Motions with Replies Central Area Committee Meeting 14th November, 2017

Item 1

Motion in the name of Councillor Christy Burke

That this Committee congratulates all involved in the Beacon fire display at Railway Street, Dublin 1 on Friday 13th October.

Report

Letters of congratulations will issue if members agree the terms of the motion.

Item 2

Motion in the name of Councillor Ray McAdam

That the Central Area Committee agrees to initiate whatever steps are necessary to extinguish the public right of way over the laneway which is between 20 and 22 St. James Avenue and which leads onto St Josephs Avenue.

Report

The matter of the laneway linking Joseph's Ave and James Ave has arisen on a number of previous occasions.

The laneway is to be kept unobstructed and immediately available for use in accordance with emergency evacuation strategies for the Croke Park Stadium. No gates or obstructions are to be provided on the laneway.

While Joseph's Avenue and James Avenue are the primary normal and emergency public egress routes at this end of the stadium this laneway provides a key emergency access route between these two primary routes for stewards, Gardaí, Dublin Fire Brigade and other emergency services in the event of emergency in the stadium or along either of these routes during egress from the stadium.

The laneway therefore forms an essential element of the emergency access and egress strategy for the Croke Park stadium as approved by the statutory authorities.

Item 3

Motion in the name of Councillor Janice Boylan

That the Central Area Committee calls on the Chief Executive to do all that is necessary with our drainage and sewerage system throughout the northside, to combat the surge of rodents. Especially in light of the amount of tenants reporting sightings in some of our flat complexes. This problem is not only for the HSE to deal with, Dublin City Council need to step up in pest control, especially when we have situations where rodents are coming up sewerage pipes into peoples toilets.

Report

DCC Housing Maintenance's Section operates a Northside and Southside Mobile Crew who have specialised training in pest control. Over 150 locations in the city have been baited in a pro active approach to date in 2017. These sites are also monitored on an ongoing basis after the initial baiting is carried out. An increase has

been noted in rodent related requests relating both to communal areas and specific dwellings which are the remit of the HSE.

Increased building works across the city including Luas works may be a contributing factor in the increase in rodent numbers. Fly tipping also is a major attraction to vermin and there is increased evidence of illegal dumping in our housing estates and all attempts were possible are made to prosecute the offenders.

Dublin City Council appreciates the reporting of rodent sightings and we make every effort to address these infestations. The situation continues to be monitored.

Item 4

Report

A 15 station expansion of the Just Eat dublinbikes scheme will be commenced before the end of 2017, focusing on the Grangegorman area of the city. Any further growth of the scheme beyond the Grangegorman expansion will be subject to securing the necessary levels of funding for both the capital and annual operational costs over the lifetime of the scheme. There is therefore no definite timeline in place for the delivery of scheme expansion to North Strand Fire Station, or the immediate surrounding areas at this point.

Central Area Full Reports from TAG 22/08/17

1) Berkeley Avenue, Dublin 7:

Due to the condition of the laneway, it is recommended to install No Parking Signs rather than Double Yellow Lines on Berkeley Avenue.

Rescind Stat(s):

- 1. Rescind DYLs on Berkeley Avenue, south side, from the southern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction in a north-easterly direction (around the perimeter of the laneway), for a distance of approx. 78 m.
- 2. Rescind DYLs on Berkeley Street, east side, from the southern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction in a southerly direction for a distance of approx. 5 m.
- 3. Rescind DYLs on Berkeley Avenue, north side, from the northern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction in a north-easterly direction (around the perimeter of the laneway), for a distance of approx. 103 m.
- 4. Rescind DYLs on Berkeley Street, east side, from the northern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction in a northerly direction for a distance of approx. 5 m.

Install Stat(s):

- 1. Install No Parking Signs (All Day) on Berkeley Avenue, south side, from the southern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction, to a point approx. 82 m north -
- 2. Install No Parking Signs (All Day) on Berkeley Avenue, north side, from the northern corner of the Berkeley Street / Berkeley Avenue junction, to a point approx. 62 m north.

2) Fitzgibbon Street, Dublin 1 Pay and Display Parking:

Due to the closure of the Fitzgibbon Street Garda Station, it is recommended to rescind all Garda Parking Spaces on Fitzgibbon Street and replace it with Pay & Display Parking.

