## **Environment and Transportation Department**

### **Control of Stationless On-Street Bicycle Hire Bye-Laws**

Bleper continue with their successful operations with over 800 bikes now available for public hire. Bleper's Crumlin suburban hub pilot continues to operate well since its launch in June 2022. The Lord Mayor formally launched the first of Bleper's three new northside suburban hubs in Artane on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 2023. Further hubs are being rolled out in Donnycarney and Beaumont in the coming weeks. The ongoing roll out of additional bike parking continues which will facilitate the expansion of stationless bike operations. Over 282,000 journeys were made on Bleper bikes in 2022. Bleperbike users cycled over 103,000 hours in 2022 saving the equivalent of over 52 tonnes of carbon. Moby are currently integrating their e-bike fleet to a new App and all e-bikes will return to the streets in Q2 2023. Research is ongoing regarding integration/interoperability options with other mobility/transport services. Both operators have become members of Mobility Partnership Ireland which was launched in May 2022 and represents several private sustainable transport companies.

### **Parking Tag and alternative methods of paying for parking.**

Due to the Covid-19 Virus isolation, the number of transactions per week in April 2020 had reduced to 10,500 from a high of 126,155 earlier in 2020. The number of weekly transactions for week ending 14<sup>th</sup> November 2021 has risen to 102,535. Since the beginning of the Covid-19 situation, the numbers using the Parking Tag had dropped very significantly in line with the reduction of parking meter usage. The weekly revenue on average of €400,000 had reduced to €25,000 for Pay and Display parking in March and April 2020. However, the numbers using the Parking Tag have increased and by week ending 16<sup>th</sup> April 2023, that week's revenue was €281,909.86. For week ending 16<sup>th</sup> April 2023, the usage of coin in parking meters was €80,257.65 and card payments were €108,908.

### **Permit Parking, Pay & Display**

The results of the ballot for the following pay and display and permit parking schemes has closed. The following have voted in favour of introducing a scheme.

Rutledge Terrace, Dublin 8.

Abercorn Road, Dublin 3

Belgrave Avenue, Dublin 6

The following pay and display and permit parking scheme voted in favour of a change of hours of operation; Dodder View Cottages, Ballsbridge, Dublin 4. Monday to Sunday 7am to 12 midnight.

### **Decarbonising Zones**

In response to the All of Government Climate Action Plan 2019 Action No.165 and the recent circular issued by DHLGH in February 2023 on Decarbonising Zones, the Council has identified potential Decarbonising Zones (DZs) in Ballymun and Ringsend. The Council are being assisted by Codema and the Dublin CARO, who are providing the evidence base of local level emissions, energy use and low-carbon resources, overlaid with other location based data which will help in decision making such as locations of housing retrofit programmes, sustainable energy communities, public buildings etc. The four Dublin Local Authorities are developing a regional based approach to defining DZs. A scoping out of work in line with the guidance provided in Annex D of the Local Authority Climate Action Plan Guidelines is currently being prepared.

### **Road Maintenance Services.**

Road Maintenance Services' Annual Works Programme for 2023 has been presented to the Elected Members. The programme will deliver approximately 18km of footpath upgrade works and 16km of carriageway resurfacing works this year. The tender and contract documents for the appointment of contractors to deliver these works are currently being prepared. During the period

January to March 2023 the Division repaired/ made safe approximately 1,300 defects and hazards on the road network. Furthermore during the same period 104 critical defects and hazards on the road network were repaired/ made safe within 24-hours of them being reported.

#### **Dublin Waste to Energy Community Gain Fund.**

Dublin Waste to Energy Community Gain Projects Grant Scheme 2023 is open for applications from the 7<sup>th</sup> April 2023 to the 19<sup>th</sup> May 2023 inclusive. The amount of grant funding available for disbursement is based on an annual contribution by Dublin Waste to Energy Limited which itself is determined by the amount of waste accepted for thermal treatment at the facility. On this occasion a total amount of €1million will be available for disbursement to eligible projects within the Irishtown, Ringsend and Sandymount catchment area. Applications are invited to submit proposals to the Scheme for assessment by the Dublin Waste to Energy Community Gain Fund Committee. The Committee members carefully evaluate each application against the Projects Grant Scheme's general conditions and criteria and only selects those that will provide the maximum community benefit.

Regarding the Dublin Waste to Energy Community Gain Projects Grant Scheme 2021, 19 of the 28 approved applicants have drawn down their grant funding to a total value of circa €295K. The total funding awarded was circa €500K, and therefore the balance remaining for drawdown is €205K. Due to unforeseen circumstances, two organisations have decided to withdraw their grant aided projects. The remaining 7 beneficiaries have until the 30<sup>th</sup> of June 2023 to complete their projects and draw down their funding. Worth noting is that grant funding not availed of in respect of any Projects Grant Scheme is carried forward and used to fund future Schemes.

#### **Waste Services Update.**

##### **Recycling Services**

Waste Management Services have designed a suite of new and uniform signage for all bring centres. New signs have now been delivered to Collins Avenue depot. It is anticipated that the new signs will be rolled out to all bring centres in Q2 2023. Following this, work will begin on designing new signage for all on-street bring bank locations. As part of this project QR codes will be included on new signage to facilitate real time reporting of overflowing banks, illegal dumping or other issues.

Following representations from Trade Unions, Waste Management Services have committed to undertake a feasibility study regarding the insourcing of the operation of Civic Amenity Sites by direct labour. Through the Office of Government Procurement's Framework Agreement for the provision of Business, Management and ICT Consultancy Services (RFT 206674): Lot 6 – Policy & Economics, Waste Management Services have engaged Indecon International Consultants by way of Direct Drawdown to conduct this study. Work on the feasibility study is now underway.

Parks & Landscaping Services have engaged a service provider to refurbish Eamon Ceannt Park Dept, including works to the bring centre. Works are scheduled to begin in late May and will take approximately 12 months to complete. The bring centre will close for the duration of the works. Glass and textile banks will be placed on the footpath outside the existing site for the duration of the works.

