MINUTES OF THE NORTH CENTRAL AREA JPC MEETING

HELD ON MONDAY 16 JANUARY 2023

1 Minutes of Meeting held 17th October 2022

Councillor Brabazon gave apologies as he will be late to meeting & requested Councillor O'Toole to chair however as Councillor O'Toole was having difficulties logging on Councillor Cooney agreed to chair until his arrival.

2 Drug Intimidation Update

Presentation given by Detective Inspector John Moroney. Councillor Lyons asked if statistics for DMR North were available at a local level & asked if they could be compared from city to county. Detective Inspector Moroney advised that these statistics are done on a divisional basis and this intimidation is in every community across the city and county. Councillor Heney thanked him for his work and presentation and asked as a result of the DRIVE programme are the perpetrators being examined and if so what's the result going to be used for? Could it be a pilot project between An Garda Siochana, stakeholders & Dublin City Council to target people falling into this criminality. Detective Inspector Moroney said that children from a young age need to be educated that drugs lead to criminality and the consequences of this.

Councillor Batten wanted to know what the rationale was around this unit being placed in Clontarf when needed in other areas more. It was said that this behaviour is in all areas of society and at present Clontarf has all the facilities that are needed however this facility will cover the division of DMR North.

Councillor O'Muiri raised concerns in relation to vaping from a young age leading into drug use and the sale of drugs on social media also the lenient sentence being given to individuals convicted of intimidation. Detective Inspector Moroney said that the sentence mentioned was considered good due to no previous convictions and that children are pushing the boundaries to next stage once they have tried vaping, in relation to social media this is mainstream.

Deputy O' Riordan has had constituents that are too afraid to go to the Gardai so they go to their credit union instead however this is not a solution as Detective Inspector Moroney said it does not make the issue go away. It was suggested by Deputy O'Riordan that the issues raised at the meeting be fed into the planned Citizens Assembly on Drugs which is being held later this year.

Councillor Cooney mentioned that while on her weekly clean ups in Clontarf that the area has a lot more vapes and canisters being dumped.

Councillor Gilliland said it should be on primary & post primary curriculum to make children aware of the impact drugs including vapes can have on mind & body as

well as family and that not all people come out the other side.

Councillor Roe requested contact information be shared with all Councillors for them to be able to forward to constituents and suggested credit union be issued with these numbers also for members who are in need.

Chief Superintendent Curran thanked Detective Inspector Moroney and his team for great work and dedication to each case. He advised for anyone who may find themselves in this situation to contact the Gardai in order for them to gain intelligence on these individuals.

3 Crime Prevention Update

Sergeant Kenny gave an update on the role of the crime prevention officer and advised anyone looking for information to first contact the local Garda station who would feed all information through, they can do this by contacting the following: <u>ballymun_ds@garda.ie</u> <u>coolock_ds@garda.ie</u> <u>raheny_ds@garda.ie</u>

He advised all of us to ensure we are all aware of our surroundings and advised that all Gardai can be identified by the their shoulder number which may start with a H J or R followed by a number. Both Councillor O'Farrell & Councillor Heney raised concerns in relation to personal safety especially at the new Clontarf to City Centre bike scheme at Fairview Park which is very enclosed and hemmed in, Sergeant Kenny asked that they both send their concerns directly to him following meeting.

Councillor Cooney asked has the number of bike thefts increased and can a registration number be an option to prove ownership? Sergeant Kenny advised that bike shops have been asked to record frame numbers and that there are places that you can have the bike engraved.

4 Implementation Oversight Group

Update given by Dympna Mc Cann who advised Darndale together.ie has gone live since our last meeting October 2022, this along with Darndale together on social media (facebook/Instagram) highlights all services in the area and what is happening, it also allows for feedback to establish how or what can be improved. Dympna was pleased to say that Primrose Anti-dumping is complete and a contractor has been employed to work with the residents in the coming months. A newsletter has been circulated and they are currently in the process of preparing the progress report for 2022 which will also be circulated.