It is also recommended to repaint all existing Double Yellow Lines on Fitzgibbon Street.

Stat(s):

1. Install Pay & Display Parking on the south side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 16 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / Emmet Street junction, westwards for a distance of 22 meters.

- 2. Install Double Yellow Lines on the south side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 38 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / Emmet Street junction, westwards for a distance of 14 meters.
- 3. Install Pay & Display Parking on the south side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 52 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / Emmet Street junction, westwards for a distance of 35 meters.
- 4. Install Double Yellow Lines on the south side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 87 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / Emmet Street junction, westwards for a distance of 15.5 meters.
- 5. Install Pay & Display Parking on the south side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 52 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / Emmet Street junction, westwards for a distance of 35 meters.
- 6. Install (Parallel) Pay & Display Parking on the north side of Fitzgibbon Street from a point 17 meters west from the corner of the Fitzgibbon Street / North Circular Road junction, westwards for a distance of 71 meters.

3) Parnell Street, Dublin 1, Yellow Box at the junction with Hill Street:

It is recommended to install a yellow box on the Hill Street / Parnell Street junction to facilitate vehicles turning from Hill Street to Parnell Street.

Dublin City Council's current policy is to not introduce parking restrictions where restrictions are already covered under the law, as this would lead to a proliferation of same and additional expense due to maintenance, etc.

Under Section 36 paragraph (2) (h) of the ROAD TRAFFIC (TRAFFIC AND PARKING) REGULATIONS, 1997:

A vehicle shall not be parked within 15 metres (on the approach side) or 5 metres (on the side other than the approach side) of a section of roadway where any of the following traffic signs have been provided—

- (i) traffic sign number RPC 001 [Pedestrian Crossing];
- (ii) traffic sign number RPC 002 [Pedestrian Crossing Complex]; or
- (iii) traffic sign numbers RTS 001, RTS 002, RTS 003 or RTS 004 [traffic lights];

Infringements of the act should be reported to Dublin Street Parking Services tel. no. 01 6022500 or to the Gardaí as they occur.

Stat:

Install a Yellow Box on the Hill Street / Parnell Street St. junction, from a point approx. 1.5 meters south from the north-east corner of the Hill Street / Parnell Street junction, extending southwards for approx 6.5 meters and westwards for 8.25 meters -

4) Fitzgibbon Lane, Dublin 1, Pay & Display Parking:

It is recommended to install Pay & Display parking on Fitzgibbon Lane.

Stat(s):

- 1. Install Pay & Display Parking on the east side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 14 meters north from the east corner of the Fitzgibbon Lane / Fitzgibbon Street junction, northwards for a distance of 9 meters.
- 2. Install Pay & Display Parking on the east side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 31 meters north from the east corner of the Fitzgibbon Lane / Fitzgibbon Street junction, northwards for a distance of 23 meters.
- 3. Install Perpendicular Pay & Display Parking on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 5 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 9.5 meters.
- 4. Install Hatched Markings on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 14.5 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 1.2 meters.
- 5. Install Perpendicular Pay & Display Parking on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 15.7 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 4.5 meters.
- 6. Install Hatched Markings on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 20.2 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 1.2 meters.
- 7. Install Perpendicular Pay & Display Parking on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 21.4 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 9.5 meters.
- 8. Install Double yellow Lines on the north side of Fitzgibbon Lane from a point 31 meters east from the west gable end of house no. 490 North Circular Road, eastwards for a distance of 10 meters.

NORTH EAST INNER CITY PROGRAMME OFFICE REPORT

The following are the main projects currently being actively progressed directly by the Programme Office under the 2017 funding allocation. To date there has been no formal announcement of 2018 funding.

NEIC Community Grants Scheme 2017 (€100,000 increased to €123,490)

An amount of €100,000 was specified in the 2017 allocation of NEIC funding for a Community Grants Scheme. A grant application and guidelines were drawn up by the Programme Office and the Scheme opened for applications on 25th September 2017. By the closing date of 1st November 2017 a total of 63 applications were received seeking a total amount of €265,345. An evaluation process took place on Wednesday 8th November. On completion of that process a total number of 37 applications were recommended to the Programme Implementation Board for approval at a total of €123,490. Following consideration, at their meeting held on Wednesday 29th November, the Board approved all 37 recommended applications. Approval was also given to supplement the original budget of €100,000 by the additional €23,490 required to award all grants. A full list of the successful applications is attached at Appendix 1.

