Love the Lanes is a joint initiative between Dublin City Council and the Temple Bar Company to pilot solutions and interventions to address issues in the laneways of Temple Bar.

Abandoned Bicycles

A Tag was designed to assist in the removal of bicycles located on public streets or in a public car park that would appear to have been in the same location unmoved for a period of more than 2 weeks.

The tags are placed on bicycles that, by their condition, appear as abandoned.

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64 bicycles and 104 frames were removed in 2016 throughout the South East Area and a further 88 bicycles (52 full bikes and 32 Frames/Parks) have been removed so far in 2017.

Another 19 bikes tagged since the start of the year have been removed from locations by their owners by virtue of the tag being placed.
