- There has been 1 Murder recorded in the previous 12 months (Pearse Street - March 2021). This Murder has been detected.
- There has been 176 detections for the Sale/Supply of Drugs in 2021 as opposed to 322 for the same period in 2020, a **decrease** of 45%
- There has been a total of 68 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2021 in comparison to 72 arrests for the same period in 2020, a **decrease** of 6%. Out of the 68 arrests so far in 2021, **32** are for Drug Driving Offences.
- There has been 2 Fatal Road Traffic Collisions recorded in 2021 (April 2021 & November 2021).
- 1534 Public Order Incidents are recorded in 2021, as opposed to 1505 incidents in the same period last year, showing an **increase** of 2%
- 265 Incidents of Drunkenness are recorded in 2021, as opposed to 260 in the same period last year, an **increase** of 2%
- 155 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm are recorded in 2021, as opposed to 119 in the same period last year, an **increase** of 30%
- 295 incidents of Minor Assault were recorded in 2021 as opposed to 281 in the same period last year showing an **increase** of 5%
