A Garda Stand was erected at the Harold's Cross Bealtaine Festival in May promoting personal / property safety, drug / alcohol awareness and road safety. The Garda Band & Garda Mounted Unit attended. Crime Prevention Literature is distributed in communities and made available at Garda Stations. The availability of crime prevention tips from the Garda Web Site continues to be promoted. The services of the Divisional Crime Prevention Officer is made readily available to victims of crime / or upon request by any individual / commercial interest.

Applications for late night extensions to sell alcohol are thoroughly vetted and Garda event plans include provisions to mitigate this issue. Reduce property crimes such as burglaries, thefts and robberies			On going	"Operation Crossover" continues to be implemented and is designed to provide high visibility operational policing in targeting and disrupting criminals. "Operation Thor" continues to be implemented and is designed to target and disrupt criminals involved in committing burglaries and other forms of criminality. "Garda Days of action" continue to be implemented and are designed to arrest wanted criminals, conduct searches of properties and provide high visibility operational policing / traffic policing in communities. The Divisional "Burglary Response Unit" is performing intensive patrolling of residential communities daily aimed at preventing burglaries and other forms of criminality. The services of An Garda Siochana Analysts are utilised to assist in identifying "crime hot spots" and highlight unfavourable crime trends emerging so as to facilitate the implementation of an appropriate tactical Garda response.
				Garda response. Crime prevention advice to harden targets. Prolific offenders are targeted and bail is revoked where possible.

Identify individual "hot spots" including laneways in the area in the context of anti- social behaviour.	Regular monitoring of "hotspots" including laneways is carried out by the Gardaí and Dublin City Council on an ongoing basis.	Dublin City Council & An Garda Síochána	On going	Gardai deal sternly with offenders who engage in anti social behaviour by way of Prosecution / Adult Caution Scheme or the Juvenile Diversion Programme. Garda Mountain Bike patrolling takes place in parks, laneways etc. to prevent anti social behaviour / consumption of alcohol. Plans are underway to have more Gardai trained for Mountain Bike patrolling. Public disorder hotspots are continually monitored and targeted by range of Garda Units including Community Policing, Public Order Units, Operation Pier and BRU. Patrols at Ringsend Park and the South Docks particularly at weekends to reduce public order incidents and street drinking. The use of the City Centre Public Order Unit at weekends will continue.
The Local Authority & An Garda Síochána to develop ways of local collaboration to reduce incidents of particular crime	Promote the pilot pedal cycle registration scheme which is in operation in the E & D districts in an effort to thwart stolen bikes being circulated and to facilitate the return of "found" bikes to owners by the Gardaí.	An Garda Síochána	On going	The pilot pedal cycle registration scheme is still being evaluated in the "E" District to determine its effectiveness. Thefts of pedal cycles from a Divisional perspective have decreased from 247 in 2016 to 194 in 2017 – a 21% reduction; (Rathmines decreased from 74 in 2016 to 35 in 2017 – down 52%; Sundrive decreased from 36 in 2016 to 24 in 2017 – down 33%). Operation Chain used to target bike theft in D2 with a number of bike thieves arrested. Garda Flickr website promoted to identify recovered bicycles and reunite them with owners. Crime prevention advice given to students at UCD regarding safety of pedal cycles.

To utilise a partnership approach to the removal of graffiti in the South East Area Cont'd	Ongoing liaison between Dublin City Council and the Gardaí. Evidence provided by Dublin City Council to An Garda Síochána in relation to graffiti incidents where relevant.	Dublin City Council & An Garda Síochána	On going	A total of 1050 square metres of graffiti was removed by the contractor appointed by Dublin City Council for that purpose. There is also a dedicated crew within the Waste Management Division to remove offending material. The city council removes graffiti from its own property including on bridges, playground equipment in parks, and on street furniture. The council works closely with business organisations and individual traders in relation to graffiti. In the case of residents and community associations, the council supplies them with graffiti wipes and other materials to deal with graffiti. No reports of graffiti painting were made to the Gardai at either Rathmines or Sundrive Road Stations in 2017 to date. All Gardai remain alert for this form of criminality while patrolling and liaise with Dublin City Council in having graffiti removed from public property.

Persons apprehended for anti-social behaviour are sternly dealt with by the Gardai. Community Gardaí are assigned to dedicated areas. Community Garda in areas where parks are located liaise with Park Rangers and meet with Park Superintendents. Parks with specific issues are targeted by focussed police action. Ongoing liaison with DCC, An Garda Síochána and all stakeholders in an effort to reduce anti-social behaviour in parks. Divisional Crime Prevention Office visited Ringsend Park and carried out an assessment which has been submitted to DCC and discussed at the Ringsend Safety Forum.

The local Boxing Development Officer continues to roll out the ' <i>Startbox'</i> Programme in schools throughout the Area. The Gold Programme, rolled out in April, involves higher intensity sessions and limited contact. The Startbox Programme builds up to the Showcase finals held in the National Stadium in May. This 3-day event pairs competitors from different schools against each other in 3 45-second rounds. There is no winner announced and contest is purely for exhibition & participation purposes.
To continue to work in partnership with schools, community groups and centres to increase access for young people to sports and recreational facilities in the South East Area.	To provide sports programmes using city council facilities and facilities provided by other organisations. This is achieved by the continuing coordination of partnership programmes in the South East Area. The Garda Schools Programme continues to be implemented by the Community Policing Unit Gardai. After-School Sports Drop-in : Every Friday in PARC Recreation Centre from 1.30pm – 2.30pm for local primary school children in the area (ongoing until May).

On going	The Juvenile Liaison Officer implements the Garda Juvenile Diversion Programme aimed at supporting juveniles in deviating from a criminal path into law abiding citizens. The Garda Schools Programme continues to be implemented by Community Policing Unit Gardai and is aimed at educating and encouraging the young to remain law abiding citizens. Provincial cricket sessions will continue on Friday nights from 5pm – 9.30pm. These are held in the North County Cricket Club where a number of players from the South East Area are involved. Players are between 10-18 years of age. Sport Na nÓg: This initiative, in conjunction with City Quay National School, takes place in the school every Wednesday morning from 9.30am – 10.30am (ongoing until end of school term).
