- There has been 1 murder recorded in 2020.
- There have been 156 detections for the Sale/Supply of Drugs in 2020 as opposed to 134 for 2019, representing an increase of 16%.
- There have been a total of 64 arrests for Driving whilst intoxicated in 2020 in comparison to 47 for 2019, which is an increase of 36%.
- There have been no Fatal Road Traffic Accident recorded in 2020.
- 415 Public Order Incidents detections have been made in 2020 as opposed to 317 in 2019, showing an increase of 31%.
- 81 Incidents of Drunkenness have been recorded for 2020 as opposed to 82 in 2019, a decrease of 1%.
- 91 Incidents of Assault Causing Harm have been recorded in 2020 in comparison to 85, for 2019, an increase of 7%.
- 239 Incidents of Minor Assault have been recorded in 2020 as opposed to 235 for 2019 showing an increase of 2%
