**Crime Prevention
Matters and Other
Information**

There has been continued engagement with local stakeholders in the Dunard and Maple Centre area. Following on from meeting with our Crime Prevention officers, businesses in the Maple Centre have made adjustments to the environment around their premises, resulting in a notable decrease in instances of Anti – Social Behaviour.

The issue of stolen cars being driven dangerously (aka Joy-Riding) in the area is still present, but has decreased. There has been a programme of our JLO engaging with the families of youths at risk of this behaviour in an effort to curb same. In addition, the local Policing Forum for Cabra West conducted a leaflet drop in relation to the issue. There has been a notable decrease in instances of this behaviour.

Crime prevention advice and programmes continue through regular Bike Marking days, Retired Active Persons meetings and school visits.

It should be noted that in any reference to statistics, those statistics are provisional, operational, liable to change and some possibly re-classified with the introduction of Central Statistics Office reports.