Extension of An Garda Siochána CCTV System (€300,000)

The statutory processes required under the Garda Siochána Act 2005 for the supply and installation of approved extension and upgrade of the Garda Siochána CCTV system for DMR North Central Division have been completed. Work has commenced on the project which will deliver an additional 8 no. cameras in the Mountjoy District and 5 no. cameras in the Store Street District at key locations that were previously unmonitored by Garda CCTV. The project includes upgrade of the existing control room infrastructure to facilitate effective monitoring of the new cameras in HD quality. The total cost of the project including associated service level agreement is €252,018 plus VAT.

Target Street dealing blackspots incl. Rutland St. – Assertive Case Management 1 yr Pilot Project €55,000 (2018 cost €100,000)

Ana Liffey Drug Project in partnership with Dublin City Council and An Garda Siochána – 1 year outreach programme based on Assertive Case Management model is up and running since mid-September with focus on Rutland St., Railway St. and Sheriff St. The project is being overseen by a Management Committee comprising representatives of Dublin City Council, An Garda Siochána and HSE. The Ana Liffey Drug Project has been invited to make a presentation to the January meeting of the NEIC Programme Implementation Board on the work being carried out and progress to date.

Urgent Physical Improvement Works – Refurbishment Plan €692,170

Road re-surfacing works have been completed in recent weeks at Gardiner St. Upper / Mountjoy Sq. West, Gardiner Place and Fitzgibbon St. at a total cost of €640K.

Urgent roof replacement has been carried out at North Wall CDP at a total cost of €29,643.50 (funded 50/50 by Dublin City Council and NEIC). The urgent need for this work only came to light while other internal works, funded by Pobal, were being carried out at the facility.

Engaging local resident / projects to actively maintain environment €80,000 (Mulvey Action 4.3) – The Green Ribbon



 Green Ribbon Branded Vehicle has recently commenced operating in the NEIC area.

The objective of The Green Ribbon initiative is to work towards increased civic pride, prevention of litter, dog-fouling and illegal dumping. Reaction and co-operation has been very positive to date and plans are underway to carry out some PR activity at local level around this initiative to encourage buy-in and participation by local schools and community groups.

• Work carried out by the Green Ribbon team on waste ground at Spencer Dock.

The Green Ribbon environmental project in partnership with Sunflower Recycling is up and running. Further development work is taking place with Sunflower Recycling in association with PACE and the Larkin Centre for the Unemployed with a view to expanding the current small scale local environmental awareness, greening and maintenance projects to an NEIC wide initiative.

This proposed expansion will be subject to NEIC funding in 2018.



Greening Strategy for NEIC – Phase 1 €200,000

Dublin City Council Parks & Landscaping Services Department has commenced work on a Greening Strategy for NEIC area with three elements to be delivered in Phase 1.

- a) Strategy Document tender process completed, awarded to Áit Urbanism + Landscape.
- b) Refurbishment of Diamond Park tender process completed, awarded to Dermot Foley Landscape Architects. This project will now proceed to design stage and further funding will be sought to deliver it in 2018.
- c) Dorset St. Median design stage completed, works postponed until Spring 2018 due to Operation Freeflow.

Street Art – open call for proposals targeting blackspots €80,000

Following on from positive feedback on a number of street art / murals in the NEIC area Community Art Project Dublin Canvas have been engaged to prepare a brief for an open call for street artists to be assigned to further NEIC sites to be identified on an ongoing basis.

In the meantime a large scale project has been underway for several weeks in the Ballybough area to combine a community engagement process with provision of art work for the hoarding to be erected at the Oaklee social housing development due to commence on site at Poplar Row.

The art work is a large community mural consisting of animated caricatures of a various community groups based in the The caricatures will be Ballybough area. arranged around various elements from the Ballybough area including Community Centre, Pigeon Club, community garden and local school. The mural consisting of 45 panels will be over 63 metres long and 8 ft. high. The painting work has been taking place off site for several weeks and erection of the panels scheduled to be completed w/e 15/12/2017 and will remain in place for the duration of the construction works.

