I have read and heard of proposals to change wording to lessen the militaristic tone of the Anthem but, in deference to those who wrote and translated the Anthem, we should not interfere with their work.

Also, some people have quite mistakenly assumed that the first line of the chorus "Sine Fianna Fáil..." was written after the foundation of the Fianna Fáil political party in 1926 and that somehow the name of the fledgling party could have influenced his translation work. This is absolutely untrue as my Granduncle first worked on the translation in 1916 and completed his work before 1923, well before the foundation of Fianna Fáil.

1. The foregoing statement is not just based on family knowledge and lore (a daughter of Liam is still alive and well). Historian Ruth Sherry, in her article entitled "The Story of the National Anthem", published in History Ireland (Issue 1, Spring 1996) states that Liam Ó Rinn's translation was published in the army magazine, An tÓglach, on 3rd November 1923. More persuasive and significant is the fact that an almost identical text was printed in the Freeman's Journal on 3rd April 1923, under Ó Rinn's pen name "Coinneach".

2. The Government should issue guidelines on the use of the National Anthem. This, I believe, should be on the lines of the guidelines issues in relation to the National Flag. The guidelines should also include reference to standing at attention (and how to do so) when the National Anthem is being played. It is galling to observe sportsmen and sportswomen standing "at ease" or with arms around each other whilst the Anthem is being played. Simple guidelines on this would give the Anthem the due respect it deserves.

3. I would support the National Anthem being enshrined officially in legislation in

the Irish language.

4. I would ask that the Committee strongly consider recommending that the National Anthem be made a compulsory part of the education curriculum and enshrined in legislation to ensure its implementation.

5. I would submit that the guidelines, if agreed and published, should be in booklet format and distributed to every household in Ireland.

6. The success of the presentation of the National Flag to every school in the country to commemorate/celebrate the 1916 Rising has been widely acknowledged. I would submit that the committee recommends a similar programme for the National Anthem".

I have circulated the full document I sent to the Committee separately but the above are my actual submissions. The Committee intends to hold public hearings on Tuesday 5th December and I have been invited to attend and contribute to this public hearing.

Item 4

Motion in the name of Councillor Janice Boylan

That this Area Committee calls for a full investigation into the road layout and traffic light system at Hanlon's Corner on the North Circular Road due to the high level of near misses, crashes and residents concerns.

Report

It has been recommended to alter the traffic signals to allow an early cut off on North Circular Road westbound amounting to 6 seconds. This means that westbound traffic will be stopped 6 seconds prior to eastbound traffic. This will allow vehicles and cyclists to safely clear the junction eastbound including right turn movements while westbound traffic is stopped.

It has also been recommended to rescind the most westerly 6m of the yellow box opposite Annamoe road to allow cars to legally stop before the traffic lights. This should reduce the amount of westbound vehicles breaking the amber light.

IBAL report 2018

**Dublin City: 33rd out of 40 towns / cities surveyed.
Moderately Littered.**

A disappointing result given the improvement noted in the previous survey. There were some poor sites and these didn't become littered overnight – many have been subjected to long term abuse and neglect e.g. derelict sites on Mountjoy Street, Hanover Lane, Parnell Square West, Arran Quay Terrace and ESB Station on Francis Street. A relatively new feature within Dublin city are 'city mini-parks'. These are frequently sites which were wastelands and have been transformed into public spaces. While care has been taken with the presentation and maintenance of same (e.g. Corner of Brunswick Street North and Church Street Upper) it is a great pity to see some have been abused e.g. Corner of Capel Street and Ryders Row. The main shopping street areas of Henry Street, O'Connell Street and Grafton Street presented particularly well – not just clear of litter but very fresh in appearance. The Approach Roads scored very well - all got the top litter grade.

North Inner City Dublin: 37th out of 40 towns / cities surveyed. Littered.

