach staff and various other local services. Liaising with the Sustainability Officer in IKEA has resulted in them committing to providing a welcome pack (with cutlery etc) for new residents.

<u>Summer Project Meetings</u>: Two meetings have taken place with the Crosscare representative from voluntary summer projects in the wider Ballymun Area. There are now five voluntary summer projects: Virgin Mary, Holy Spirit, Greenfields, the Larks and Gaeltacht Park. It has been decided to set up a Network Meeting for these projects so as to provide a space for the exchange of valuable ideas and supports. The first meeting took place on Monday the 7th March. The community team members will meet the non voluntary summer projects on a separate basis. These are: Poppintree Youth Project, Poppintree Sports Centre, Aisling Project and BRYR. There is a possibility that an additional music project will run from Setanta this year. A meeting in relation to this has taken place.

<u>Good Citizen Awards</u>: The community Development Team has been promoting these awards and has emailed all our community groups in relation to this.

Ballymun Festival Steering Committee: Two meetings have already taken place with this group. A Community Team member is chairing the meeting. Meetings are focusing on the

LIFT Festival and Otherworld Festival. Other members include project workers from local youth organisations and Axis Community Arts Officers.

<u>Beo Ballymun</u>: This festival, which focuses on Irish Traditional Music, is jointly organised by Dublin City Council, Axis and Setanta GAA. It takes place in early June. Two meetings about this event have been attended by community team members.

<u>Active Living</u>: This group have their weekly walk on Tuesday mornings from 10.30am-11.30am and have a tea/coffee and chat afterwards in the Axis Centre. They are also learning a new activity this year which is Tai Chi. They will begin their classes next month.

<u>U3A</u>: This group is working on a project for the 1916 rising. They are planning on compiling a booklet from their research on the women in 1916 and will include them in the exhibition taking place the week of the 18th April in the Civic Offices.

Events

<u>Albert College Senior Citizens Complex</u>: The Community Development Team has been working for a number of weeks with the new Liaison Officer to build up the use of the community room in Albert College. To date there has been three weekly coffee/social mornings where staff meet and chat to residents and provide information about very local events and initiatives. There are approximately ten residents at these mornings. A Fair-trade breakfast morning will be held there on Thursday the 3rd March.

<u>Fair-trade Fortnight</u>: Apart from the above event, two more community events will involve a fair-trade talk, which will be provided by the community team members.

<u>Snooker Event</u>: The Community Development Team in conjunction with the Sports Development Officer arranged a snooker event in Cross Guns Snooker Hall and Civic Offices. Approximately 30 men attended the local event which took place on Tuesday the 19th January from 2:30pm-4:30pm.

<u>Trinity Comprehensive 1916 Commemoration Event:</u> The Community Development Team members worked closely with and strongly supported Trinity Comprehensive with a fantastic Commemoration Event which took place on Tuesday the 9th February in the school. At this event four classrooms were totally transformed and people were transported back in time to the pre 1916 era and the events of the Rising. This event was acted out by the young people of the school and all local schools and community organisations were invited to attend. Approximately 400 people attended on the day and it was a huge success.

1916 Event (Ballymun Civic Centre): The Community development Team is planning a big event for Monday April the 18th from 6:30pm. At this event, the 1916 mural by renowned artist Muriel Brant will be unveiled in the Atrium of the Civic Centre and a display of 1916 projects undertaken by local community groups/organisations will be launched. One of the main highlights will be an arts/crafts project whereby a number of local community organisations will design handkerchiefs (similar to those used during the 1916 era to pass on hidden messages) and these will be displayed together. There will also be music and refreshments served. 200 people will be invited. The Lord Mayor will open this event. This event is being jointly organised by Ballymun Community Team and the Arts Office.

Other 1916 Events: A 1916 Café event took place on March the 8th in the Sillogue Neighbourhood Centre, local women were invited to dress up in old style clothes and celebrate Ballymun women of the last 100 years. This was co-organised by Community Team members and the Sillogue Ladies Group.

<u>International Women's Day Event</u>: Apart from the above, a second International Women's Day event will take place at the Shangan Family Centre. This event will display art and other items representing the plight of the Women of the Rising. Community team members have assisted with this event and will also attend.

