The Cul-de-sac sign F 350 is the only cul-de-sac sign provided by Dublin City Council, in unique size. Drivers behaviour disrespecting warning or regulatory sign and speeding, should be reported to the An Garda Síochána. The Transport Advisory Group generally don't install speed radar signs on residential areas. There are a number of speed limit signs along the road denoting the speed limit. Dublin City Council has a limited budget for installation of traffic calming measures for 2023. Generally when considering the installation of traffic calming measures, those roads without any vertical deflection are considered a priority over roads which are currently traffic calmed. Annamoe Terrace is currently traffic calmed with a number of speed ramps and raised tables. However, the area engineer recommends traffic calming in the form of some slow and speed markings to be painted through Annamoe area. Install a Slow marking (M 106) on Annamoe Rd, 35m north from the junction with North Circular Road. Install a Slow marking (M 106) on Annamoe Terrace, 18m south from the junction with Cabra Rd.