Councillor Cooney thanked Dympna for her great work and said it was very positive that people could feed back into this project.

Councillor Lyons said the consistent engagement of all stakeholders has been key in this working group and would like to acknowledge and commend Dublin City Council in achieving results but not to forget the illegal dump in Belcamp still requires action.

Councillor O'Toole thanked both Dympna & Jack Nolan in steering this group.

5 **CCTV**

Derek Farrell is currently working with Superintendent Ronan Barry in relation to Section 38. A procurement document for the maintenance contract in Darndale has gone out & it is hoped to have a new camera on the illegal dump soon. At present the new bill in relation to CCTV is in front of the Oireachtas but this has not yet been passed.

Councillor O'Muir asked who is following up on the CCTV on the perimeter of St Annes Park now that Bernie Roe has left. Derek Farrell advised Councillor O'Muiri that he would look into this but wanted to remind everyone that the bill has not yet been enacted. Councillor Cooney said that this was an Act not a Bill which was awaiting the implementation.

6 Garda Reports

Councillor O'Toole advised the committee that he had to go and asked fellow councillors if one could take over, Councillor Gililand agreed.

Santry – Superintendent Darren Mc Carthy gave update. Cllr Batten asked was he aware of the increase in attempted burglaries in the Santry/Beaumont area which Superintendent Mc Carthy advised he was and that extra gardai were on beat since before Christmas.

Raheny/Clontarf – Superintendent Ronan Barry gave update and advised that he would be covering both Clontarf & Coolock areas in the interim until someone was appointed to Superintendent Kennedy's place as he has moved to Detective Superintendent. He assured everyone that both he & Superintendent Kennedy were still working closely together. It was suggested by Superintendent Barry that a brief presentation maybe given at next meeting on Domestic Violence. Councillor O'Farrell asked why it was the local station who investigate historical spiritans to which it was confirmed by Detective Inspector Moroney that it's on a national level however this would be done locally.

Councillor Cooney raised concerned in relation to graffit/tagging. Superintendent Barry said there is a surveillance on graffiti and bringing the culprits to justice re the TAG system which is collated in Raheny and is communicated throughout the country.

Councillor Heney wanted to thank the four Gardai who she had to call over the Christmas period and said they were top class.

7 New Garda Station

Chief Superintendent Curran advised the committee that unfortunately there is no update on this but assured everyone that it was at a high Chief Executive & Commissioner level. He thanked Dublin City Council who have been very helpful on this matter and advised that as soon as there is any more information he will bring this back to committee.

8 **AOB**

Cllr Cooney raised concerns in relation to intimidation of refugees protests being held around the city to which Chief Superintendent Curran advised that the protests recently in Ballymun were all peaceful protests and no problems have arisen to date however An Garda Siochana will continue to patrol and ensure these are just protests.

Catherine Cahill welcomed Nicko Murphy onto the committee as Linda Hayden's replacement from the Belcamp Village Centre.

Councillor Brabazon thanked Councillor Cooney, Councillor O'Toole & Councillor Gilliland for agreeing to chair the meeting in his absence.

Illegal Dump

DK noted

- Other than the movement of soil on site, the laboratory results do not show any significant difference from the results contained in the original assessment reports, and it has been clarified that all of the material is suitable for disposal to an authorised site in Ireland in accordance with EPA guidelines
- The report noted some areas of invasive species in identifiable areas which should be kept segregated and extracted separately during the removal of waste from the site.
- Intact asbestos sheeting was identified on site and it is recommended that this bulky waste be separated and removed at the start of the process of clearing the site in an appropriate manner and in accordance with Health & Safety Guidelines.
- Soil samples showed detection of among others, arsenic, copper, zinc and mercury which are naturally occurring in soil. However the concentrations

reported were below the relevant Generic Assessment Criteria (GAC) for human health.

In summary, tested results showed that all of this material can be disposed of in an environmentally sound manner and in accordance with EPA guidelines.

