- There have been 0 murders recorded in 2018.
- There have been 86 detections for the Sale/Supply of Drugs in 2018 as opposed to 122 for the same period last year, representing a decrease of 30%.
- There have been 37 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2018 in comparison to 46 for the same period last year a decrease of 20%.
- There have been 2 Fatal Road Traffic Accidents recorded in 2018.
- 322 Public Order Incidents are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 346 in 2017, showing a decrease of 7%.
- 70 Incidents of Drunkenness are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 57 in 2017, a increase of 23%.
- 92 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm are recorded in 2018, as opposed to 88 in 2017, an increase of 5%.
- 201 Incidents of Minor Assault are recorded in 2018 as opposed to 243 in the same period last year showing a decrease of 17%.