A few areas within North Inner City Dublin deserve a mention as they have improved significantly. Some have improved over the last couple of years e.g. Sheriff Street Upper; and some have improved since the last survey e.g. Marino College of Further Education; Poplar Row; Laurence O'Toole Recreation Centre; a miscellaneous site beside the DCC offices on Sean McDermott Street was in a pretty bad state earlier in 2017 – the railings have been painted blue and it appears much cleaner. (it was not possible to include this site as there were two bus loads and people and their belongings spread on the pavement directly in front of the railings.) There was plenty of new signage (illustrated) related to dog fouling and some new looking No Dumping notices throughout the North Inner City Dublin. The Traffic Light Box Art looks great. The one Grade D site in North Inner City Dublin was the short residential area of Rutland Street, Lower – it was characterised by a carpet of litter and dumping. Charleville Mall was marginally better than IBAL Survey 1, 2017 but was still a seriously littered environment. Seville Place and North Circular Road (from Summerhill to Russell Street junction) were pretty poor, as was Oriel Street Upper.

The Mulvey report entitled “[Dublin North East Inner City - Creating a Brighter Future An Outline Plan for the Social and Economic Regeneration of Dublin’s North East Inner City](#)” was published in February 2017. The report set out four priority areas and an action plan for each area.

In June 2017, Mr. Michael Stone was appointed by the Government to the position of Chair the NEIC Programme Implementation Board (PIB). The first meeting of the Board took place on 28th June 2017. An allocation of €2.5M was approved in September for a range of projects across the four key priority areas. These projects are directly linked to delivery of actions identified in the Mulvey report and are currently underway under the aegis of the relevant Government Dept. / Agency and are being overseen by the Sub-Groups of the PIB. Croke Villas

We continue to work with the remaining residents (in the first block) in anticipation of their transfer to their new homes. Work is continuing on the site at 2-6 Ballybough Road to deliver 7 new housing units. It is anticipated that these works will be complete in Quarter 4 2018.

St. Mary's Mansions

This projected completion date is March 2019

Ganson Building and Civil Engineering are now on site and early indication is that works will be completed on time.

Vacant site, Railway Street

Circle Voluntary Housing Association have finalised a proposed design for a new development of 38 Apartments on Railway Street.

Circle VHA appointed a design team in mid June 2017 and moved forward with design, planning, finance and construction. A topographical survey of the area has now been completed but it is expected to take some time before any construction works take place.

Ballybough House

Substantial improvement works continue to be carried out to the dwelling flats in this complex and to upgrade the physical environment and improve measures to tackle anti social behaviour.

- Upgrades included:
- New Public Lighting.
- Repairs of the stairwells and installation of new security doors/CCTV(now complete)
- New playground and Amphitheatre improvements and landscaping
- Painting Programme (Railings, Balcony Trims).
- Pilot programme of converting flats (2 into one in some cases) and new fit to increase the living space within the dwelling.

Works are complete on a new door entry system and we are costing replacement doors and windows in a situation whereby additional finance was secured.

We are currently examining the potential of reconfiguring 2 flats into 1 large unit thus creating larger living spaces within the complex. Once this work has been completed and a report produced, it will be brought to the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government for assessment with the view of upgrading all the dwellings as they become available.

We are also proposing to carry out precinct works consisting of the separation of each block by means of a wall & railings, and the provision of parking facilities, playgrounds, and green areas for each block.

Gloucester Place/Former IDA site

Construction work commenced in late February 2016 and the project is progressing very well and the project is in the final stage, including snagging and signing off and will be ready to populate in the very short term.

Castleforbes Square

All the dwellings have been allocated, under the City Councils' Allocation Scheme, and the complex enjoys full occupancy.

Vacant Site at Poplar Row

Works completion expected Q3 2019.

The City Council have hoarded off the site and improved the look through Artwork similar to the Mud Island hoarding.

Tom Clarke House

The Area Office and Housing Department are in the process of finalising the public domain improvements on site. The Area Housing Office have also installed automated vehicular gates & pedestrian gates to eradicate illegal parking and enhance the security for the Residents.

