In-person call-backs to victims of domestic abuse and residential burglaries have been conducted by Community Gardaí, within 7 days of an incident throughout 2020. Continuous liaison with the elderly, elderly groups and key stakeholders in the area — home help, Social Workers, Health Centres, especially throughout the Vulnerable beats have been taken place throughout the pandemic, on a daily basis to engage with the homeless, check on their welfare and to inform them of homeless services, Gardaí in the SE area also called to the elderly & vulnerable throughout the pandemic. Community Policing Gardaí carries out grocery shopping, multiple small jobs (collecting prescriptions, bringing pets on walk, topping up mobile phone credit etc) and paying bills at the Post office/bank Gardaí visited local community groups, local hospitals, healthcare centres & GP's reminding them that they are available to deliver prescriptions etc. Meals on Wheels was also operated providing in excess of 100 hot meals a day to the elderly & vulnerable in the SE area.

In response to feedback through the residents and business associations in the area, and in collaboration with DCC, additional road markings were added to the Grand Canal Area (Sir John Rogerson's Quay, Benson St) to improve cycle safety and general road safety for locals and businesses alike In co-operation with Restorative Justice Ireland, Gardaí attend panel meetings where matters of Road Traffic Offences are discussed with court ordered defendants, to educate in relation to penalties, consequences of their high risk behaviour.

Reduce property crimes such as burglaries, thefts and robberies	Crime "hotspots" targeted	An Garda Síochána	On going	The Crime Prevention Officer has conducted a number of security surveys and assessments to reduce the incidents of property crimes in the DCC SE Area. Prolific offenders were targeted and objections to bail made in District Court. Bail was revoked before the District Court where breaches of bail were detected. Continuous engagement with key stakeholders in a joined up approach to a successful reduction in anti-social and criminal behaviour. Having reviewed the figures around the areas of property crime (burglaries, thefts & robberies), it shows that there has been a large decrease in figures, compared to the same time last year. A bulletin has recently been sent out to vulnerable people in the SE area, with advice on Home safety coming into the winter.

Public Order patrols are targeted on known hotspots and at key times to deal with drinking/ loitering and anti social activity. Full use is made of the powers available under the Criminal Justice (Public Order) Act. Gardaí are working with Dublin City Council on installing a new CCTV system in Whelan & O Rahilly flat complexes which have recently seen a spike in Anti Social Behaviour. This system should be installed in November. Operation Apache — members of Community Policing, Pearse Street targeted antisocial behaviour on Pearse Street, 7pm — 12am daily. Operation Grand Canal — between 2pm — 12am daily, members targeted large groups of teens to reduce anti-social & criminal behaviour. In addition, reported continuous breeches of Misuse of Drugs Act around the National Drug Treatment Clinic have been targeted to great effect. This is ongoing and includes the Community Policing & Drug Unit as well as Operation PIER.