Shopfront Improvement Scheme – co-funded with shop owners €60,000

The scheme has been developed based on the successful model previously implemented in the South Central Area. It is being piloted in the NEIC area (Dorset St. in 2017). The scheme was rolled out with the assistance and co-operation of the local business group "Dubhlinn" in October 2017. Applicants were invited to avail of match funding of up to €3.000 per shop front. A total of eleven applications have been received to date. The total value of the proposed works is €66,336 with requests for funding totaling €32,000. An evaluation process will be carried out with a view to allocating funding to successful applicants by year end. Extension of the scheme to other NEIC streets will be subject to funding in 2018.

Internal alterations and extension to Lourdes Daycare Centre

A planning application (Reg. Ref. 4028/17) was lodged with Dublin City Council on 10th October 2017. Permission is sought for "single-storey extension (165.30 sq. metres) to rear and side (incorporating new sitting room, wet room, locker room and general store) alterations to site (north elevation & front elevation, internal alterations and ancillary site works." Last date for submission of observations was 13th November 2017 and a decision is due mid December. Subject to planning permission, 2018 funding will be required to deliver this project.

Sheriff St. (Rainbow Park) play area upgrade (€47,000)

A tender process has been completed by Dublin City Council Parks & Landscape Services Dept. for upgrade of play area at Rainbow Park, Sheriff St. Contract has been awarded and works incorporating a new play space design are scheduled to commence on site on 6th December. This project has been funded by NEIC from funds originally allocated for refurbishment of the Programme Office which will not now proceed in 2017.

Local Archive Folklore Project €20,000 (Mulvey Action 3.10)

The North Inner City Folklore Project is now based at Unit 1A The Forge, Railway St. on a 3 year Tenancy Agreement signed on 22/08/2017. Terry Fagan, Historian has moved archival material into the Unit. A Management Committee is in place and ongoing guidance and assistance, including some professional input, will be required to get up and running. A commitment has been given to fund the rental cost of Unit 1A however, additional ongoing funding will be required for development and running of the project. A submission has been made to the NEIC Programme Implementation Board in this regard.

Development of local sports, recreation, wellbeing programmes (€100,000)

An extensive programme of sport, recreation and wellbeing programmes has been developed in association with the Dublin City Sport & Wellbeing Partnership and Sport Ireland. An NEIC Fit4Life Open Day will take place on Friday 5th January 2018 at Larkin Community College to promote this Programme. Central Area Housing Report

Sean Smith, Area Housing Manager

Dominick Street Lower

A meeting was held in September with the residents to update them on where we are with the scheme. Detailed designs for 5-3 bed town houses, 67 apartments consisting of 5-3 bed, 50-2 bed and 12 1-bed units, a community facility and retail/commercial units with 47 car spaces at basement level on the eastern side of Dominick Street have been completed. The costings have been sent to the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government for approval to go to tender in December. The design team are working on the preparation of the tender documents. Once approved we expect to go to tender and be on site early in the New Year. LUAS Cross City will be launched on the 9th Dec.

Constitution Hill

An internal design team has been set up to make a submission to the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government on a recommendation for some new build and refurbishment of this complex. We expect to send the Stage 1 report the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government this month for approval.

Dorset Street & Saint Marys Terrace

The Department, after reviewing the consultant's report, has advised that the cost of refurbishment was so close to the cost of demolition and new build that they requested that this option be further developed. An internal design team is in place for new build and will seek permission from the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government for funding.

Saint Michan's House

The painting of St Michan's House is ongoing. 5 units in this complex are part of a pilot programme on condensation and are being worked on. The ground areas fronting onto the street have been successfully deep cleaned.

Sean Foster Place

The costings were approved by the department, we went to tender on the 14th Nov. The tender documents are due to be opened on the 15th December. I expect a contractor to be on site early next year, it should take approximately 18 months to build the complex. This programme is dependent on getting all necessary approvals.

Dominick Court

Upgrading of the windows and doors in this complex have commenced I expect all the windows on the dwellings facing Upper Dominick Street to be complete before Christmas.

Blessington Street

The deep cleaning of the granite on the façade of our dwellings on Blessington Street will commence in December.