<u>LIFT</u>: The LIFT Youth Arts Festival this year will take place from the 16th -23rd March. Programme planning and budget planning is ongoing at the moment. Activities will be open to all young people and will take place either in local youth organisations or the Axis Theatre. There will be a strong focus on mental health this year.

Drumcondra/Glasnevin Community Report

1916 Commemoration Events have commenced. ATeam Dublin Clean - Up in Iona, Claremont and Phibsborough is being promoted. Phibsborough Tidy Towns are also having their own Clean-Up, followed by a major musical event in the Library Garden. Also, we are discreetly promoting nominations for the Good Citizen Awards.

Events to watch out for:

City Council Local History Walk 1916 in Phibsborough led by Pat Liddy on Saturday 16th April 11.00 am with complimentary refreshments afterwards.

2. Housing/Estate Management Updates

C.C.T.V

The C.C.T.V system is working well. The system will undergo scheduled PPM in the coming weeks – this work includes checking all of the cameras and updating the monitoring station in the control room.

Cleansing/Waste Management

Waste Management and the Area Office are continuing to combat illegal dumping at open spaces. These measures include using the C.C.T.V system to monitor and identify those responsible. The Area Office has targeted illegal dumping in St Margaret's Road at the Balbutcher Lane junction and around Musgraves. Green spaces opposite St. Joseph's School, Whiteacre and Knowth Court were also monitored over the last month and this resulted in a number of tenants being called in and warned about illegal dumping.

Public Domain

Complaints relating to public domain issues can now be logged by calling in to the public counter in the Ballymun Area Office or by phoning 222 5610. Issues that can be reported include illegal dumping, graffiti, broken footpaths and open spaces.

<u>Pyrite</u>

Remediation works are on-going in Owensilla and Balbutcher Way. Four families moved temporarily to Hampton Woods for the duration of the works. The works are expected to be completed in another 4-6 weeks. Surveys for Pyrite are at an advanced stage in other locations in Owensilla and Carton estates and the results are expected in about 6 weeks.

Shangan Avenue

Shangan area is being closely monitored by the Waste Management Section and the Area Office after a sharp rise of household waste being illegally dumped in recent weeks.

The Solar Contractor will be on site in two weeks to replace solar panels and water pumps in various units.

Missing and broken bollards will be replaced in the Shangan area over the next two weeks. The walk through between Whiteacre Place and Shanliss Grove will be resurfaced and the old bollard removed.

Magenta Crescent

An Bord Pleanála has made a determination in relation to the cost of the pedestrian crossing on the Swords Road and it is envisaged that the crossing will be in place by the summer. The residents are preparing for a clean up ahead of the 1916 festival and Dublin City Council are supporting them with the supply of any equipment and planting material requested.

Poppintree

Dublin City Council will be surveying the open stairways in the Poppintree Crescent area with a view to installing gates in order to stop or reduce antisocial behaviour. Community groups in the Poppintree area are active with cleaning common areas and preparing for spring planting in the area. Dublin City Council erected fencing and kissing gates to further protect these areas especially Knowth Court.

A large clean up by the Area Office removed several lorry loads of illegal dumping from Carton Terrace, Termon Court and the waste lands in the area over the past two weeks.

3. Ballymun Town Civic Alliance

1. Economic Strategy

A draft 5 year economic plan has been completed. The plan was reviewed and discussed by the Economic Sub-Committee on 6th November 2015. The committee provided input and feedback which will be incorporated into the plan and reviewed again before submission to the Civic Alliance in March 2016. The Economic Development Officer has already commenced implementing some of the economic objectives.

2. <u>Stimulating economic activity</u>

- i. Free Wi-Fi for Plaza a license agreement has been agreed with Magnet Networks for the installation and provision of free Wi-Fi on the Plaza. An installation was agreed between the architect and Magnet Networks. However when Airfibre came out to survey the site there realised there would be difficulty penetrating the steep girdle. The architect is now looking at an alternative approach to get access under the window sill. The revised specification is now with the Dublin City Council's Structural Engineer.
- **ii. Vacant Neighbourhood retail units** The Economic Development Officer now has access to all available units. A brochure has been produced to market each of the units and 'To Let' signs have been produced. The current status of vacant Dublin City Council units is:

There are only 2 units in Coultry under the remit of Dublin City Council available to rent. There is remedial works being carried out on these units and once completed 'To Let' signs will be displayed and we will be in a position to start generating interest.

iii Event – 'StartUp Ballymun' 14th April 2016

Following on from the Succeed in Business Event in October 2015 and event titled 'StartUp Ballymun will be held in the Council Chamber on 14th April 2016. The objective of the event is to promote enterprise and business opportunities by:

- Inviting successful entrepreneurs and founders to speak as role models.
- Provide information from readily available services of Dublin City Council, the LEO and other partner supports.

