MINUTES OF THE NORTH CENTRAL AREA JPC MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 15 OCTOBER 2018

1 Minutes of meeting held on 16th July 2018

Order: Agreed

2 Safety Forum Up-date:

Order: Elaine Mulvenny, Vanessa Carey and Deirdre Murphy updated the Committee on the local safety forums, Reports were circulated prior to the meeting.

Elaine updated the Committee on the Edenmore and Donaghmede local safety forums, an area of concern in Edenmore is the park and the NCA are funding reinstating boundary railings. The main concern in Donaghmede is the Dart station.

Vanessa Carey up-dated the forum on the Clongriffin/Belmayme forum. The Garda Clinic is now in operation on a Saturday morning in the Junction Clongriffin. This is open for members of the public to voice their concerns regarding local garda issues. The Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is well attended by residents from the area.

Deirdre Murphy updated the Committee on the Darndale/Belcamp/Moatview safety forum. There have been very positive developments in Darndale Park with increased usage, the 'Football Academy', the 'Park Run' and the 'Celebrity Football Matches' held on 8/9/18 are all proving to be hugely successful.

Illegal dumping remains an issue in Darndale with much of the dumping consisting of recyclable goods such as bottles and cans. Cllr. Mahon queried disposal of waste, Deirdre advised when the last compliance survey was carried out in the area, 90% of people were compliant, just because someone is compliant doesn't mean that they actually use their bin. Dave Dinnigan advised that Darndale will be used as a pilot programme to educate people with regards to illegal dumping, DCC will come back to the committee regarding this. Cllr O Toole spoke regarding a safe way for people to report illegal dumping in confidence. Cllr Lyons commended DCC with regards to all the really good work that has happened in the Darndale area. He queried if the guards were aware of the increased use of crack cocaine in the area, they weren't aware of an influx of the drug.

3 Garda report's:

Order: The Garda discussed the statistics for DMR North.

Superintendent Donnelly spoke about the Garda Clinic established at Clongriffin. Deputy Haughey queried if there was a demand for this station to be provided on a full-time basis. Chief Superintendent Curran advised he is not looking at it formally, he needs to talk to

the new Commissioner regarding his vision of policing, people want guards on the street not in stations. Garda Eoin Beatty, who co-ordinated the Edenmore Garda Clinic has been promoted, Cllr. O'Moore advised that the residents of Edenmore send their best wishes to Garda BeattyCoolock. Arrangements have been made to continue with the clinic operation by the Community Policing Unit. . Cllr Moran referred to an increase in antisocial behaviour in block 6 Cromcastle, Superintendent Donnelly will look into this.

Superintendent O'Connor advised crime is down in the area but there is an increase in burglaries. Cllr O'Muiri spoke about the anti-social behaviour in Collinswood and Thornwood, Superintendent O'Connor was not aware of an increase in anti-social behaviour in the area but will look into it.

Cllr. O'Toole requested an update on personnel at the next meeting, will there be a replacement for Inspector Healy and update on number of community guards.

4 Presentation on Drug Debt Intimidation - Inspector William Casey

Order: Inspector William Casey gave a presentation on Drug Debt Intimidation followed with a question and answers.

5 Halloween

Order: A report on Halloween was circulated prior to the meeting from Public Domain and Community. Dymnpa McCann, Public Domain Team DCC informed Committee that they will be co-ordinating removal of Bonfire material for the North Central Area and have Circulated the Emergency number 01- 6796186. The Public Domain Team will be on call Halloween weekend. The Litter Wardens contacted local shops regarding shopping trolley removal, they also contacted owners in the Industrial Estates to keep anything that can be used for bonfire material to be kept out of reach. Cllr MacDonagh asked for debris from the storm to be removed prior to Halloween. Cllr O' Toole spoke regarding the reduced amount of bonfire material coming from the factories and thanked DCC for the quick removal of same. Cllr O'Farrell asked could specialised mats be put down indicating where bonfires should be lit, Dympna McCann advised this is not common practice but she will discuss with Parks. Cllr Moran asked can there be school talks prior to Halloween to educate the children on the dangers of Halloween, Dympna McCann advised Fiona Moore carries out this Halloween programme to schools.

