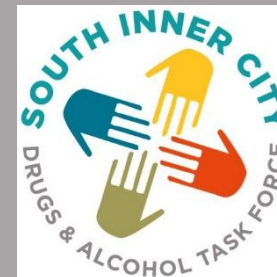

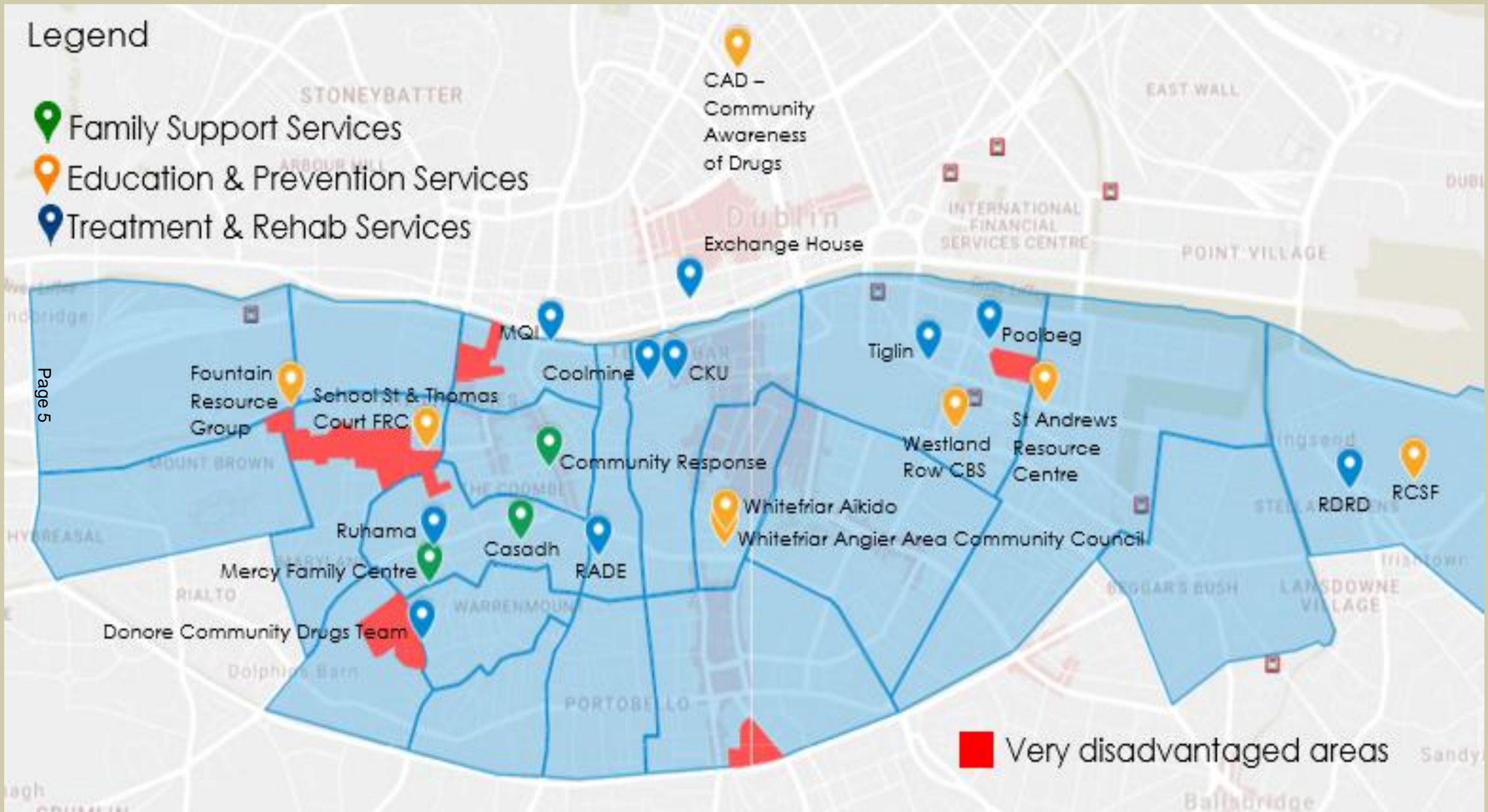

To monitor, evaluate and assess the impact of the funded projects and their continued relevance to the LDTF strategy and to recommend changes in the funding allocations as deemed necessary