Croke Villas

We continue to work with the remaining residents (in the first block) in anticipation of their transfer to their new homes. Work is continuing on the site at 2-6 Ballybough Road to deliver 7 new housing units. It is anticipated that these works will be complete in Quarter 4 2018.

St. Mary's Mansions

This projected completion date is March 2019

Ganson Building and Civil Engineering are now on site and early indication is that works will be completed on time.

Vacant site, Railway Street

Circle Voluntary Housing Association have finalised a proposed design for a new development of 38 Apartments on Railway Street.

Circle VHA appointed a design team in mid June 2017 and moved forward with design, planning, finance and construction. A topographical survey of the area has now been completed but it is expected to take some time before any construction works take place.

Ballybough House

Substantial improvement works continue to be carried out to the dwelling flats in this complex and to upgrade the physical environment and improve measures to tackle anti social behaviour.

- Upgrades included:
- New Public Lighting.
- Repairs of the stairwells and installation of new security doors/CCTV(now complete)
- New playground and Amphitheatre improvements and landscaping
- Painting Programme (Railings, Balcony Trims).
- Pilot programme of converting flats (2 into one in some cases) and new fit to increase the living space within the dwelling.

Works are complete on a new door entry system and we are costing replacement doors and windows in a situation whereby additional finance was secured.

We are currently examining the potential of reconfiguring 2 flats into 1 large unit thus creating larger living spaces within the complex. Once this work has been completed and a report produced, it will be brought to the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government for assessment with the view of upgrading all the dwellings as they become available.

We are also proposing to carry out precinct works consisting of the separation of each block by means of a wall & railings, and the provision of parking facilities, playgrounds, and green areas for each block.

Gloucester Place/Former IDA site

Construction work commenced in late February 2016 and the project is progressing very well and the project is in the final stage, including snagging and signing off and will be ready to populate in the very short term.

Castleforbes Square

All the dwellings have been allocated, under the City Councils' Allocation Scheme, and the complex enjoys full occupancy.

Vacant Site at Poplar Row

Works completion expected Q3 2019.

The City Council have hoarded off the site and improved the look through Artwork similar to the Mud Island hoarding.

Tom Clarke House

The Area Office and Housing Department are in the process of finalising the public domain improvements on site. The Area Housing Office have also installed automated vehicular gates & pedestrian gates to eradicate illegal parking and enhance the security for the Residents.

Summerhill (Older persons complex)

Funding has been given, under contract of service, to plant and clean (moss and weeding) the front area of Summerhill Senior Citizens complex with works staring on Wed 8th of November 2017. This, in conjunction with the open green area at the rear of the complex, ensures the Summerhill complex maintains it fine history of award winning flower display and gardens.

Brendan Behan Older Persons complex

Funding has been approved for the upgrading and refurbishment of the community room at Brendan Behan Older Persons complex. This includes new flooring and general repairs.

Saint Laurence O'Toole Court

The front garden area has been resurfaced with resin (on both side of railings), and the planting of flower beds and planters has been approved.

The construction of ramps, at the entry point of dwellings has been completed for wheelchair access. The communal room has been fitted with a new front door.

A new security gate has been constructed at the rear of the complex to stop the access and congregation of youths to the complex.

Oriel Street Older Persons units

The front garden has been resurfaced with resin, the fascia and soffit are being fully replaced.

Works have started to have the external frontage of the 8 dwellings cleaned and thereafter painted (which includes the gable doors, front windows and the railings (front and rear).

It has been proposed to have the bedding flowers and planters made available to residents that wish to avail of such gardening assistance.

Central Area Age Friendly Report - December 2017

The Central Area 'Technology & Over 55's Event' was held in the ILAC Library on the 15th November.  The Lord Mayor's 5 Alive Challenge is back for 2018! The initiative is a partnership programme between Dublin City Sport & Wellbeing Partnership and the Lord Mayor's Office.

The Challenge is in its 6th year and has encouraged hundreds of people to take up regular exercise over the past 5 years.

In 2018 we are going back to our roots and are looking for people who are interested in taking up jogging or those who have started and need some encouragement to keep it going. For 2018, we have also introduced Mentors - people who have completed the Challenge in previous years and who will run with slower joggers/ walkers and encourage them around the course.