Our target audience is people from Ballymun and the Northside interested in starting up a business in Ballymun and nearby.

The date was changed due to a clash with the LEO's City-wide Enterprise Week. To date we have 3 businesses speakers and 5 business support organisations confirmed for the event. A 'StartUp Ballymun' Facebook and Twitter account has been set up to help promote the event. Bookings can be made through the Facebook page and Eventbrite.

iv. Enterprise Unit database

A database of all publicly and privately owned units in Ballymun is near completion. The database will include:

- Location map
- Drawings
- Photos
- Owner details
- Status (Receivership / available etc.)

v. CoderDojo <u>www.coderdojo.com</u>

CoderDojo is a global movement of free, volunteer-led; community based programming clubs for young people. At a Dojo young people between 7 and 17 learn how to code, develop websites, apps, programs, games and explore technology in an informal and creative environment. In addition to learning to code attendees meet like minded people and are exposed to the possibilities of technology.

Within the CoderDojo Movement there is a focus on community, peer learning, youth mentoring and self led learning, with an emphasis on showing how coding is a force for change in the world.

The Economic Development Officer has been to see a 'Dojo' in action in the Dogpatch Labs at the CHQ building, IFSC. There is also a Dojo being run in DCU and they have invited the Economic Development Officer to attend and share some advice on recruiting mentors and promoting a Dojo. Their Dojo takes place on Saturdays and a visit will take place over the next few weeks.

vi. Enterprise Space

The retail units in Shangan will become available in 2017 once the Rediscovery Centre relocates to the old Boiler House. The Economic Development Officer will be exploring different options to make best use of this space

3. Ballymun4Business

To date we have had 4 B4b meetings take place. They have been hosted in both the Council Chamber and the Social Innovation Hub also on the 1st floor.

We now have active engagement with 24 local businesses. The group have agreed a vision and some objectives:

- Increase foot-fall
- Community Engagement Initiatives
- B2b networking

The B4b website www.b4b.ie has been reactivated and the Facebook page is now back in use. An executive Committee has been formed comprising of:

Marketing Dean Kearns, DMK Food Supplies and Smart Bits

Actions Agreed:

- B4b sponsorship of 20 hanging baskets to be hung outside local businesses
- Ballymun Communications commissioned to do 90 second video case studies of local business to be posted on Social Media and B4b website
- Revamp of the website and marketing plan to be drafted
- Creation of a tag-line for the network and promotional material

The plan for B4b over the coming months will be to:

- Increase membership
- Invest in promotional material such as banners/business cards
- Carry out case studies of local business to feature on the website and social media

The next Civic Alliance Meeting will be held in April 2016 when Deiric O'Broin, CEO NorDubco will chair his first meeting.

There was a meeting of the Physical/Environmental Sub Committee on 25th February. The development proposed for the Northern Site is likely to be a 4 story building consisting of 5 retail units and a food anchor with offices overhead. The developer has eight weeks to lodge a planning application and the pre-planning meeting went well. AIB is constructing a unit in the Civic Centre and the fit out should take 8 weeks. Sarah Miller gave an update on the Rediscovery Centre, the builders are on site since January and all is going well.

There was a meeting of the Economic Sub Committee on 25th February. Feedback was invited from the members of the committee on the Economic Development Plan. An update on Ballymun Town Centre Wi-Fi was given. There is an installation issue with the access point on the building which needs to be resolved; the structure of the building is providing challenges. The Ballymun4 Business Network has been re-activated and has held 3 meetings so far. A business event, 'Start-up Ballymun' will be held on 14th April in the Council Chamber, Civic Offices. An update on the Retail Strategy for Ballymun was given; the final report is being prepared by AECON consultants after presenting a final draft to both the Civic Alliance Committee and NWA Committee. The consultants have agreed to factor in the development of the Northern Site into the final report.