Structures for the SICDATF Task Force

The Task Force is a committee with representation from public representatives, the statutory, voluntary and community sector.

The Task Force committee has a management liaison group who manage the operational budget and the day to day running of the committee.

Financial decisions are conducted through the HSE and the Drugs Policy Unit and adhere to the National Financial Regulation procedures.

Sub Groups of the Task Force

The SICDATF has identified four sub groups through an interagency meeting :

1. Service Provider Group
2. Strategic Support Group for services and service users
3. Community representatives group
4. Currently developing a peer led service user group

The groups reflect the membership of the Task Force , groups of interest and service providers . They were set up in June 2018 and are developing their work plans and membership .

Work achieved to date Feb – September 2018

- Renewed financial governance procedures and the Task Force will become a LTD to be compliant with the NFRs and HSE internal Audit
- Reconstitution of the sub committees and development of priority work
- Projects review has process commenced
- Community Grant scheme has been advertised and is being externally assessed
- Homeless In reach Pilot is now in its eighth month and is a successful interagency initiative

- Second Peer led training is taking place for both service users and family members – this is to build capacity for people to assist with the design and delivery of service provision as set down by the National Drug Strategy
- Training - projects will receive training to upskill staff and training will be designed specifically for service users and community interest groups
- Participation in IHREC grant process – all projects under SICDATF are working in partnership with the HSE to support the implementation of Public Sector Duty , section 42 – this is to build greater service user participation in the development in quality service provision and underpinned by Section 42

- Developing an interagency response to working with new communities , this will involve CKU counselling , Community Response and Mendicity
- Hepatitis C partnership and Community Response are working with the projects in the area to provide screening and support to those nagged in the national Hep C Project
- Developing a community consultation strategy.
- Working to restructure the service provision of RADE

- There have been 136 detections for the Sale/Supply of Drugs in 2018 as opposed to 207 for the same period last year, representing a decrease of 34%
- There have been 45 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2018 in comparison to 58 for the same period last year, a decrease of 22%
- There has been 1 Fatal Road Traffic Accident recorded in 2018.

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1309 Public Order Incidents are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 1148 incidents in 2017, showing an increase of 14%

- 193 Incidents of Drunkenness are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 184 in 2017, an increase of 5%
- 132 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm are recorded in 2018, as opposed to 126 in 2017, an increase of 5%
- 349 incidents of Minor Assault are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 369 in the same period last year showing a decrease of 5%

It should be noted that in any reference to statistics, those statistics are provisional, operational, liable to change and some possibly re-classified with the introduction of Central Statistics Office reports.

- There has been 49 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2018 as opposed to 31 for the same period last year, an increase of 58%.

