Reduce property crimes such as burglaries, thefts and robberies	Crime “hotspots” targeted	An Garda Síochána	On going	<p><b>Operation Crossover</b> continues to provide high visibility policing targeting and to disrupt criminals. <b>Operation Thor</b> is designed to target and disrupt criminals who commit burglaries and other forms of criminality, and with <b>Operation Hybrid</b> targeted checkpoints to deny criminals the use of the roads.</p> <p><b>“Garda Days of action”</b> designed to arrest wanted criminals, conduct searches of properties and provide high visibility uniform policing / traffic policing in communities, continued in Q2.</p> <p>The <b>“Burglary Response Unit”</b> performs intensive patrols of residential communities to prevent burglaries and other forms of criminality. The sessions provide tasters in a number of sports such as cricket, ultimate frisbee, tag ruby &amp; martial arts. The local DCSWP Sport Officer has made links with clubs in order to offer a pathway for progression for any young people who display a talent or enthusiasm for a particular sport.</p> <p>A Transition Year <b>Rowing</b> programme jointly supported by DCSWP, Sport Ireland, Healthy Ireland, Active School Flag, Trinity College &amp; Rowing Ireland gives students the opportunity to get on the first step of the coaching ladder and enabling them to be involved in a youth leadership role, working in a fun and interactive environment with younger students who will be taught values such as fair play, respect, dignity etc.</p>