##### **Clothing Waste Prevention Pilot**

Waste Management Services have created a new textile waste project that aims to prevent good clothing from becoming waste and support the transition to a circular economy. A new guide on 'How to Organise a Clothes Swap' was written to assist anyone who wishes to plan their own clothes swapping event. Community groups are also invited to borrow a 'Clothes Swap Kit' containing the equipment, such as rails, signage boards and hangers, they may need to hold

### **School Programmes**

Picker Pals is an anti-litter educational programme for primary schools. The programme gives young people the tools and positive motivation to develop stewardship of their local environment. The Relove Fashion Competition 2022-23 has now completed. Secondary school students were invited to take a deeper look at how clothing is made and learn sustainable reuse skills such as upcycling, repairs, alterations and mending. The final was held in Ballymun's Rediscovery Centre on 30 March 2023. Our Lady of Mercy secondary school in Beaumont were awarded the award for 'Most Innovative Project'. Green-Schools is Ireland's leading environmental management and award programme. The student-led programme promotes long-term, whole-school action. Green-Schools continues to be delivered to primary and secondary schools by Waste Management Services staff and An Taisce. The deadline for schools renewing their Green Flag was 24 March 2023. Waste Management staff have now completed over 60 assessment visits to the schools wishing to renew their Green Flag in 2023. ### **Rubbish Film Festival**

Waste Management Services partnered with Createschool and five other local authorities to deliver a 'Rubbish Film Festival' for secondary schools in 2022/2023. The programme challenged students to create a one-minute short film focussing on the topics of litter, waste prevention and responsible consumption. Schools received onsite learning and support to help students produce their entries. A total of twenty eight entries were received from Dublin City secondary schools. Two films and a poster design were selected as the winners in their respective categories and they will go forward to represent Dublin City at the National Awards in Co. Meath on May 3rd. Fifty-two schools and over seventy entries from six counties are competing for the national awards. There is no material change to the actual service itself, how it operates or cost. ### **City Neighbourhoods Competition 2023**

IPB Pride of Place Awards 2023 – Arrangements are being made to select groups for nomination to this year's competition.

### **Protection of Water Bodies Office (PWBO).**

DCC is working to deliver a number of projects to ensure that the opportunities to meet DCC's Water Framework Directive (WFD) obligation of achieving "good" status for all our water bodies by 2027 are maximised. Current examples are:

- The Santry River Restoration and Greenway Project is a cross-agency, multi-disciplinary project to produce a Masterplan, based on an options assessment, for the River Santry catchment in order to achieve the objectives set out in the Water Framework Directive, Floods Directive, Birds & Habitats Directive as well as the Greater Dublin Area Cycle Network. This project aims to set out the most effective plan to restore the river to a more natural state, encompassing a much-enhanced public amenity, promoting biodiversity, remediating sources of pollution and addressing potential flooding within the catchment. This project is being developed in collaboration with Fingal County Council, DCC Parks, Landscape Services & Biodiversity, as well as DCC's Active Travel Unit of the Environment & Transportation Department. LAWPRO, the EPA and Inland Fisheries Ireland are supportive of this scheme. Funding is mainly from the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund, and, in the case of the greenway, the National Transport Authority. Consultants were appointed to the project on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July 2022. Data collection and analysis, as well as stakeholder consultation has commenced recently.
- The Protection of Water Bodies Office is progressing a pilot surface water management project using Green Infrastructure principles. This project intends to construct and monitor the performance of nature based interventions that address the quantity and quality of surface water run-off. Five sites have been identified, two each adjacent to the Dodder and Santry Rivers and a fifth at a local street in the north inner city. These Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) are expected to have the dual effect of reducing the rate of surface water runoff into sewers/watercourses, and improving the water quality. Given these two objectives we will reduce the risk of downstream and local flooding and enhance biodiversity opportunities in the public realm. The Protection of Water Bodies Office is working to deliver this project on-site in the second quarter of 2023.
- Culvert Improvement Works – Screen Upgrade Works. The Contractor has been appointed and the construction works are ongoing. This work will provide safer access for staff to maintain 17 screens which collect debris from watercourses and provide public safety, particularly during times of heavy rainfall.

### **Flood Defence Camac River.**

- Consultants have been appointed by DCC to investigate the reduction of flood risk across the DCC and SDCC sections of the River Camac. Environmental and topographical surveys are now complete. A computer model has been built to investigate tidal, fluvial and pluvial flood risks associated with the river. Preliminary flood extent maps have been verified. Flood alleviation options such as storage, walls, embankments and de-culverting are currently being computer modelled. A further public consultation is planned in August 2023 following the successful ones in June 2022.
- This study as with all other flood alleviation projects is being integrated into a desire to "de-culvert" and widen what is now seen as an over engineered river where possible so that it can, over time, be restored to a more natural state, as far as reasonably possible. The project will also involve identifying and remedying urban pollution sources, where possible. This is also being done in conjunction with an existing Greenway proposal and in tandem with Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF) funded projects in

the area. The new City Edge project gives opportunities to achieve some of this. River corridors of 10m-25m wide are policies in the new development plan and these will be implemented where possible on this very constrained river. Liaison with large stakeholders is ongoing on possible flood storage areas in DCC and SDCC.

- Further wintering bird surveys are completed. Building threshold surveys are completed. A large Site Investigation for both Dublin City Council and South Dublin County Council area of the Camac catchment has been awarded and is due to commence in May 2023.

### **Climate Action Team.**

The Climate Action Team welcomed a new energy manager – Darby Mullen, Senior Executive Engineer.

The Climate Action Team is primarily focused on developing our revised climate action plan (CAP). To support the development of our revised climate action plan to meet National Statutory requirements and the goals of the EU Mission, a review of the current CCAP is under way. Workshops with staff to consolidate actions is underway.

Further to support communication of DCC's work in relation to climate action, the Climate Action Team has identified events for staff to engage and show case on-going programmes and projects. Most recently, the co-hosting of the EPA Climate Lecture in the Mansion House saw staff from Architects, Housing, Protection of Water Bodies, Dublin District Heating and Active Travel teams host stands providing attendees with the opportunity to learn about respective initiatives, and draw attention to CAP process.

The Climate Action Team with EMRWMPPO was involved in a bid for Dublin to be the 2023 Circular Hotspot. The application was led by the Rediscovery Centre and was successful. Planning is underway for the four day event starting on May 29<sup>th</sup> 2023.

The Climate Action Team's have issued the draft food strategy for public consultation. Edible Dublin: Food Strategy will be open for comment for six weeks.

DCC is part of CULTIVATE an EU-funded project to increase public awareness and knowledge of Food Sharing initiatives (FSIs), to understand what drives or hampers their practice, and to foster sustainability, inclusion, and resilience in urban and peri-urban food systems through food sharing as a hub city. CULTIVATE will develop the **Food Sharing Compass**, a social innovation support platform for FSIs, policy makers, food supply actors, researchers, and citizens. With its five tools, the Compass helps these stakeholders navigate food sharing landscapes and cultures to understand, develop, replicate, scale out and strengthen food sharing. The aim is to create more sustainable, resilient, and healthy urban and peri-urban food systems. CULTIVATE supports the EU's inclusive climate mitigation and adaptation ambitions.

