1. Minutes of the meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> October 2022

The Chair advised the Group that Codling Windfarm, a project off the coast at Greystones have been in contact with a view to presenting to the SPC as it is anticipated that the generated electricity will be landed at or near the Poolbeg SDZ

6. Posters Protocol (Protocol Attached)

The Chair informed the Committee that the Protocol was referred back from the City Council seeking additional changes / information

7. Climate Action Update, Liam Bergin, Executive Manager & Sabrina Dekker, Climate Action Co-Ordinator

Members thanked Sabrina for the report and raised the following questions issues

- Where are the main challenges for the Council to achieve carbon neutrality
- Is there further information on the collaboration with Belfast City Council
- What is the position in relation to retrofitting social housing flat complexes
- Did the City Council have representation at Sharm el Sheikh (COP27)
- Has COP27 made a difference to this report
- What linkage is there with this SPC and the Dublin / Belfast Economic Corridor
- Is it possible to have a presentation from an attendee at the COP27 conference
- Can a distinction on the "ongoing" status of the actions be made, i.e. where exactly the actions are at?
- What is the position on the 100 Climate Neutral Cities

#### Sabrina Dekker / Liam Bergin responded

- The main challenges lie in the transport area.
- Ireland will be signing up to the Integrated Carbon Inventory System which will ensure carbon monitoring
- The Departmental guidelines on retrofitting are being followed
- A block of social housing flats has been identified for retrofitting it is likely to be a year before work commences
- The purpose of the Belfast collaboration is to promote circular economy initiatives
- The City Council was not represented at COP27
- The City Council expression of interest for 100 Climate Neutral Cities was accepted.
- Should have more detail on 100 Climate Neutral Cities early next year.
- To achieve a circular economy it is necessary to link in with the Dublin / Belfast Economic Corridor Group
- Not sure in COP 27 added additional urgency
- Frank McGovern from the IPA attended COP27 and can be asked to present to the Committee

8. Bulky Household Waste Collection Service – Richard Whelan, Administrative Officer

9. Litter Bin Sensor Project Trial - Barry Woods, Senior Engineer

Members thanked Barry for his presentaion and raised the following question / issues

- Will the changes in work practices be problematic
- Where will the trial take place
- The routes identified, are they high footfall or suburban
- Will bins in parks be included
- What is the project timeline
- Could a map be provide on the Citizen Hub where members of the public can report full / overflowing bins

#### Berry Woods responded

- Discussions are ongoing with work representatives / unions which are progressing well so far.
- Two routes are being trialled 1 on the Northside and 1 on the Southside
- Will revert to members with streets involved.
- Where there is high footfall bins are emptied daily, the trial will cover areas where emptying is not required on a daily basis.
- We hope to commence the trial before Christmas
- The sensors are being fitted next week
- Every litter bin has a QR code which when scanned can be reported as needing attention

10. Seagulls litter nuisance – Barry Woods Senior Engineer

Members thanked Barry for his report and raised the following questions / issues

- Happy that an attempt is being made to address this issue
- Not sure the bag option will work
- Has underground waste collection infrastructure been considered
- Could the trial also include domestic customers
- Will the new system provide for waste segregation
- What happened to the collapsible bin proposal
- Can Talbot Street be included in the pilot area.
- It is important the domestic customers are included in the trial
- Concerned that the bag concept will be a cause of litter rather than a solution
- Underground waste infrastructure is very successful in other European Cities
- There should be consultation with disability groups
- Who will provide the gull bags.
- Any communication should not blame the problem on wilklife

#### Barry Woods responded

- It is difficult to put waste collection infrastructure underground owing to the amount of services already in situ
- We will look at bags / caddies for dry recyclables / food waste
- We will examine the inclusion of domestic customers
- The trial is being run in conjunction with waste operators Page 4

- There will be communication from DCC and the Waste Operators
- Caple street has been picked for the trial
- We will look at Talbot Street
- The Waste Collectors logo will be on the gull bags

The Nuclear Energy Conference (NEC) has been held annually since 2014, alternating between Prague and Linz, and is dedicated to a special thematic focus each year. It originated from an initiative of the Antiatom-Offensive of the province of Upper Austria and is organized by antinuclear organizations from the Czech Republic and Austria. On Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> May the yearly Nuclear Energy Conference will be held in Linz, Austria, for the 10<sup>th</sup> time.

