To ask the Director of Services what is being done to address the serious issue of horses being kept on public land and not cared for. There is an increase of reports of stray/abandoned horses in Dublin South Central.

Reply

The Licensing Unit operate under the Control of horses Act and Bye-Laws. All reports of stray/abandoned horses are responded to. For safety reasons most of the seizure Operations take place at night and often with the assistance of an Garda Síochána.

Dublin City Council does not have Authorised Officers appointed under the Animal Health and Welfare Act as animal welfare is a function of the Department of Agriculture and the Marine.

To as ask the Director of Services what Dublin City Council policy / protocol is with addressing rat infestations in our properties but in particular flat complexes? Who is responsible for addressing this health issue?

Reply

Dublin City Council, Housing Maintenance Section actions all reports of rats in City Council dwellings from our tenants. Requests are dealt with both directly by the Council and by agreement with the HSE, Pest Control Units. Common areas in City Council flat complexes are treated by Housing Maintenance, HSE Pest Control handle individual units/houses on our behalf. All necessary steps to deal with the issue are taken.

We have a dedicated and professionally trained team with Dublin City Council that have baited the shores in the complex on a weekly basis and we have also started baiting the old bin chambers this week in the complex. It should be noted, that bait boxes with live bait cannot be left over ground anymore as these can cause secondary poisoning in other animals. Bait boxes with monitoring bait (fake food which would show bite marks) have been left across the complex. The purpose of the monitoring bait is to show a rat is present in the complex. Adding to the problem is the fact that Pest Control companies can no longer use the stronger pesticides as used previously because of changed regulations.

During the Covid-19 crisis, the HSE did not carry out pest control in our flat complexes, as they did prior to the pandemic. In the absence of the HSE, Dublin City Council continued to provide this service, which placed additional strain on our resources.

To ask the Director of Services to please give me details on what success Dublin had in developing Wi-Fi hotspots around Dublin with assistance from the European Union.

Reply

The WiFi4EU initiative aims to deliver free access to Wi-Fi connectivity for citizens in public spaces including squares, community centres, public parks, leisure centres, sports development, art facilities. Dublin City Council achieved the maximum allocation of four WiFi4EU vouchers worth €15,000 each as part of the 2019 European Commission funding call. The amount of €60,000 will be match funded from the Department of Rural and Community Development. The total amount of this funding will cover the cost of equipment and installation of Wi-Fi hotspots up to the value of €120,000.

Dublin City Council will be responsible for paying for the connectivity (internet subscription), maintenance and operation of the equipment for at least three years. Each successful local authority had 18 months to select locations for the WiFi4EU hotspots and complete their installation to be ready for public use. However, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the deadline for the installation was extended for an additional eight months. In the last 18 months, the Smart City Unit of Dublin City Council, which is responsible for this project, completed a number of actions. The Smart City team engaged with the community through the Public Consultation process in May and June 2019 to establish the most suitable locations for this project, to ensure that the WiFi distribution addresses digital exclusion.

The application process for the funding under this scheme ended on July 22nd 2019. It is important to note that the delivery of educational programmes was listed as one of the criteria that increased chances of selection. This approach will help bridge the digital divide and maximize the usage of this facility. The Smart City team reviewed all 50 application received and surveyed all the locations to ensure that they align with the objectives of this initiative and they comply with the WiFi4EU programme criteria.

It conducted an analysis of the geographical locations of the proposed locations, using Central Statistics Office Small Area Population data for 2016. It established an index that measures areas in terms of the proportion of households without an internet connection and, separately, the proportion of the population aged 10-19. Please see attached map and proposed locations below. *Please note installation at these sites will only be confirmed after site surveys have been completed by the successful tenderer and a review of the requirements has been assessed.* The tender process was delayed due to Covid 19 restrictions but is currently in the evaluation phase, the Smart City Unit is in the process of reviewing and evaluating the tender responses. The tender decision is due to be announced in the next two to three weeks.

In respect of the intercom system, this system has been problematic and we have invested in repairs. However, as a result of ongoing problems we have made a decision to replace the system. We are in the initial stages of tendering for a contractor, but the process has been delayed due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Circle are aware of the concerns raised by residents regarding local drug users accessing the carpark. There are ongoing discussions on this matter with the local community Garda to try to remedy the situation and discussions are also taking place around the option of external gates to the doorways.