DCC's Public Sector Innovation Funded research project Climate Resilient Housing was launched on Tuesday February 7<sup>th</sup>. The launch was attended by Lord Mayor Caroline Conroy and Minister of State Ossian Smyth. It was well attended with over 40 people. A presentation was made by the IES Team detailing the digital twin and dashboard. This was followed by a discussion and a tour of one of the de-tenanted units. DCC's application to participate in IURC was successful and we are partnered with Seoul, South Korea. This is an 18 to 24 month programme that will involve study exchanges with key



stakeholders in the city of Seoul on the topics of transport, nature-based solutions and climate change and COVID recovery. Additional funding has been secured to progress urban cooperation action plans.

The Climate Campaigners app presents residents of the city with lifestyle challenges that they may undertake to contribute to climate action. We are currently engaging people to download the app and start their Climate Challenges. We encourage Councillors and city staff to download the app and share via social media the challenges they are undertaking to reduce their emissions. For the next year, our focus will be on increasing the uptake of the app through events, and incentives such as a rewards system. The rewards system is being developed with project partners.

The Climate Action Team and the Economic Development team successfully secured €250,000 in funding from the Shared Island Fund to undertake a feasibility study with Belfast City Council on 'A Connected Circular Economy'. The project is expected to take 12 months to complete and will endeavour to identify opportunities that have yet to be explored in the circular economy and to identify physical infrastructure needs to support a robust circular economy between Dublin city and Belfast city. MCO Project Limited was the successful tenderer and will begin work shortly on the feasibility study.

#### **Climate Action Regional Office.**

A Senior Executive Professional has joined Dublin CARO at the end of March 2023. Fingal County Council on behalf of the 4 Dublin Local Authorities advertised 4 X Community Climate Action Officer posts (temporary – 3 year Contract). In addition, Fingal City Council on behalf of the 4 Dublin Local Authorities ran another competition for 4 X Climate Action Officer posts. Interviews will commence week beginning 24<sup>th</sup> April and Dublin CARO representative will be on the interview panel.

Dublin CARO are also currently shortlisting candidates for one temporary post graduate internship post for the summer period.

The Service Level Agreement between DECC and the Lead Local Authorities for each of the four CARO has been extended until June 2023.

On the 24<sup>th</sup> of February 2023, pursuant to the provisions the Climate Action and Low Carbon Development Act 2015 to 2021, and Section 14B(2)(a) thereof[1], the minister for the Environment, Climate and Communications instructed all Local Authorities to prepare a Local Authority Climate Action Plan (LACAP) containing adaptation and mitigation actions. This plan must be completed within 12 months of the receipt of this request. It should be noted that the 4 Dublin Local Authorities already have Climate Change Action Plans ([www.dublinclimatechange.ie](http://www.dublinclimatechange.ie)) published in 2019. The Dublin Metropolitan CARO and Codema have been assisting and supporting the four Dublin Local Authorities in this regard in terms of reviewing and updating their existing Climate Change Action Plans to align with the most recently published National Climate Action Plan 2023 and to increase the level of ambition in line with national targets. Detailed guidance documents have also been prepared by a national steering group including the CAROs, Local Authority reps, Codema, SEAI, EPA, Met Éireann to assist the sector in preparing their Climate Action Plans.

It is a requirement of the Climate Action and Low Carbon Development (Amendment) Act 2021 that local authority Climate Actions Plans, must be aligned to sectoral climate action and planning. Sectoral engagement workshops are planned for all Las in April and May 2023.

The first workshop covering Heritage and Biodiversity took place in Portlaoise on 25<sup>th</sup> April 2023. Other workshops will address the sectoral topics of Transportation, Built Environment and Landuse Planning, Community Development and Enterprise, Landuse Change. These

workshops will explore sectoral climate actions that need to be accounted for in LA Climate Action plans, as appropriate.

CARO is continuing the roll out of the Local Authority Climate Action Training programme for local authority staff. The training programme was developed by CARO in conjunction with the LASNTG and other expert partners such as Climate Ireland. Dublin CARO, the Local Authority Services National Training Group (LASNTG), Greenville Procurement Partners and a number of strategic partners have developed Green Procurement Training for local authorities. This training is a key action for delivery of the LA Climate Action Charter 2019 whereby local authorities have pledged to implement green public procurement strategy and procedures across all business areas. Strand 1 of this training is a 45-minute introduction to green public procurement webinar aimed at local authority staff across all departments and levels. This strand went live in May. Strand 2, a 3 day course comprising self-directed and on-line training commenced on 13<sup>th</sup> June. It is aimed at procurement officers, budget holders and decision makers. Strand 3 which is aimed at staff involved in developing the green procurement strategy in local authorities commenced in late September. Invitations to staff to complete this training will be via the training officers in the LAs and will be offered for up to 1 year.

LASNTG are running further training programmes on Climate Action Training for Local Authority Staff in April, June and November 2023. LASNTG scheduled 2 X 1 day Climate Action Training Workshops for the 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> March and the topics covered will be beneficial in developing the Local Authority Climate Action Plans. Dublin CARO were in attendance at the workshop. Further Sectoral face to face workshops are also being planned to assist Local Authority Climate Action teams and staff in prioritising actions associated with different sectors such as Cultural Heritage, Biodiversity and Transport.

The Líní na Farraige Project was formally launched in Galway on 29<sup>th</sup> September. Dublin CARO collaborated with Local Authorities, artists and 3rd level institutes and other partners on this project which is one of 15 Creative Ireland Climate Action funded projects. It consists of illuminations of LED horizontal lines to represent future sea-level and storm surges. The lights were placed at the Spanish Arch, Ard Bia at Nimmos and along the Claddagh Basin. The installation is powered by PV panels that are situated on the roof of the Spanish Arch building. The project was covered extensively in the media ([www.rte.ie/news/regional/2022/0929/1326108-galway-lights-storms/](http://www.rte.ie/news/regional/2022/0929/1326108-galway-lights-storms/)).

A second installation was launched in Wexford town on 28<sup>th</sup> October. The final installation was officially launched by Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media for Ireland - Catherine Martin at the Martello Tower in Blackrock Park, Co. Dublin on 21<sup>st</sup> February, 2023. The launch was well attended by dignitaries and local residents alike. This art installation consists of a solar powered horizontal LED line of light, showing the future risks of rising seas and storm surges, in the year 2100 and under a high-risk scenario, where ice loss from Antarctica is greater than expected. The installation is based on future predictions from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change Report AR6, and historic storm surge [www.lintenafarraige.com](http://www.lintenafarraige.com). The Installations will be in place until May 2023 and the CARO is continuing communications and engagement activities including school workshops related to the Líní na Farraige project in each of the three locations.

