Road Maintenance Services

The delivery of Road Maintenance Services' Annual Works Programme for 2023 is being delivered on-site. The programme will achieve approximately 30km of footpath upgrade works and 18km of carriageway resurfacing works this year. Twelve contracts have been awarded and construction works are currently being carried out across the City. During the period January to November 2023, the Division's direct labour crews repaired/ made safe approximately 5,000 defects and hazards on the road network. Furthermore. durina the same approximately 420 critical defects and hazards on the road network were repaired/ made safe within 24-hours of them being reported.

Parking Tag and alternative methods of paying for parking

The numbers using the Parking Tag have increased and by week ending 3rd December 2023, that week's revenue was €443,722.01. For week ending 3rd December 2023, the usage of coin in parking meters was €107,855.85 and for week ending 3rd December 2023 card payments were €157,270.45.

Permit Parking, Pay & Display

A new Residential Parking Permit scheme commenced on Thor Place, Dublin 7 on Monday 4th December 2023. The hours of operation are Monday to Sunday 7am to Midnight.

Waste Services Update

Street Grading

A review of the street grading program is currently underway and a revised version of the program will commence in Q1 2024. Area Inspectors will take the lead in the revised program, taking responsibility for grading and assessments in their own inspectoral areas resulting in improved accountability. Additional IT resources will be ordered to facilitate the revised program, and a detailed schedule of on street assessments will be rolled out thereafter.

Recycling Services

Recycling Services - Public Survey

Waste Management Services collaborated with Economic Development Section's in October 2023 to complete a Your Dublin, Your Voice public survey on the Council's recycling infrastructure (84 Bring Banks, 8 Neighbourhood Bring Centres and 3 Recycling Centres). With over 1,000 submissions received, this was the highest response received for any Your Dublin, Your Voice survey to date. A summary of the findings and suggested improvements is detailed below.

Overall trends

- Majority of people are satisfied with our facilities - 74% are satisfied with Bring Banks, 75% are satisfied with our Neighbourhood Bring Centres and 75% are satisfied with the Recycling Centres.
- 91% of people say the reason they use our recycling facilities is because it is good for the environment.
- Younger and newer arrivals to Dublin are less likely to use recycling facilities
- Most people find their local recycling facility by searching the internet (45%).

Bring Bank Findings

- The Bring Banks are the most frequently used facility with 81% of people stating they use them. 78% visiting them at least once a month.
- 70% use a car, 43% walk and 16% cycle to a Bring Bank.

- On average it takes people 8 minutes to reach a Bring Bank.
- 59% would be in favour of a new Bring Bank within 100 metres of their home.

Neighbourhood Bring Centres Findings

- 42% of people say they use a Neighbourhood Bring Centre with 36% visiting at least once per month.
- Most used Neighbourhood Bring Centres are Oscar Traynor Road (20%), Grangegorman (19%) and Windmill Road (17%).
- Saturday was the most popular day (45%) and between 11am and 1pm was the most popular time for a visit (28%).
- 78% of people use a car, 26% walk and 17% cycle to get to the Neighbourhood Bring Centre. On average, it takes people 12 mins to get there.

Recycling Centres Findings

- 49% use the recycling centres with 14% visiting at least once a month.
- 94% of people use a car, 7% walk and
 6% cycle to a Recycling Centre.
- On average it takes people 18 minutes to get there.
- Saturday was the most popular day (43%) and between 11am and 1pm was the most popular time for a visit (25%).
- North strand was the most used Recycling Centre (21%).
- Most commonly recycled free items at recycling centres are – glass (75%), clothes (53%) and batteries (51%)
- Most commonly recycled paid for items at recycling centres are – Household hazardous waste (e.g. pesticide, paints) (30%), green waste (30%) and bulky (27%).

Potential Actions

- Bicycle stand / parking for loading and unloading, especially at Bring Banks and Bring Centres.
- Review and improve the search results on google (to help people find our facilities)
- Review and address the visual appearance of the facilities
- Awareness campaign targeting young people
- Awareness campaign targeting people new to Dublin (less than 5 years)
- Increase opening hours

 Ensure staffing levels appropriate for busy time and days - Saturdays and between 11am and 1pm.

Grangegorman Bring Centre

Dublin City Council and Grangegorman Development Agency have reached agreement in principle on a proposal to ensure the short and medium term continuance of a bring centre facility in Grangegorman that provides the full range of services currently offered in the existing Grangegorman Bring Centre. Negotiations to reach formal agreement of the proposals are currently underway.



The existing Grangegorman Bring Centre will remain in place for a further two years. Following this two year period, the facility will move to a temporary site directly adjacent to the current bring centre for a further five year period. This proposed site will facilitate all of the existing recycling services currently available at Grangegorman Bring Centre. The development of this new temporary facility will progress during the two year period outlined above.

