Report of Scoping Study for Dublin City Council Safe City Programme

In March 2013 Dublin City Council signed up to the UN Women Safe Cities Global Programme. The SCGP is working in over 20 cities across the globe to prevent and reduce sexual harassment against women and girls. There is evidence to support the idea that a city that is safer for women and girls is safer for everyone and helps to enhance social and commercial life. The decision to join the Global Initiative was taken not because Dublin is an unsafe city but because the city wants to share and learn from knowledge in other cities and to proactively strengthen efforts to prevent sexual harassment and other forms of violence against women and girls in public spaces. The scoping study was undertaken to establish an indication of the levels and pervasiveness of harassment and violence in the city. The study focused on a specific geographic area namely the corridor from Heuston Station to Abbey Street. The study findings show that sexual harassment is a frequent and distressing occurrence for women and girls in Dublin City. The aim of the scoping study was to inform the design of Dublin's Safe City Programme.

Key among the recommendations are the following:

- Upgrade the design of the public realm along the intervention site.
- Implement educational programmes for the public and service providers, in particular An Garda Siochana, clearly defining what constitutes sexual harassment and other forms of sexual violence in public space.
- Develop public awareness campaigns.
- A stronger Garda presence
- Raising awareness of how to make a complaint and encouraging reporting of all forms of sexual violence.

Report to Central Area Joint Policing Committee 27th February 2017

Community Impact Assessment:

We understand that Community Impact Assessments are being included as a recommendation with provision for a pilot within the new National Drug Strategy. There are indications that the final strategy will be concluded by April and launched in May. We intend, in the first instance, to make presentations to J.P.C.'s in each area i.e. N.E.I.C. Canals Policing Forum and Safer Blanchardstown in order to provide an understanding of the initiative to members and in due course seek their support to have above areas included in the pilot. The scheduled date for presentation to this Committee is 19th June.

Halloween 2017:

We have started our planning for Halloween 2017 as recommended in the review of Halloween 2016. Our first meeting was held on 14th February and we agreed to conduct a brief consultative process with various youth organisation on their experiences from last year and their willingness to participate in the run up to and Halloween night itself. We intend to reconvene on 1st March for feedback and convene a general meeting of interested groups on 7th March. We had a brief discussion with DCC and they have indicated their willingness to support and engage in the process. We will keep the J.P.C. updated.

Y.P.A.R. Conference:

Y.P.A.R. conference was held in the Gresham Hotel on Thursday 26th and Friday 27th January 2017. There was a large attendance on both days with representatives from all agencies, schools and various local projects. On behalf of International Young People at Risk working group we wish to express our thanks to all Gardaí who attended on both days and positively engaged with young people throughout the conference. Y.P.A.R. are currently working on report and once completed it will be made available to interested parties.

N.E.I.C. Community Policing Forum Review:

Ongoing analysis by B.O.M. of review.

Prescription Drugs:

The community continue to express their frustration at the lack of progress in fully implementing legislation passed in July 2016 in respect of the wholesale sale of prescription tablets in many areas of the inner city. Despite the fact that Gardaí arrest and disrupt those involved in the distribution of tablets this activity continues with little consequences for those involved. We ask this Committee to bring whatever pressure they can on those with responsibility in this area to have this legislation commenced as a matter of urgency.

National Drugs Strategy

The 8 year strategy is being drawn-up and it has been indicated that new Strategy will issued in the second quarter of 2017 and this will inform new local drugs task forces strategies and structures.

Dail legislation

Amendments to the Misuse of Drugs Act started in July 2016 on Tablet regulation with respect to street-dealing 'Benzos and Zimmos' is now being referred to current EU members to review any objections based on limiting trade across the EU and my take some time.

Drug Injecting Centres legislation is at an advanced stage and expected to pass. It is expected that a tender process will be used for establishing a city centre location. A process of on-going relevant stakeholders, including community, is likely to be attached to requirements. Some business reservations are emerging. Some European examples have located fixed centres near or adjacent to Police Stations.

Taoiseach's North Inner City Initiative & Task Force

'Creating Brighter Futures', K. Mulvey report was launched by Taoiseach last Thursday A small number of projects (13 in total) across the Central Area have been funded, totalling €100,000 for one-off actions in response to issues related to the drug crime gang's related violent feud. With the reported actions and outcomes of the NIC pilot project initiative and the Mulvey recommendations the NICDATF members and relevant projects will meet to consider and outline a comprehensive document.

Community Policing Forum has met four times; the contracted report is being worked through for implementation and current local drugs-related issues are being raised and addressed.

Indication was given that test case using Section 5 Irish Medicine Board Act to pursue tablet dealing convictions were dismissed in court.

DCC Anti-Social Behaviour unit presented CPF with detailed update on new legislation, procedures potential outcomes and eviction cases will be heard in coming months.

North Inner City Drugs & Alcohol Task Force has meet three times since this last meeting Emergency homeless accommodation service of families and the long-term impact on children's mental health continues to cause concern and impacts on projects working with those families. Clarity of the criteria and protocols on detox beds and residential rehab beds is being sought NICDATF is working with projects to complete an overall Annual Report of 2016.