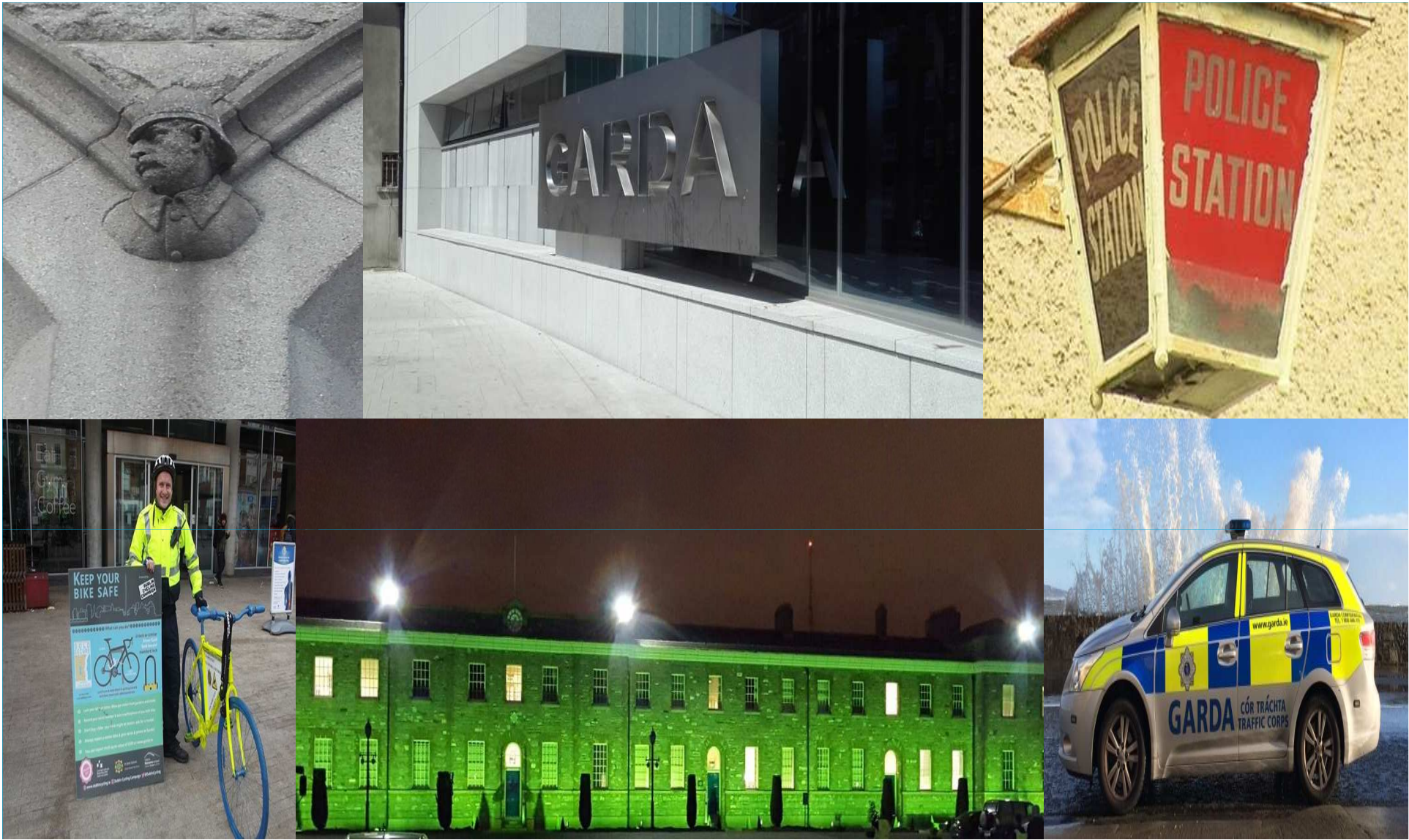
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There have been no Fatal Road Traffic Accidents recorded in 2018 (2 in 2017).

- 59 Public Order incidents are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 81 in 2017, a decrease of 27%.
- 15 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm are recorded in 2018 (13 in 2017).
- 57 incidents of Minor Assault are recorded in 2018 (65 in 2017, a decrease of 12%).

SUNDRIVE SUB-DISTRICT

- There has been 25 detections for the Sale/Supply of Drugs to date this year (16 in 2017).
- There have been 18 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2018 (17 in 2017).
- There have been no Fatal Road Traffic Accidents recorded in 2018 (0 in 2017).
- 40 Public Order incidents are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 54 in 2017, a decrease of 26%.
- 14 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm are recorded in 2018 (15 in 2017).