Summerhill (Older persons complex)

Funding has been given, under contract of service, to plant and clean (moss and weeding) the front area of Summerhill Senior Citizens complex with works starting on Wed 8th of November 2017. This, in conjunction with the open green area at the rear of the complex, ensures the Summerhill complex maintains its fine history of award winning flower display and gardens.

Brendan Behan Older Persons complex

Funding has been approved for the upgrading and refurbishment of the community room at Brendan Behan Older Persons complex. This includes new flooring and general repairs.

Saint Laurence O'Toole Court

The front garden area has been resurfaced with resin (on both side of railings), and the planting of flower beds and planters has been approved.

The construction of ramps, at the entry point of dwellings has been completed for wheelchair access. The communal room has been fitted with a new front door.

A new security gate has been constructed at the rear of the complex to stop the access and congregation of youths to the complex.

Oriel Street Older Persons units

The front garden has been resurfaced with resin, the fascia and soffit are being fully replaced.

Works have started to have the external frontage of the 8 dwellings cleaned and thereafter painted (which includes the gable doors, front windows and the railings (front and rear)).

It has been proposed to have the bedding flowers and planters made available to residents that wish to avail of such gardening assistance.

Dominick Street Lower

Detailed designs for 5-3 bed town houses, 67 apartments consisting of 5-3 bed, 50-2 bed and 12 1-bed units, a community facility and retail/commercial units with 47 car spaces at basement level on the eastern side of Dominick Street have been completed. The costings have been sent to the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government for approval to go to tender in January. The tender documents are complete and we expect to go to tender by the end of the month.

Constitution Hill

An internal design team has been set up to make a submission to the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government on a recommendation for some new build and refurbishment of this complex. We expect to send the Stage 1 report the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government this month for approval.

Dorset Street & Saint Marys Terrace

The Department, after reviewing the consultant's report, has advised that the cost of refurbishment was so close to the cost of demolition and new build that they requested that this option be further developed. The Stage 1 report is down with Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government for approval of funding. Once approved, we will commence consultations with the local community and designs for Part 8 approval.

Saint Michan's House

The painting of St Michan's House is ongoing. 5 units in this complex are part of a pilot programme on condensation and are being worked on.

Fish Market Site
Contractor will start onsite January.

Sean Foster Place

The preferred bidder will be announced this month. Pending approval from the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local I expect a contractor to be on site in the next couple of months, it should take approximately 18 months to build the complex.

Dominick Court

Upgrading of the windows and doors in this complex has commenced.

O'Devaney Gardens

Construction works on 56 Social Housing units expected to commence Q1 2018. Efforts continue to source suitable alternative accommodation for residents in the five remaining occupied flats. Next Consultative Forum meeting will take place on 16th January 2018

Bricins Park

Flats shown to prospective tenants in advance of their completion. Units proving very popular and there will be no difficulty in letting. Handover of units in Phase 2 expected late January.

Aughrim Court

Landscaping works, financed under CAC Discretionary Funding, nearing completion.

Drumalee Court

Supply & installation of new locking mechanisms at entry points underway. Keys have been distributed to residents but it has been noted that some are choosing to leave vehicular gates open.

Motion in the name of Councillor Nial Ring

That this Committee, in recognising the status of 2018 as “Bliain na Gaeilge” agrees that Councillors and Officials should endeavour to promote the Irish language wherever possible in its meetings, communications, dealings with the public etc. As a first step the Central Area Office should have all signage in both Irish and English and an effort should be made to facilitate any member of the public who wishes to conduct their business through Irish.

This is to recognise his role, (like that of Peadar Kearney and Patrick Heeney who have had housing complexes named after them), in the National Anthem, Amhran na bhFiann, given that he, like Kearney and Heeney, was from the North Inner City.

Motion in the name of Councillor Ciaran Cuffe

That this Committee invites in the Office of Public Works, given that the Phoenix Park is used by many residents of the Stoneybatter area for recreation, to outline what they can do to improve facilities for pedestrians and cyclists in the park, such as introducing zebra crossings, junction improvements or reorganisation of cycling facilities given that several tragic collisions have taken place in the Park in recent years.