CLONGRIFFIN BELMAYNE FORUM

Clongriffin Belmayne Forum meets every two months in the Junction, 11 Station Square, Clongriffin. There is a very good attendance at the Forum by local community, public representatives, Coolock Gardai and Dublin City Council North Central staff. Declan Cahill the Independent Chair of the Forum has stepped down.

The last Forum meeting was held on 27th March, 2023 where most of the meeting revolved around discussions relating to taking in charge in Belmayne and Clongriffin. Deputy Cian O'Callaghan proposed that taking in charge be a recurring item on the Agenda, this was seconded by Cllr. Michael MacDonncha.

Gannon Homes update:

Susan McClafferty from Gannon Homeas advised that the taking in charge process is still underway for Main Street, Clongriffin. The various services divisions from DCC are in regular contact and all are eager for this to be completed.

There was a discussion regarding taking in charge and requests from residents for works to be carried out regarding footpaths/signs and replacing speed bumps on Marsfield Avenue. Susan advised all footpaths/signs etc. were constructed as per planning requirements. The speed bumps on Marsfield Avenue were temporary and not included in original planning requirements. Gannons will not be replacing them as there is currently a package in place with DCC Taking in Charge and they will not receive funding for any additional works.

- The remaining sites Gannon's have, with planning permission (up in 2024) are for sale and are currently with the Legal Team.
- Park and ride no update when it will be reopening, still awaiting parts to complete ongoing works.
- There is still no interest from the large Supermarket chains in taking space in Clongriffin due to insubstantial footfall.
- Smart Properties look after the retail units for Gannon Homes.

Susan advised people to e.mail <u>info@gannonhomes.ie</u> if they have any queries/complaints.

Garda Update:

Garda Brian Judge advised the forum that from Wednesday 19th April the Garda Clinic which was previously held in the Junction in Clongriffin on a Saturday morning would now be held each Wednesday in both Clongriffin and Belmayne as follows -

Wednesday 7 - 8 pm Junction, Clongriffin and

Wednesday 8.15 - 9.15 pm Cluid HUB Building, Belmayne Main Street.

Garda Judge provided an update on safety/security issues. They again encouraged people who have Japanese import cars to park them underground or in an area that has good lighting, as these

cars are very easy to steal, they reflect the high number of criminal damage figures for Belmayne (8) for period 01/02/23 to 26/03/23.

The guards strongly emphasised that the message needs to go out 'that people need to ring to report suspicious activity'. They can either ring 999 or Coolock Station.

DARNDALE TOGETHER SAFETY FORUM UPDATE FOR THE APRIL 2023 MEETING OF THE JPC MEETING

Domestic Abuse Co Ordination update

- MR gave a comprehensive update on the DACT initiative to tackle domestic abuse (and other crimes committed in the home) in the communities they police.
- Domestic Abuse Co-ordination Team (DACT) involves gardaí identifying those most at risk from domestic violence or who are subjected to ongoing abuse and allocating a liaison garda to that person or family.
- If a number of different gardaí respond to numerous incidents involving the same person, that victim is guaranteed one specially trained garda who is tasked with co-ordinating all their cases and offering guidance and support.
- Members of DACT are trained to understand the difficulties faced by victims and to offer them support, access to other services and agencies and the guarantee of an understanding and empathetic reception when a case of domestic abuse is reported.
- This team will advise victims of the abuse of their rights and how to get a protection or barring order.
- All of the 24 gardaí involved had volunteered for the project and had a keen interest in making sure any victims of abuse get a really good service from the gardaí.
- > COS noted support is provided for the injured party
- Vested interest in protecting most vulnerable-knock on effect on children
- > JN noted ACE programme will help children- safety in their homes
- > AG noted Aoibhneas give talks on awareness of DACT team etc

• Citizens Commissioner project

- This exciting pilot project is being led by Ruairí Ó Cúiv, the Public Art Officer in Dublin City Arts Office, and will result in a series of commissions in the area informed by residents.
- A key part of the process is exposing locals to various art forms to ignite the imagination and start a dialogue about what commissioned work they would like to see in Darndale.