CARO are part of a steering group member to the GAA Green Clubs programme which launched Phase 2 in early December. The launch included the release of an on-line toolkit and resources to support the sustainability journey of clubs. The toolkit is a collaborative effort between the Steering group expert partners including CAROs, Regional Waste Management Offices, the Local Authority Water Protection Offices, local authorities and other expert partners. A workshop



for Phase 2 clubs was held in Croke Park on March 3rd and was attended by CARO and other expert partners. Over 100 clubs are now participating in Phase 1 and 2 of the programme. Further information at <https://www.gaa.ie/my-gaa/community-and-health/green-clubs-sustainability/>

Dublin CARO organised the first in a series of climate action site visits scheduled for 2023 for climate action teams. The first site visit on 08.02.2023 was to view work being undertaken by Bord na Móna at the Mount Lucas Wind Farm in rehabilitating and restoring peatland. Bogs are also important carbon stores and the visit showed and explained carbon monitoring work undergoing as part of the restoration and rehabilitation work. Members from other climate actions teams and CARO Regional Offices were also in attendance. The second site visit on 18.04.2023 was to the Neoen Solar Farm at Hilltown Co. Meath commissioned in 2022 with an electricity generation potential of 18 MWp (MWp is an abbreviation for Megawatt peak – a unit of measurement for the output of power from a source such as solar or wind where the output may vary according to the strength of sunlight or wind speed. MWp is a measure of the maximum potential output of power. A Megawatt is 1,000 kilowatts. A kilowatt is 1,000 watts. A watt is one amp flowing through one volt.

Dublin CARO is looking into organising further site visits for climate action teams in the coming months and is currently looking into the possibility of a visit to an anaerobic digestion (AD) plant.

Dublin CARO attended the CHERISH – an EU funded 6 year project (Climate, Heritage and Environment of Reefs, Islands, and Headlands) End of Project Conference on 21<sup>st</sup> March in Dublin Castle and had a stand to showcase national/sectoral objectives and ongoing projects.

Dublin CARO leads in publishing the quarterly CARO newsletter. The eighth edition was published in late December and the next edition will be in March 2023. ## **Air Quality Monitoring and Noise Control Unit.**

### **Ambient Air Monitoring Network**

A presentation was made to the Members of the Climate Action, Environment and Energy SPC regarding progress made on noise mapping of Dublin City under the EU Environmental Noise Directive. All the relevant data was submitted as required to the EPA by the end of 2022, for return by them to the EU Commission. The noise maps were published on the DCC website and can be accessed here [Noise Maps and Action Plans | Dublin City Council](#) Work will commence on the preparation of the Noise Action Plan, which is due in 2024.

### **Schools Mobility Programme**

A **School Zone (SZ)** is an initiative designed to give priority to students at the school gate by freeing up footpaths and reducing vehicle drop-offs, pick-ups and idling. The aim is to reduce congestion and increase safety at the front of school (and provide space for social distancing during the pandemic), and prioritise active travel to and from school. Dublin City Council received 119 eligible applications for a SZ. School Zone treatments have been installed at of these 67 Schools, leaving a further 52 awaiting treatment. 10 of those awaiting are at a final design stage. Schools in 30 km/h roads were initially prioritized for treatment.

In 2021 the nationwide **Safe Routes To School Programme (SRTS)** was launched. For this programme the designs go beyond the school gate to school routes and proposed elements include front of school improvements, improved crossings, road signage, green infrastructure, road surfacing, and provision of cycle parking infrastructure. Dublin City Council are working in

partnership with Green-Schools to deliver and support this project. There are 2 rounds in the delivery of SRTS. 27 Schools in Dublin City are in Round 1 and 23 in subsequent rounds.

On October 17th 2022 Minister Eamon Ryan announced an acceleration in the delivery of the Safe Routes To School (Item 23 Scheme [Pathfinder – 35 new schemes to boost public transport, cycling walking.](#)) This is the current priority for the School Mobility Programme. Under this accelerated SRTS DCC have identified 10 locations where for front of school gate treatment for 13 SRTS schools and 3 adjacent schools. The City Transport Projects Team are currently working with National Transport Authority Cycling Design Office on the designs.

To date:

The **Assumption Schools** at the Walkinstown location have been completed;

The following Schools have agreed to the preliminary designs.

**Our Lady Consolation National School** Collins Avenue East and adjacent **Scoil Chiaráin CBS**, Collins Avenue East, Donnycarney, Dublin 5.

**Broombridge Educate Together National School**, Bannow Road, Dublin 7.

**St Fiachras's Junior and Senior National Schools**, Montrose Park, Beaumont, Dublin 9.

**Drumcondra National School**, Church Avenue, Drumcondra, Dublin 9.

There will be a period of non-statutory consultation from 24th April to 12th May 2023. This will be achieved as follows

- The school will send school communities the School Zone designs, information leaflets and resources on using School Zones.
- The schools will display posters of the proposed School Zone design at the school gates.
- Dublin City Council have arranged leaflet drops to immediate school neighbours.
- The designs, information leaflets and Green-Schools analysis are displayed on Dublin City Council Citizen Space for online viewing.
- External stakeholders associated with the schools eg cycle bus have been contacted.
- NTA, An Taisce Green-Schools and Community Garda have been contacted.
- Local Area office have been advised to send information to Elected Members.

The remaining schools have undergone school gate observations and site visits and are at concept design

- **Stratford National and Secondary Schools**, Zion Road, Rathgar Dublin 6
- **Kildare Place National School**, Upper Rathmines Road, Dublin 6
- **Harold's Cross Educate Together Secondary School** and **National School** and adjacent **St Clare's Primary School**, Harold's Cross Road, Dublin 6 W
- **St Joseph's CBS National and Secondary Schools**, Marino, Fairview, Dublin 3
- **St Brigid's Girls National School** and adjacent **St Mary's Secondary School**, Finglas Road Old Glasnevin, Dublin 11.

Collaboration is continuing with School Warden Service, Parking Enforcement and Green-Schools Travel Officers, local area offices and community Gardaí on the development of information for schools in promoting the effective use of their SZ in terms of promoting legal, respectful and sensible parking and driving in an around schools.

We are maintaining contact with all schools in regards to the status of their SZ and responding to all requests for updates.

A presentation to the Dublin **Cycling Campaign** public meeting on **Enabling Cycling To School** on 27<sup>th</sup> April 2023.

### **E-bike Loan Scheme for Staff**

The Environment & Transport Department are trialling an e-bike loan scheme for staff to encourage more staff to cycle to work. While electric bikes make cycling accessible to a broader group of people they are expensive to buy. This scheme gives participants the opportunity to take an e-bike home and try using it for various journeys for a month to see what it's like to own one. For participants interested in buying an e-bike at the end of the scheme, they are available through the Cycle to Work Scheme.

