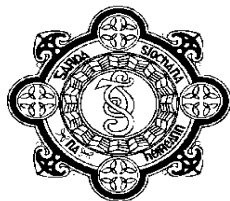

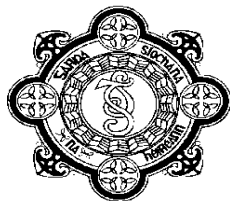

<p><b>Crime Prevention Matters and Other Information</b></p>	<p>Gardaí once again carried out operations on the Public Transport network. This is done in co-operation with our colleagues in Mountjoy and Bridewell, along with external stakeholders from Luas and Iarnród Éireann.</p> <p>Community Policing Cabra took part in the St. Patrick's Day celebrations and worked in the city centre ensuring everyone had a safe and enjoyable day.</p> <p>Community meetings continue with local resident groups. A particular area of concern is the unlawful use of scrambler bikes. New legislation is being used to tackle this behaviour, with a number of vehicles seized by Gardaí in Cabra. Work is ongoing to identify other homes where offenders are storing their vehicles, with a view to seizing same.</p> <p>Community Policing members are working closely with local businesses in an effort to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour. This is most evident in the Maple Centre with the number of calls for service notably reduced.</p> <p>Community Policing from Cabra Garda Station attended this Northwest Dublin Partnership Older Persons Information Fair. This Information Fair took place at the Cabra Parkside Community Sports Centre, Dublin 7, on the 10th April 2024.</p>

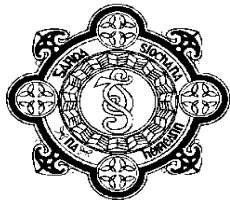

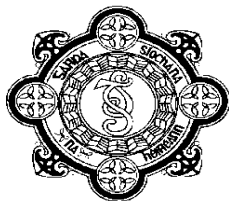

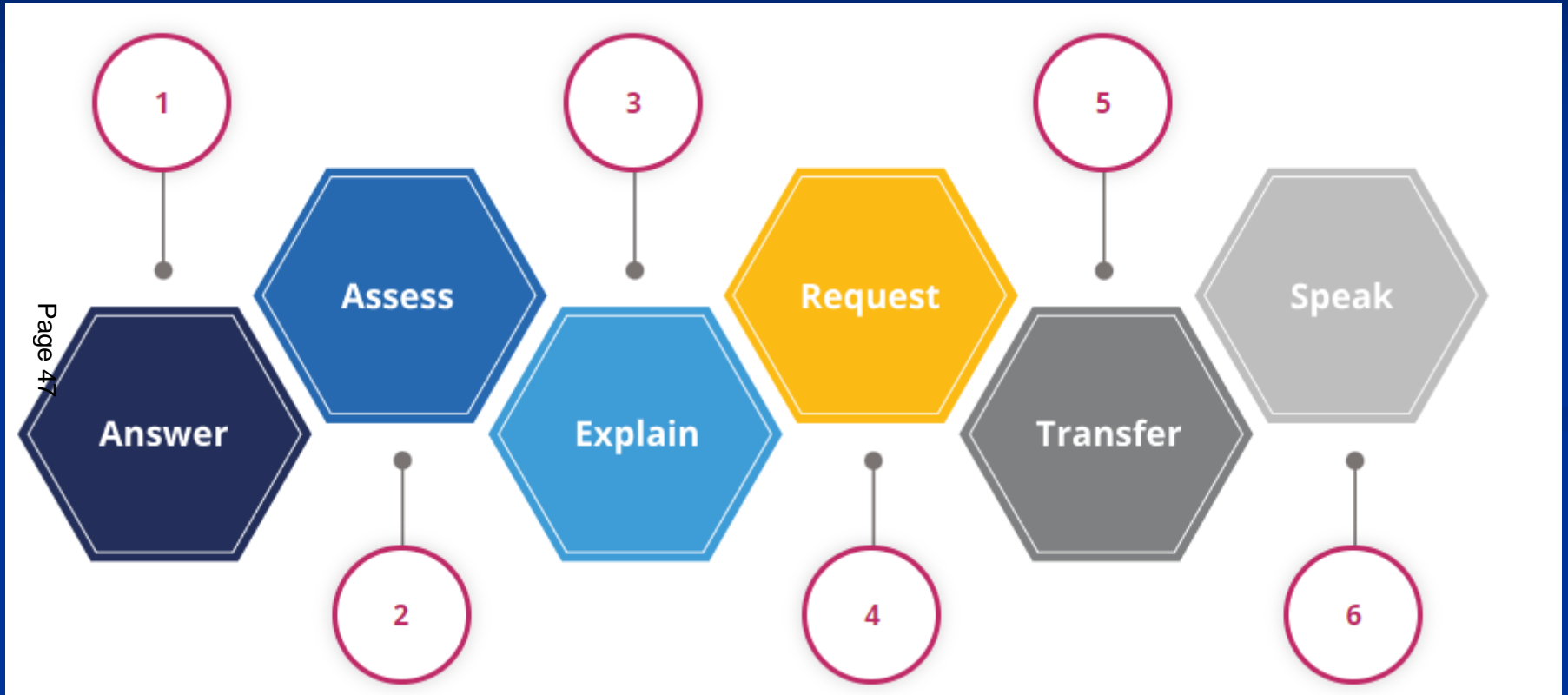