Theme this year will be "Brave New Atomic World?", and is about the acclaimed contribution that nuclear energy can bring to CO<sub>2</sub> reduction.

Subject: CNFE Mail: Germany is nuclear free.

Dear Mayor, dear Councillor, dear Colleague,

From today, Saturday 15th April, Germany is nuclear free.

Today, the three reactors, Isar 2, Neckarwestheim 2 and Emsland will be powered down for the final time, after a temporary operational extension granted last Autumn by the coalition government. They were originally scheduled for closure at the end of 2022, but anxieties over national energy supplies, increased by the ongoing conflict in Ukraine and the disruption of Russian gas, led to a temporary delay.

The closures represent the conclusion of the phase-out from nuclear power, first initiated by former German Chancellor Angela Merkel, following the 2011 Fukushima nuclear power plant disaster.

Our CNFE Chairman, Vienna's Executive City Councillor Jürgen Czernohorszky said:

"We believe Germany has taken an important step. It is based on reason and facts and demonstrates that a mayor industrial country has no need for nuclear energy, with all its costs and hazards. We hope that more countries will follow Germany's example to achieve the ultimate goal of a nuclear free Europe."

With Germany, 15 of the 27 European Union's countries are nuclear free. Spain and Belgium postponed their phase-out, but will hopefully follow the german example soon.

We are happy to receive also congratulations from our partner organisation Nuclear Free Local Authorities. Councillor Lawrence O'Neill, Chair of the UK/Ireland NFLA, said:

"The NFLA would like to send our warmest congratulations to anti-nuclear colleagues in Germany, especially amongst our partners in Cities for a Nuclear Free Europe, for their efforts over many years in achieving this milestone. In the UK, we still have some way to go, but we remain optimistic that we shall also get there."

We gladly forward these congratulations to our German member cities and regions, who have been fighting for this day.

#### FOCUS AREA 1 MUNICIPAL COMMERCIAL WASTE

#### Purpose

Promote prevention and better segregation of commercial waste.

#### **Targeted Policies**

#### TP1.1

Identify and promote new means, methods and key drivers of sustainable consumption practices to reduce waste generation.

#### TP1.2

Ensure that all non-household municipal waste settings adopt best practice on waste segregation and are serviced with a segregated waste collection system to maximise the quantity and quality of materials collected.

#### TP1.3

Strengthen the monitoring and accurate measurement of non-household municipal waste flows.

#### TP1.4

Implement appropriate engagement and /or enforcement measures in response to noncompliances identified.

#### TP1.5

Promote the consistent application of an appropriate incentivised charging system for non-household municipal waste, through awareness and enforcement.

#### What is it?

Municipal commercial waste is mixed waste which is similar in nature and composition to waste from households and includes food waste.

#### Priority Actions (Responsibility)

#### PA1.1 (LAS)

Develop and deliver targeted awareness campaigns and projects to improve behaviours on prevention, reuse and repair in non household settings.

#### PA1.2 (LAS)

Enhance the capture of data from waste collectors for non-household settings through the National Waste Collection Permit Office.

#### PA1.3 (LAS/Ind.)


Investigate the potential for a sustainable waste management assurance scheme for business consistent with the transition to a circular economy.

#### PA1.4 (LAS)

Engage with businesses through local authority structures to promote consistent practices with regard to the management of commercial waste using measures including the MyWaste.ie business tools.

#### PA1.5 (LAS)

Ensure the consistent and targeted application of waste storage and presentation bye-laws to improve participation and segregation practices and incorporate into the RMCEI process.

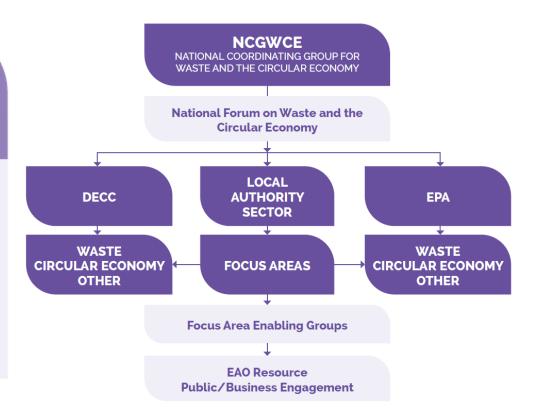