### **The Active Travel (AcT) Programme – Walk-Wheel-Cycle Network**

The Active Travel Programme Office and HR Department are progressing competitions for Assistant Engineers and Executive Engineers. An additional Walking and Cycling Officer commenced duties at the start of April.

A key achievement for April was the completion of the installation of 500 metres of protected cycle track on the **Howth Road - Baldoyle to Fairview project**. Measures were implemented along **Grange Road**, from the Hole in the Wall roundabout to the Fingal County Council Boundary. This work was achieved through a collaborative effort between AcTPRO and DCC Traffic.

Construction activities also continued on four key projects during the month. These are Clontarf to City Centre Project (C2CC), Royal Canal Greenway Phase 3, South Grand Canal Safety Improvement Scheme and Dodder Greenway Herbert Park to Donnybrook.

The **Clontarf to City Centre Project** will deliver 8km of walking facilities, 6km of cycling facilities, and 5.4km of bus lanes, from Alfie Byrne Road/Clontarf Road Junction to Amiens Street/Talbot Street Junction and a section of the Tolka Valley Greenway from Annesley Bridge to Alfie Byrne Road/East Wall Road Junction. Construction commenced in Q1 2022 and will continue until Q1 2024.

800m of new cycle track and footpaths were opened along Fairview Park from Malahide Road to the Tolka early April, which users are currently enjoying. The fourth project leaflet was distributed in early April to over 52,000 homes and businesses around the C2CC catchment giving project updates and photographs of project progress. This is available for download from our webpage [www.c2cc.ie](http://www.c2cc.ie). Works are continuing along the inbound bus lane almost all the way along the proposed route, and in Fairview and Amiens Street works have moved to the outbound side. Further to the road closure at East Wall Road, close to the junction of North Strand during the Easter holidays, the road has now reopened to traffic on time, and after a productive two weeks, works have significantly progressed at this location.

Night-time and weekend works involving major traffic management measures continued in April, similar to February and March. Sites included Clontarf Road at the Alfie Byrne Road junction, North Strand Road, between Northbrook Avenue and Bessborough Avenue, and East Wall Road junction. Similar works will continue for the next few months at various locations.

Works on the limestone sea wall along North Strand, which commenced in January 2023, were completed in April. Works have continued outside CIE headquarters, adjacent to Connolly Station. Furthermore, Buckingham Street and Five Lamps junction cycletrack and bus lane works are ongoing on the outbound side of Amiens Street since February. Works between 'Edges' corner and Malahide Road along Fairview are also ongoing on the outbound side since March. The remaining sections will switch in the middle of June.

It is anticipated that the Contractor shall need a significant number of weekends over the next couple of months to progress works, on the larger junctions along the route in particular. These works facilitate full depth road constriction, duct crossings and drainage works in the middle of the carriageway and are best undertaken at night-time or weekend when traffic volumes are lower. Advance notice of these works shall continue to be circulated.

The Contractor continues to average 70 operatives across 19 crews. The traffic diversion from Edges corner into the city has enabled the Contractor to progress works on multiple work fronts over nearly the full length of the scheme.

**Royal Canal Greenway Phase 3** will provide 2.1 km of cycling facilities and 2.1 km of walking facilities along the Royal Canal, from Newcomen Bridge (North Strand Road) to Cross Guns Bridge (Phibsborough Road). The contract has been awarded and construction commenced on site in February 2023 and will continue until Q2 2025.

The second project information leaflet was distributed to local businesses and residents (approx. 4,500 leaflets delivered) at the end of March 2023 and a dedicated webpage for the project is available at [www.dublincity.ie/RCGP3](http://www.dublincity.ie/RCGP3). This will be updated on a regular basis as the project proceeds.

The public information evenings were held at Mud Island Cottage, North Strand on 4<sup>th</sup> April and at Phibsborough Library on 12<sup>th</sup> April. A steady stream of people attended throughout both evenings.

On 17<sup>th</sup> April, the towpath between Cross Guns Bridge (Phibsborough) and Binns Bridge (Drumcondra) closed to the public. The Contractor is currently securing the site and implementing tree protection measures in advance of the piling works for the bridge foundations and construction of the bridge abutments to the east of Lock 3.

The towpath between Binns Bridge (Drumcondra) and Russell Street Bridge (Croke Park) remains open, but is expected to close to the public in mid-May 2023. Sheet piling works to strengthen the canal bank are anticipated to start shortly thereafter.

On 19<sup>th</sup> April, the towpath between Russell Street Bridge (Croke Park) and Clarke's Bridge (Ballybough) closed to the public. Sheet piling works commenced the same day and are ongoing. These works are scheduled to continue until the end of June 2023.

The towpath between Clarke's Bridge (Ballybough) and Newcomen Bridge (North Strand) also remains open. However, in early June 2023 the Contractor is planning to commence construction works on Charleville Mall. Towpath works directly outside St. Vincent's Girls School will only be scheduled for the school summer holiday period and will finish before the new school term resumes in September 2023.

The Contractor has acquired a site compound area adjacent to the canal at North Richmond Street, Dublin 1 and is currently setting up site offices and welfare facilities for the Contractor and Project Team. The Project Team are in the process of acquiring a licence from DCC for the Contractor to temporarily use Portland Place Park to facilitate a portion of the works, and to provide access to the works area. At this time, it is expected that the Contractor will occupy the park in mid-May 2023. The intention is to refurbish the park when the Contractor hands it back to DCC's Parks Division.

The design of the towpath ramp to the east of Binns Bridge, in consultation with Waterways Ireland, is nearing completion. An amending Part 8 planning application is expected to be submitted in June 2023. Consultation with the DCC Parks Division with regards to the landscape design for Portland Place Park, following project completion, is ongoing.

The **South Grand Canal Cycle Safety Improvements** scheme involves the upgrade of existing signalised junctions from Leeson Street Junction to Suir Road junction by 'tightening' wide junctions to improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists, and will also provide signalised pedestrian crossings.

Works on site were put on hold for a few days during the recent Presidential visit, and are now back fully operational.

The footpath build out work at Clogher Road Junction is nearing completion. Road crossings for the new traffic signal ducting are in, with three out of four footpath build outs completed. Two Public Lighting columns and associated infrastructure were also relocated. The final North West corner is due to be completed within two weeks with resurfacing of the junction to follow on from that.

Work has also progressed on some of the minor junction works. Build outs were completed at Herberton Drive and are currently underway at Aughavana Road.