- Enda Walsh's *The New Electric Ballroom*, Thurs 23 February 2023;

- After each of these experiences, they will meet with the participants to discuss what they did/did not respond to, which will inform subsequent engagements. The project will unfold over the coming years with "taster commissions" along the way, leading to one large-scale commission towards the end of the project.

Housing

Housing Projects –

Five housing projects taking place in the area and working closely with the project managers in relation to the effective management of these projects.

Current Projects:

- Glin Court: Awaiting stage 4 approval from the Department. Public open information evening was held on the 9th February in the Glin Centre. Local residents and Councillors were notified by leaflet drop/email/post. The contractor is due on site March 2023. Have approval for demolition of two of the existing three blocks and construction of 32 new older person units. Plan can be viewed in the Housing Office, Bell Building.
- Cromcastle Court/Coal yard site: Awaiting stage 2 approval. Part eight planning mid--2023. Achieve Planning Approval – late 2023. Procurement/tender of contract -2024. Onsite 2025. Plans show for 114 units of 1, 2 and 3 bed units, with a further 34 older person units on the coal yard site. 100% social housing.

- Belcamp B: The Contractor is due on site Q1 2023, 12 units. AHB to take over project
- Bunratty: The contractor is currently working on rectifying issues in order for the works to meet building regulations. Awaiting a completion date from the contractor. Handover will be in a phased approach. Expected handover Q3 2023
- Oscar Traynor: Glenveagh have been selected to partner with DCC. Planning permission sought for 853 units. 40% social housing, 40% cost rental, 20% affordable. Contractor due on site Q4 2023 with a view to the first houses being completed by late 2024
- Currently working on improving relationships between local residents and DCC. Members from The Darndale Together Community Representative Forum, work closely with DCC to influence improvements in the safety, health, happiness and wellbeing of each member of the Darndale community. Monthly meetings take place.
- Work closely with Community Gardaí, to resolve issues raised by Jack Nolan at the Darndale Together Safety Form and all aspects of antisocial behaviour. Decrease in reports of antisocial behaviour and oy riding in Darndale.
- Regular meetings with The Dales/Sphere 17 and youth in the community to try tackle antisocial behaviour/drug use with the under 18's
- Ongoing Improvement works are taking place in the public realm, fencing, gates, security measures, barriers etc.
- Voids: 44 + 4 senior citizens
- Working on our Antisocial behaviour strategy, and continuing to enforce DCC;s Tenancy agreement
- Waste Management and Environment
- Area close to 189 Buttercup Park cleaned and power washed by the Waste Management Team on 10th February & green area was cleaned by the Parks Department
- The dark grey walls along the spine site were painted again to remove the scorch marks.
- An email and a whats app message was sent to groups in the Darndale area who are involved in Environmental work letting them know about the 2023 Dublin City Neighbourhoods Competition. We advised everyone that the applications will be available in April 2023 in either digital or hardcopy and if anyone needs help putting an application together, they can contact the North Central Area Office.
- Refurbished planters will be delivered to Tulip Court in the next week or two to enhance this area as local residents are keeping it looking so well. These will be placed on the central median in the cul de sac and residents are going to water, weed and maintain the boxes.
- Continue to work with residents in all areas of Darndale who are interested in engaging in environmental work and we are happy to supply equipment and will consider supporting any enhancement ideas that they have (dependent on available funding).

The majority of issues raised were around road sweeping requests and dumping in Donaghmede Park in particular the green open space running between Grange Road and Howth Junction Dart Station.

Representatives from Irish Rail attended the January meeting and updated the forum about proposed internal works for Howth Junction Dart station e.g. temporary resurfacing of the footbridge and installation of grip tape at the entrance of the station

Questions around e-scooters, scramblers and "fast gas" usage in the Donaghmede area were raised with the Community Gardaí.

The next meeting is scheduled for 10th of May 2023.

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