Ciaran O'Mahony, Community Development, DCC, spoke regarding the Halloween events in the NCA. Cllr's also asked for next year can there be additional venues in the NCA. Dave Dinnigan advised that events are held in places where there is more negative behaviour, it is not viable to have too many events. Ciaran O' Mahony advised Cllr's to contact him via e-mail with these details of possible new even venues

Update on Clongriffin Garda Clinic:

Order: The Garda Clinic is now in operation and open to the public on a Saturday morning in the Junction, Clongriffin.

- (A) Operation **Thor, Hybrid and Creeper** have contributed to operations, with designated checkpoints being carried out by both uniform and plain clothes units, which have helped in the detection of crime and high visibility policing throughout the **Raheny/Clontarf Sub-districts**
- (B) Investigations into major incidents are ongoing and there have been several successful operations, as well as **successful Court Prosecutions** in this quarter.
- (C) Anti-social behaviour is being tackled through Operation Irene which targets local amenity areas during the summer months and there are also several area's being designated as 'Hot Spots' and high visibility policing, whether it is members on foot patrol or on Mountain bike patrol have led to successful increase in Public Order detections throughout the District. School Talks are carried out with an emphasis being put on Cyber Bullying and for Juveniles to be aware of supports which are there if they find themselves victims of this type of crime. There also has being the implementation of a Garda Youth Development Project in the Kilbarrack/Raheny Area and the Donneycarney Area.

Call back initiatives have been put in place for persons who are victims of Burglary incidents, Domestic Violence incidents and Sexual Assault incidents. The victims of crime are visited and given crime prevention and security advice from members, this has proven to be quite successful and greatly appreciated by the persons' concerned. There also has been the implementation of a Pedal Cycle Identity Card which has proven to be very helpful in combating theft of Bicycle Crime.

An 'Older Person' strategy has also been developed and several Christmas parties were held throughout the District by Community Policing members.

- (D) There are **6 Garda Reserves** allocated to Raheny/Clontarf Sub Districts and Policing of amenity areas required an increase in Garda Resources at varying times in the summer to help Police the area.
- (E) There is **1 Sergeant and 5 Gardai** attached to Community Policing and they have all Neighbourhood watch schemes in operation in their designated areas, they are all ELO trained and Mountain Bike Operatives. Each member is involved in Community Engagement initiatives throughout the District.

Hi Karen,

In general, Dublin Fire Brigade has a very good relationship with An Garda Síochána.

Your question specifically refers to incidents that occur around Hallow'een. It is important to remember that, in the Dublin area, Hallow'een has some cultural significance typically manifested by groups of individuals holding bonfires. In the main, most of these will pass without incident. Where members of the public are worried and call 999/112, Dublin Fire Brigade will respond appropriately. This will include a District Officer who will travel to the incident location to assess the fire. If the fire is endangering life or property, the District Officer will instruct Dublin Fire Brigade crews to extinguish the fire and make the area safe. If there is no danger to life or property, the District Officer may decide not to take any action at that time.

Officers at various levels from Dublin Fire Brigade and An Garda Síochána meet on a regular basis throughout the year to discuss issues of mutual interest. In relation to Hallow'een, the local DFB District Officer, supported by the DFB Third Officer, would have arranged a meeting with the relevant Garda Inspector well beforehand. Where An Garda Síochána have intelligence to suggest anticipated antisocial activities in a particular area, they will notify the District Officer and discuss possible responses. These might include;

- Taking no action provided there is no danger to life or property
- Taking no action at the time but returning later after antisocial activity has ceased
- Taking action under the protection of An Garda Síochána

It is normal to find that Hallow'een revelry begins to quieten down around 01:30 or 02:00. At that time, Dublin Fire Brigade and An Garda Síochána will consult, identify ongoing fires and take appropriate action.

In all cases the Officer in Charge of the Dublin Fire Brigade response will prioritise the safety of his/her crew. In cases where large groups have congregated, such as that noted by Cllr Brabazon, the Officer in Charge might well decide to retreat to a safe location and await the arrival of members of An Garda Síochána before taking action.

We will ensure discussions with An Garda Síochána in relation to Hallow'een 2019 include assessments on activities near the green between Howth View Park and St Donagh's.