The Challenge is to complete 5 Dublin road races –

<u>Tom Brennan Memorial 5k New Year's Day Road Race</u> on 1st January

<u>AXA Raheny 5</u> on 28th January

<u>BHAA</u> Garda Cross Country 2 Mile / 4 Mile on 3rd February

<u>MSB St. Patrick's Festival 5k Race and Family Fun Run</u> on 18th March

<u>BHAA Dublin City Council</u> 10k race on 7th April

If for some reason someone can't complete one of these races, they can substitute for one of the parkruns organised by <u>parkrun Ireland</u>.

Priority will be given to first timers and we also ask that people who can complete a 5k in under 30 minutes do not register for the Challenge and leave the spaces for those who need the support.

GAGA (Getting All Girls Active)

This is a 6-week sports programme for teenage girls from local schools. The programme content will be decided in consultation with the girls in an attempt to optimise participation. Suggested activities may include fencing, boxing, fun games, rugby, basketball, biking etc... There will be a citywide promotion of the programme on 13th December which will involve social media activation.







<u>List of Motions</u> 12th December, 2017

Motion in the name of Councillor Nial Ring

That this Committee instructs the Chief Executive to write to the Glasnevin Trust and ask if it their intention to include further names on the so called 1916 Memorial Wall in Glasnevin Cemetery and, if so, to detail what names are being considered for inclusion, and if public consultation will take place on any proposed addition of names.

Motion in the name of Councillor Nial Ring

That this Committee supports the submission made by me to the Seanad Public Consultation Committee in respect of its public consultation on the Status, Treatment and Use of the National Anthem. The main points made in the submission are as follows:

"http://scanmail.trustwave.com/?c=6600&d=0Y-c2i6VUliql4IAMs_Vu7nDkEvxCvOD94rnd5cygA&s=342&u=http%3a%2f%2f1%2eIn my opinion, there should be no changes made to either Irish or English version. I have read and heard of proposals to change wording to lessen the militaristic tone of the Anthem but, in deference to those who wrote and translated the Anthem, we should not interfere with their work.

Also, some people have quite mistakenly assumed that the first line of the chorus "Sine Fianna Fáil..." was written after the foundation of the Fianna Fáil political party in 1926 and that somehow the name of the fledgling party could have influenced his translation work. This is absolutely untrue as my Granduncle first worked on the translation in 1916 and completed his work before 1923, well before the foundation of Fianna Fáil.

- 1. The foregoing statement is not just based on family knowledge and lore (a daughter of Liam is still alive and well). Historian Ruth Sherry, in her article entitled "The Story of the National Anthem", published in History Ireland (Issue 1, Spring 1996) states that Liam Ó Rinn's translation was published in the army magazine, An tÓglach, on 3rd November 1923. More persuasive and significant is the fact that an almost identical text was printed in the Freeman's Journal on 3rd April 1923, under Ó Rinn's pen name "Coinneach".
- 2. The Government should issue guidelines on the use of the National Anthem. This, I believe, should be on the lines of the guidelines issues in relation to the National Flag. The guidelines should also include reference to standing at attention (and how to do so) when the National Anthem is being played. It is galling to observe sportsmen and sportswomen standing "at ease" or with arms around each other whilst the Anthem is being played. Simple guidelines on this would give the Anthem the due respect it deserves.
- 3. I would support the National Anthem being enshrined officially in legislation in the Irish language.
- 4. I would ask that the Committee strongly consider recommending that the National Anthem be made a compulsory part of the education curriculum and enshrined in legislation to ensure its implementation.
- 5. I would submit that the guidelines, if agreed and published, should be in booklet format and distributed to every household in Ireland.

6. The success of the presentation of the National Flag to every school in the country to commemorate/celebrate the 1916 Rising has been widely acknowledged. I would submit that the committee recommends a similar programme for the National Anthem".

I have circulated the full document I sent to the Committee separately but the above are my actual submissions. The Committee intends to hold public hearings on Tuesday 5th December and I have been invited to attend and contribute to this public hearing.

Motion in the name of Councillor Ciaran Cuffe

That this Committee expresses its concern about the delays in SICAP funding in the inner city and requests that the Senior Management Team resolve this issue without delay and ensure that the issues referenced in the Mulvey Report and elsewhere are resolved without further delay.