There was a meeting of the Social Sub Committee on 29th February. There was a presentation by Eleanor McClorey on YoungBallymun, who are in a challenging situation awaiting a decision regarding future funding. Eleanor gave a background to the start up of YoungBallymun and the services it provides, including prevention and early intervention programmes. The Social Sub Committee agreed to make a case for the continuation of funding of YoungBallymun. There was a report on the facilitated workshop held in December where there was a poor turnout by the statutory agencies. Education will be placed on the Agenda and Trinity Comprehensive will give an update at the next meeting.

3. <u>Safer Ballymun</u>

The latest meeting of the Safer Ballymun Community Safety Forum took place on Tuesday February 9th in the Council Chamber in Ballymun Civic Centre. Donal Barron Dublin City Council chaired the meeting and Garda David Moore gave the statistics for the period from December 20th to February 8th. The main issues discussed on the night were crime and antisocial behaviour in the parks.

4. Drumcondra Glasnevin Community Forum

The next meeting of the Drumcondra Glasnevin Community Forum will take place on Wednesday March 30th in the Maples Hotel, Drumcondra.

5 Other significant updates

Ballymun Shopping Centre and surrounds:

Work is due to commence in the next few weeks on the demolition of the old Ballymun Swimming pool.

Significant progress has been made with the HSE in relation to the disposal of the old Health Centre to the City Council.

Preparatory work on the proposed compulsory purchase of the remaining occupied units in the shopping centre is ongoing.

An on-site meeting in the car park on the south west of centre was held on 8th March with a view to the resurfacing and installation of paid parking in this area, most likely at the lowest rate of 60c per hour. Warning notices were placed on cars parked in the paid parking areas on street beside Supervalu and enforcement action will be taking place in this location in order to free up spaces for shoppers rather than all day parking.

With reference to the proposed grant of 3 year licence of Workshop 3, & 4 Poppintree Neighbourhood Centre, Ballymun, Dublin 9, to Poppintree Environmental Project Limited.

Poppintree Environmental Project Limited currently holds a licence for 12 months of Workshops 3 & 4 Poppintree Neighbourhood Centre Ballymun, Dublin 9. The licence will terminate on the 31st March 2016.

For administrative and cost effective purposes it is now proposed to grant a further licence for the longer term of 3 years for Workshops 3 & 4 to Poppintree Environmental Project Limited, which is shown, outlined red and coloured yellow on attached **m**ap subject to the following terms and conditions.

- 1. The licence shall be for 3 years from 1st April 2016 to 31st March 2019.
- 2. The licensed areas shall be used by Poppintree Environmental Project Ltd as an office and storage area.
- 3. The licence fee for both units shall total €260.00 per annum (two hundred and sixty euro), payable quarterly in advance.
- 4. The units may be used from 9.00 am to 8.00 pm daily. The licensed areas may only be used outside of those hours with the expressed permission of the City Council.
- 5. Keys to the units shall only be held by official representatives of Poppintree Environmental Project Ltd who shall be responsible for their use and all security issues associated with their use.
- 6. The licence can be terminated by either party on giving the other one months notice in writing.


- 7. The licensee shall be responsible for all outgoings including electricity, water, rates and any taxes or charges which may be due on the licensed areas.
- 8. The licensee shall be responsible for its own waste removal from the units and shall make its own arrangements for same.
- 9. The licensee shall not assign sublet or otherwise part with any part of the licensed areas.
- 10. The licensee shall keep the licensed areas in good condition and repair during the term of the licence and shall not make any material changes to the subject property without the prior consent of the Council.
- 11. The licensee shall abide by all protocol, systems and procedures laid down by Dublin City Council in relation to the premises.
- 12. The licensee shall obtain a high level of public liability insurance and employer's liability insurance (if applicable) which shall indemnify the Council against any and all claims arising from the licensee's use of the premises. The Council will have an absolute right to set a minimum level of public liability and employer's liability insurance and to review the figures on a yearly basis (the current minimum levels are €6.4million and €13million respectively).
- 13. The licensee shall sign a Deed of Renunciation document.
- 14. On termination of the licence, the licensee shall be responsible for the removal of all their materials not belonging to the City Council from the premises.

The grant of the licence shall be subject to such conditions as to title to be furnished as the Law Agent in his discretion shall stipulate.

The dates for the performance of any of the requirements of the proposed agreement may be amended at the absolute discretion of the Executive Manager.

No agreement enforceable at law is created or intended to be created until an exchange of contracts has taken place.
