Crime Prevention Literature is distributed in communities and available to the public at Garda Stations. Crime prevention tips continue to be promoted on the Garda Web Site. Crime Prevention advice was circulated through the Local Policing Fora and published in the Link Magazine. The services of the Divisional Crime Prevention Officer is made readily available to victims of crime / or upon request by any individual / commercial interest. Crime "hotspots" targeted	An Garda Síochána	On going	 Operations Crossover and Thor continue to provide high visibility policing, targeting and disrupting those who commit burglaries and other forms of criminality. Garda Days of action continues to be implemented and are designed to arrest wanted criminals, conduct searches of properties and provide high visibility uniform policing / traffic policing in communities. Divisional Burglary Response Units perform intensive patrolling of residential communities aimed at preventing burglaries and other forms of criminality, while the Armed Support Units work in conjunction with routine patrolling. Garda Analysts identify crime hot spots to highlight unfavourable crime trends emerging and so facilitate early policing responses. The Crime Prevention Officer has conducted security surveys and assessments to reduce incidents of property crimes in the DCC South East Area. Prolific offenders were targeted, objections to bail made in District Court bail was revoked where breaches detected.

Garda Mountain Bike Patrolling / foot patrolling takes place in parks, laneways etc. in order to prevent anti social behaviour / loitering / consumption of alcohol. Operation Irene was implemented during the Summer months aimed at preventing the consumption of alcohol in public. In addition, a specific operation targeting the Grand Canal area was introduced to tackle antisocial behaviour and public drinking especially at Charlemont Mall.

Blue Info Bikes are placed in areas of high bicycle use to promote bike safety and security, incorporating best practice for securing the bike. In DMR South – Thefts of pedal cycles from a Divisional perspective stands at 254 so far this year and represents a decrease of 30% in comparison to 2017. Thefts of pedal cycles in <u>Rathmines</u> stands at 47 so far this year compared to 72 in 2017 and represents a 35% decrease. Thefts of pedal cycles in <u>Sundrive</u> stands at 33 so far this year compared to 37 in 2017 and represents an 11% decrease.

High visibility Garda Mountain Bike Patrols and uniform foot patrols are performed in communities, public parks and open spaces aimed at ensuring that anti-social behaviour / loitering does not occur. Complaints of anti-social behaviour occurring in communities, parks and open spaces are promptly responded to by patrolling Gardai and offenders are sternly dealt with – a "No Nonsense Approach" is adopted at all times. Community Gardaí are allocated to each park and active engagement with Park Constables. Periodic meeting with Park Superintendents are held. As a result of co-operation between both organisations, Gardaí have increased patrolling in St Stephens Green Park to specifically target drug use and thefts from person at the Band Stand and Rockery areas of St Stephens Green Park. Startbox, a partnership between the IABA and Dublin City Sport & Wellbeing Partnership, represents an ideal way for 10 – 17 year olds to first engage with amateur boxing, Ireland's most successful Olympic sport. It is delivered by IABA/DCSWP Development Officer Michael Carruth via local schools (primary & TY level) in the Area. Approx 2,000 young people take part each year. The Programme is structured into Bronze (non contact), Silver and Gold phases. The first two phases focus on general strength & fitness, method and technique. The Gold phase introduces an element of contact to those who have displayed a particular talent & enthusiasm for the sport. In the summer months the IABA/DCSWP Development Officers broke from the Startbox initiative to deliver an Olympic Medal Educational Programme in the Aviva Stadium (including a stadium tour). This innovative programme was aimed at primary schools for their end-of-term trips and then later to Youth Projects and Summer Camps throughout June & July.

Continual identification of new communities in conjunction with partner agencies provides targeted police services to meet their needs. Complaints made to Gardaí from members of immigrant communities alleging wrongdoing are thoroughly investigated to ensure racism is not a motivating factor in the cause of the complaint. Services of the Garda Racial, Intercultural and Diversity Office are made readily available to immigrant communities. District Ethnic Liaison Officers are appointed and readily available to assist immigrant communities and support them and encourage them to report any such crime. Ethnic Liaison Officer training is currently being reviewed; additional Gardaí will be trained before the end of 2018. Garda Clinics operate in the 3 mosques located in the DMR South Central.