Contractors Cairn Construction have been appointed to undertake measures for the **Liffey Cycle Route** along Eden Quay (0.25km section) from O' Connell Bridge to Butt Bridge/Beresford Place junction. Installation works are to commence in May 2023. Preliminary designs have also been prepared for measures along George's, Burgh, Aston & Crampton Quay (0.8km) from Talbot Memorial Bridge to the Ha'penny Bridge. Internal consultation and engagement with all stakeholders is ongoing. It is proposed to go to tender for a Contractor in May/ June 2023.

**The Dodder Greenway (Herbert Park to Donnybrook Road)** Project will deliver 450m of walking and cycling facilities, including flood protection measures, along the Dodder River between the entrance to Herbert Park at Eglinton Terrace and Anglesey Bridge.

Piling for the cantilevered section of the Flood Defence Walls commenced in February and were completed on the 9th of March 2023. The curtain walls between these piles are approximately 25% complete, masonry cladding has also begun. Accommodation Works for Bective Lawn Tennis Club have begun, with the viewing area adjacent the existing court now complete. The Invasive Species have been removed from site under licence. The Site Entrance at Donnybrook Road adjacent Anglesey Bridge is being use as a secondary entrance and is operating well.

Design proposals are at an advanced stage along five sections of the **Dodder Greenway**. These locations are Fitzwilliam Quay to Londonbridge Road, Beatty's Avenue to Herbert Park, Donnybrook Road to Clonskeagh Road, Clonskeagh Bridge to Patrick Doyle Road and Orwell Road to Dodder Road Lower.

Non-Statutory Public Consultation on the two sections from Fitzwilliam Quay to Londonbridge Road and Beatty's Avenue to Herbert Park is due to commence in May 2023.

Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council plan to proceed with lodging a Part VIII for the Clonskeagh Bridge to Patrick Doyle Road section in Q2 2023. AA and EIA screening reports are being progressed for the remaining sections.

The **Kilmainham to Thomas Street Project** team has reviewed all the submissions and prepared a Public Consultation Report on the proposed measures for the section from Suir Road to Thomas Street. This is currently being reviewed by internal Dublin City Council Departments. The design team have also been progressing with the preparation of the detailed design drawings and works requirements and the Statutory Requests for new lining and signage. Installation of the scheme is planned to commence in Q2 2023. The Public Consultation Report along with the design drawings will be published on the DCC Active Travel webpage before work commences. The Elected members will be notified in advance of the publication of the report.

The **City Quay to Harcourt Street** project team completed the preparation of concept designs and photomontages for Merrion Street Upper, Merrion Square West, Merrion Street Lower. The

concepts have incorporated significant public realm opportunities. This has supported further internal DCC consultations and engagement with stakeholders.

The **Sandyford (Clonskeagh) to City Centre** team are currently preparing the Public Consultation report following the non statutory public consultation. Detailed design for measures on the scheme were in progress during the month with a view to implementing them later in the year. The review of these submissions has been ongoing during the month. A Public Consultation Report is being prepared for publication on the DCC website

The Active Travel team are currently preparing the Public Consultation Reports as well as the service requirements for the appointment of Engineering design teams to develop the detailed design for the following six schemes:

- North Circular Road ( from Dorset St Lwr to Amiens St)
- Hanlon's Corner Junction Upgrade
- Ratoath Road & Cappagh Rd
- Howth Rd, from Station Rd to James Larkin Rd ( Raheny to Kilbarrack)
- Kilbarrack Rd to Oscar Traynor Rd.
  
- **Trinity to Ballsbridge**  
This designs for this scheme are proposed go to Public Consultation in May 2023. Information leaflets have being developed and will be distributed in the local area during the Public Consultation period. The Active Travel design team held a meeting with representatives of the Artists (that trade on Merrion Square on Sundays) in March 2023. When the scheme is published more information, including closing date for submissions can be found on the Dublin City Council Public Consultation Hub at <https://consultation.dublincity.ie/>

**Concept and Preliminary designs** are progressing and internal consultation ongoing on the schemes listed below.

- **Coolock to Clontarf ( Gracefield Rd, Brookwood Ave, Sybil Hill Rd & Vernon Ave)**  
Preliminary designs are progressing and internal consultation ongoing. It is planned to present this scheme to the Elected members in the North Central Area in Q2 2023. Following that and pending NTA approval the scheme will proceed to non-statutory public Consultation
- **Grand Canal to Lincoln Place**  
Preliminary designs are progressing and internal consultation ongoing. It is planned to present this scheme to the Elected members in the South East Area in Q2 2023. Following that and pending NTA approval the scheme will proceed to non-statutory public Consultation.
- **Parnell Street to College Green**  
Preliminary designs are progressing and internal consultation ongoing. It is planned to present this scheme to the Elected members in the Central & South East Areas in Q3 2023. Following that and pending NTA approval the scheme will proceed to non-statutory public Consultation.
- The Concept Design and Option Selection process for the **Finglas Village Improvement Scheme** are being advanced. It is intended to go to public consultation in Q2 2023 pending NTA approval to proceed and confirmation of funding availability.
- On the **Royal Canal Greenway Phase 4**, an amending Part VIII is proposed to be submitted in May 2023 subject to approval to proceed from DCC Planning. Phase 4 construction works are planned to commence in Q4 2023 pending Part VIII approval.



A Ground Investigation contractor has been appointed to carry out ground investigation (GI) works in the locality of the rail overpass (Phase 4C). It is anticipated that GI works will commence on site in May 2023.

Kerb realignment works have been substantially completed on Broombridge Road to facilitate bus turning movements, planters have arrived on site and are awaiting planting by the contractor.

- For the **Fitzwilliam Cycle Route**, tender submissions for construction are due at the end of April. It is anticipated that construction will commence in Q3 2023 and will take twelve months to complete.
- The **Chesterfield Avenue Project** involves the upgrade of walking and cycle facilities in the Phoenix Park between Castleknock and Conyngham Road/Parkgate Street in a manner that is in keeping with the vision for the park into the future. The Active Travel team are currently liaising with the OPW. Tender documents for the engagement of a multi-disciplinary design teams have been prepared and are now undergoing third party review. It is planned to publish the tender in May 2023.
- The concept design and option selection for **Seville Place (Guild Street to Amiens Street)** are being advanced. It is intended to go to public consultation in Q2 2023 pending NTA approval to proceed and confirmation of funding availability.
- For the **Royal Canal Phase 3 – Binns Bridge**, Pre-Part VIII is to commence in April, with the Part VIII scheduled for noting at the June Central Area Committee meeting.
- The **Grand Canal Greenway (Blackhorse to Portobello)** is currently at the Concept Development and Options Selection Phase. AcTPrO is preparing the service requirements for the appointment of a multidisciplinary design team to progress the scheme. The review of the draft Strategic Assessment Report was completed during this quarter. It is planned to submit the Strategic Assessment Report for NTA approval during Q2 2023.

