

- Dublin City Council has adopted a co-ordinated approach to promote a safe and enjoyable Halloween and to minimise the impact of Halloween activities specifically with regard to the environmental and social consequences of illegal bonfires and fireworks.
- ☐ Key elements of the **Halloween Action Plan 2017** include:
- Safety Campaigns run by the Gardaí and Dublin Fire Brigade in schools.
- Enforcement Activities including waste audits of tyre retail businesses
- · Cooperation with An Garda Síochána
- · Liaison with local community organisations and representatives
- · Out of hours Rapid Response callout service
- 24 hour customer service facility.
- Teams made up of Area staff, Housing, Parks and Waste Management staff will work in conjunction with the local community representatives together with An Garda Síochána across flat and housing complexes, open green spaces, parks and derelict sites to ensure that stockpiles of bonfire materials are removed in the lead up to Halloween to avoid the risk of serious injury or damage to our environment.
- □ A new Halloween festival for Ringsend, Irishtown and the Docklands, has lots of fun workshops, entertainment, walkabouts and historical tours right across the villages with a Dockers and Demons Parade starting at 6.30pm followed by a party. Dublin City Council and all our partners and associates are proud to bring this new artistic and cultural celebration of Oiche Samhna for all ages and all the family for 2017.
- ☐ Other events include Halloween Market in Terenure, Sandymount Scarecrow and Pumpkin Festival and Souls of Donnybrook as well as the Bram Stoker Festival.