### **Water Bottle Filling stations**

As part of the initial pilot scheme three water bottle refill stations were purchased. One unit has been installed in Clarendon Row with another unit to be included as part of the public realm improvement scheme on Adelaide Road and the final unit will be included in the Temple Bar Square Area Improvement Scheme. The feedback and learning from this pilot scheme will inform any wider rollout.

### New Policy/Strategic

The new City Development Plan 2022-28, was approved by the City Council on 2<sup>nd</sup> November last, and came into effect on 14<sup>th</sup> December, following a 2 year intensive consultation process. The new plan must provide for a population increase from approx. 550,000 in 2016 up to 640,000 by 2028. The core strategy provides for approximately 40,000 new homes over the next 6 years, with associated employment, together with social and physical infrastructure.

## **Culture, Recreation & Economic Services**

### **New Policy/Strategy**

The “**Strategic Sports Plan – Review**” – ongoing. Consultants have been engaged with and the plan is due to be complete by Nov 2023.

A new **national public library strategy** will shortly be launched. It will be the successor to ‘*Our Public Libraries 2022 – Inspiring, Connecting and Empowering Communities*’ which has overseen much progress in the public library service in Ireland over the past 5 years.

The “**DCC Tourism Strategy 2023 – 2028**” is under development and an update was provided to the members of the Economic Development and Enterprise SPC on 25<sup>th</sup> April. The “**Dublin Place Brand Strategy – Advancing a Shared Brand Vision for Dublin**” - is also well advanced and an update was also provided to SPC members at the April meeting. A new brand driver is recommended and will be used as part of a Dublin Place Brand Culture campaign that will go live in June 2023.

Work has commenced on the development of a Culture Strategy.

### **Departmental Priority**

Sports & Recreation have carried out a thorough review of the Sports Capital Programme within the context of funding, significant inflation, availability of professional services, supply chain delays and compliance with strict procurement procedures.

**Local Economic and Community Plan 2022-2027 (LECP)** Advisory Group formed with ongoing meetings. High Level Goals and associated objectives amended at joint meeting of SPC and LCDC member on 22<sup>nd</sup> Feb. Preparations for Stage 2 – consultation are underway. **Dublin Regional Enterprise Plan – DREP 2024** DCC is leading on or supporting 20 of the 26 actions within the plan. A quarterly update was provided. The Implementation Group plan to meet in June. The SoCircular brochure was circulated to members as it was supported by DREP.

**Night Time Economy** Pilot application for participation in NTE project was successful. The two year pilot will commence with the appointment of a Night Time Advisor – competition to be advertised in May. Economic Development and Enterprise SPC Summit Series to focus on Night Time Economy in Q 4 – and will consider findings of Your Dublin Your Voice survey.

**Dublin Circular Economy Hotspot 2023** DCC is supporting the Circular Economy Hotspot 29/05-01/06/23. Tickets are on sale and the programme is available online. Chairs of each of the SPC’s have been invited to attend. Economic Development office is directly involved in developing the deep dive / workshop on social enterprise on day 3 of the programme.

**Dublin Belfast Circular Economy Capital Expenditure Feasibility Shared Island Funding.** DCC/Belfast City Council have commenced working on implementing the feasibility study to create a Connected Circular Economy between the two cities. Tender complete.

**Trading Online Vouchers (TOV) in 2023:** 43 applications approved to a value of €90,946.

**Feasibility, Priming and Expansion Grants approvals 2023:** 14 grants were approved to the

value of €197,284 supporting the creation of 18 employment opportunities in the Dublin city economy this year to date.

**Mentoring:** 345 hours of mentoring completed 1<sup>st</sup> Jan – 31<sup>st</sup> Mar. Annual target 1,000 hours.

**Training:** 1,897 participants & 62 courses delivered 1st Jan – 31st Mar. Annual target 3,000 hours.

**Start Your Own Business:** 187 participants attended 6 courses 1st Jan – 31<sup>st</sup> March 23. Annual target, 227 participants & 13 courses.

**Healthy Ireland at your Library** Continuing in May, Dublin City Libraries will host a series of presentations and workshops on the themes of #Be Well #Eat Well #Think Well

The winner of the **Dublin Literary Award** will be revealed on Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> May at the International Literature Festival Dublin which will be a ten day event this year taking place in Merrion Square park from 19<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> May. **75 Filming Applications** were received by the Dublin City Council Film Office in April 2023.

**Visitor Access Management Plan (VAMP) - North Bull Island Nature Reserve** supports nine internationally important habitats and a range of protected species and has an estimated 2 million visitors annually. Surveys commissioned over the last number of years revealed the significant negative impacts to wildlife as a result of people walking in sensitive areas and dogs being off lead. In consideration of the survey findings and following consultation with stakeholders, DCC is proposing a VAMP that requires people not to access the salt marsh (where migratory birds feed & roost) or the northern tip of the island (where seals pup & haul out). 'Zones' will be marked with signage and colour coding as follows; red (no access), blue (dogs on lead) and green (off lead outside of bathing season/bathing hours). An information and awareness raising campaign is underway to support the VAMP. Feedback on this proposal is welcome. It is targeted for implementation from April 30<sup>th</sup> 2023.

**Historic Structure Fund (HSF) Grant Award - Red Stables Building Enhancements Works** DCC were awarded €200k in HSF 2023 grant funding to complete restoration works to the roof of the Red Stables Building. This grant award is subject to DCC providing the equivalent match funding. Works proposed will include re-slatting of the roof with salvaged and new/reclaimed green Westmoreland slates; repairs to brick chimneys; repair/replacement of eaves and barge boards & associated ancillary works e.g. insulation.

#### **Smart D8 has released its Call for Pilots 2023 for Health and Wellbeing**

Following two years of success in delivering 8 impactful and scalable pilots, Smart D8 will continue with a third open call for pilots in three areas: Population Health, Positive and Healthy Ageing, and Connected Patients in the Community. Smart D8 is looking to engage and collaborate with private companies, academics, healthcare providers and public organisations who want to demonstrate their innovative solutions with the local community. The latest call for pilots follows significant work undertaken in the community to date, with a total €50,000 fund available across the projects selected. The Smart D8 Consortium also hosted its latest meeting in the Guinness Enterprise Centre to discuss latest evolutions including, but not limited to, the Call for Pilots 2023, next quarter aspirations, and ongoing strategy. #### **Dublin City Tourism Unit Update**

The Smart City Unit has been a key partner in the success of the Smart Tourism programme for Dublin and the establishment of the new Dublin City Tourism Unit. Along with the Dublin City Council Culture Company the unit has responsibility for fostering development of tourism in our city. The Dublin City Tourism Unit provides a key tourism advisory function from within Dublin City Council and now manages the Smart Tourism programme. It advises and supports the city on all aspects of tourism development as well as provide several key functions such as tourism strategy development, data and insights reporting and digital product development. It is also responsible for the development of digital tourism offerings such as the [new Dublin Discovery Trails App](#). The Unit is also responsible for the ongoing development of the award winning Smart Tourism Programme for Dublin.

#### **Service & Digital Transformation**

A new public consultation and community engagement tool is being piloted for the LECP consultation. Requirement gathering is underway to inform a procurement for a corporate public consultation and engagement tool.

The project to implement a new Chief Executive Orders system based on the system developed by Fingal continues to be rollout out. Phase two is now live for Planning and Property Development and LEO. Currently working with Housing and Law to prepare for phase three.

The team continued to roll out the online appointment booking system to allow citizens and businesses to book either in-person or online meetings. This solution will be publicised again across the Council to encourage other services to avail of it.

The online venue booking system has gone live with the Arts office. This allows groups or individuals book and pay for a DCC venue online. This solution will be made available across other DCC Venues that the public can book. This will make it easier for citizens and groups to book venues as they can see what times slots etc. are available.

The initial phase of a project to provide access to technology for City Council outdoor staff has commenced. Phones and a digital identity will be provided in early May to staff from two pilot depots.

The deadline for submissions of projects for staff awards scheme was extended with Awards scheduled for May.

Two working groups have been set up to work on developing collaborative workspaces for staff to facilitate in-person and hybrid team-working.

Work continued on the digitisation of internal processes on CitiDesk. Work is ongoing with the HR, Law, Finance and IS Departments in relation to internal business processes. We have commenced engagement with Housing and Planning and property development.

Work has continued on the draft Digital Strategy.

The Service design framework is being used to review and improve two services at the moment.

The Digital application support team are working with the Communications Unit and Big Motive to agree Website governance, privacy and accessibility standards.

Engagement is ongoing with Active Travel and Climate Action to facilitate use of the Citizen alerts platform for related alerts and notifications.

### **Citizen Hub Project**

The old Oracle CRM system has now been decommissioned and all services are now available on Citizen Hub. We are currently reviewing processes built to streamline and improve them based on usage in the last few months and working with UX/Ui consultants to improve how citizen hub integrates with dublincity.ie so there is a more seamless experience for customers and businesses. The Councillor portal is also being worked on as is a solution for customers who wish to engage with us through Irish. The reporting solution is also being worked on so we can monitor response times to requests.

### **Corporate Data and Analytics Unit**

The Data & Analytics Unit continue to build dashboards for Citizen Hub.

The first phase of the automation of the Service Delivery Plan is complete. This phase is focused on Housing and all initial stakeholder engagements have now taken place. These initial meetings have been extremely positive and have led to a significant amount of learnings in respect of identifying data sources, extracting metrics and documenting same.

The Unit are currently investigating a centralised platform that will provide a controlled environment for the Unit to build reports and dashboards for the business owners, including Citizen Hub.

The first phase of stakeholder engagement with the key data stakeholders in DFB has been completed and the documenting of these processes is underway. Another aspect of the data management pilot is to implement a data governance tool.

The Unit carries out the function of Open Data Liaison and supports departments and sections with open data queries and assisting the City Council with meeting its requirements under the Open Data & Re-Use of Data Act.

### **North City Operations Depot**

Construction of the North City Depot (NCOD) commenced in May 2021 with a 19 month programme for completion. To date the main structural work to the Administration & Welfare Building, multi-storey carpark, Central Stores and Workshops is complete. Mechanical and Electrical (M&E) fit out to all these buildings are nearing completion. Finishing works such as plastering, painting, raised floors, tiling and carpentry are in the final stages in the Administration and Welfare Building.

Construction of the Civic Amenity Site office and yard are nearing completion with work ongoing to the finishes to the office and finishing of internal roadways. Work on the Salt Barn's timber cladding is complete. External works and below ground services are nearing completion, with fencing works and works at the access points on-going.

The scheduled completion of construction is currently within the next number of weeks. Following construction there will be a short period required for furniture and IS fit out. The target is to commence the movement of operations into the NCOD in June subject to no further delays.

Engagement with staff and Unions on the Change Management aspects of the project is progressing well and meetings with Unions are being held regularly. Information posters and leaflets are due to be issued to depots and staff in the coming days. Staff visits to the depot are being organised for the latter part of May.

### **Customer Services**

In excess of 10,000 calls were answered and approximately 2,650 emails were sent out by Customer Services between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April.

Customer Services have logged in excess of 1,200 Housing Maintenance requests between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April.

Customer Services have taken in excess of 1,700 payments between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April.

Customer Services have processed almost 1,200 Parking Permits between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April.

The Reception Desk in Civic Offices continues to be busy, with approximately 1,400 visitors to reception between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April.

### **Improving Customer Experience Initiatives**

Work is continuing on the development of the new Parking Permit System to facilitate online applications and this is now scheduled to go live in May.

A number of new staff have joined Customer Services and most have now completed their training. This has speeded up the average time for a customer to be answered on the phone and between 20<sup>th</sup> March and 14<sup>th</sup> April, this has reduced to under 2 minutes.



JAM card training has commenced in North East Inner City office and discussions have started with Libraries to schedule appropriate training time. JAM card training has been added as mandatory training for Customer Services staff and this has commenced.

#### **SDP05 Housing Rent & Tenant Purchase Administration – Rent Management**

Dublin City Council manages approximately 25,251 tenancies, with a rental income of c. €96m projected for 2023. Average Council rent in September 2022 was €72.41 per week. The weekly rent charge is determined in accordance with the 2019 Dublin City Council Differential Rent Scheme. Tenants have a variety of rent payment options, including payment by direct debit, household budget, payment of cash at any post office or in the Council's own cash office in the Civic Offices, online or telephone payment via credit card.

The Council engages with Tenants in arrears and their representatives and will agree fair and realistic repayment plans and advise tenants of debt relief solutions. While the primary aim is tenancy sustainment, tenants who will not address rent arrears will be subject to the provisions of the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2014 which provides the legislative framework for pursuing breaches of rent payment obligations up to and including repossession of the property.

## SDP06 Housing Grants

The Home Grants Unit delivers three grant schemes to provide assistance to people making adaptations to their privately owned homes to meet their medical needs or to older people carrying out essential repairs. On submission of a full application, an applicant will have an initial inspection from a Dublin City Council Technical Inspector within four weeks of receipt of the application. In circumstances where an urgent hospital release or other critical cases require immediate attention, the Home Grants Unit will try to carry out an inspection immediately after contact is made and the application will be fast-tracked.