This proposal will ensure the continued provision of bring centre services in Grangegorman for a total of seven years, during which time Dublin City Council will source and develop a new permanent recycling facility in the Central Area.

Schools Awards

Our Lady Of Victories, Infant School, Ballymun was announced as the winner in the City Neighbourhoods, Schools competition on Friday 1 December, 2023 in the Mansion House. Gardiner Street Primary School received Runner-up with Canalway Educate Together, N.S, Scoil Aine, Raheny and Scoil Iosagain, Crumlin all receiving Endeavour awards.

Lord Mayor Daithí de Róiste presented the awards and congratulated all the school for their involvement in environmental projects.

Global Green City Award

The "Sustainable Cities And Human Settlements Awards" (SCAHSA) (originally "Global Human Settlements Award") is an annual worldwide prize awarded by Global Forum on Human Settlements (GFHS) and supported UNEP. The awards program is focused on promoting the implementation of UN sustainable development goals, notably SDG recommending winners' outstanding progress and valuable experience on building safer. more resilient. inclusive sustainable cities and human settlements, and driving more people to follow suit and take decisive actions on the ground.

Dublin City has been awarded the 'Global Green City Award 2023' by the Global Forum on Human Settlements during their 18th Annual Session of the Forum in Dubai, a COP28 associated event.

The 'Global Green City Award' has in the past been awarded to Vienna, Vancouver, Oakland, Curtiba, Nantes, Mannheim and Yokohoma and now brings Dublin City into a group of cities that must continue to lead on the global stage and be active in our commitment to sustainable urban development that is green, fair, smart, and transformative.




Dublin City Council's submission to the award was reviewed by a technical jury. The application was evaluated based on 85 indicators in key areas that determined Dublin City's performance in areas such as Sustainable urban Development, Climate Action, Transport, and Nature based solutions.

Smart City/Smart Dublin

Dublin City Council wins designation for European Capital of Smart Tourism 2024



Dublin City has been announced as the Smart Tourism Capital designation for 2024 by the European Commission. This was announced after a presentation to jurors in Brussels that showcased Dublin's best sustainable, digital, accessible, and cultural projects across various sectors, including industry, government, the private sector and community.

The city's win among 30 candidates spanning 17 countries comes from its unique initiatives like 14 Henrietta Street, EPIC the Irish Emigration Museum, and the Dublin Discovery Trails App. In 2019, Dublin was among the first European cities to establish a dedicated smart tourism program, which has since evolved into a dedicated tourism unit for the city with the support of Dublin City Council, Culture Company Smart Dublin, and Dublin City Council. Dublin City Council represented at Rockefeller Foundation 'Al to Benefit Humanity'

Jamie Cudden, Smart City Programme Manager participated in an international workshop hosted by the Rockerfeller Foundation and OpenAl with selection of global cities, academia, philanthropy and NGO's to understand how Al can benefit humanity through its applications in cities. Cities need to get ahead of the curve on Al to develop frameworks to grab the opportunities but also need to manage the risk associated with AI. The event involved technical master classes from the OpenAI team, quick fire presentations and workshops challenging cities to think about how AI can be used to transform city services and deliver positive outcomes for our communities. The outcome of this will help support DCC's framework of use of AI in 2024.



Smart Docklands Networking Event

At our end of year networking event in the vaults of Dogpatch labs almost 100 attendees joined us to celebrate achievements over 2023. This included a mix of attendees from across the Dublin ecosystem from big tech, SME's, start-ps, VC's, consultants, recruiters, academia, local authorities and public sector bodies.

Over the past 7 years we have built something unique with our Smart Dublin partnerships and collaboration model working with the SFI centres of CONNECT, INSIGHT and ADAPT. Through these investments we have been able to build and scale our Smart Districts Model and bring in new partners and opportunities along the way. Smart Docklands, Smart DCU and Smart D8 are

Implementation of the Irish Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty through Digital Services and Smart Cities Solutions in Dublin City Council



Dublin City Council's Smart Cities Unit and the Digital Services team have developed one of the first implementation plans; for mainstreaming human rights through the delivery and use of digital services and smart city solutions in Dublin. This is particularly relevant as the organisation is scaling up its digital service offerings as well as

deployments of Smart City solutions. The pace of change in technology is increasing at an exponential rate with new trends in AI completely changing the way we will work in the future. Working with nationally recognised Equality and Human Rights Expert Niall Crowley, both teams analysed the Irish Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty and created an evidence book to support the upholding of digital human rights in the public sector. Communications Office

The Communications Office has been working on a new project to brand all hoarding surrounding the Council's capital projects.

Two pilot projects are being worked on from the Housing section and the hoarding is expected to be in place at both these sites within the next month. These are at Glin Court and St Finbarr's Court.

Once the hoarding has been installed, site visits will take place with members of the Senior Management Team.

A set of branding guidelines will then be developed for use on all DCC projects, including capital projects.

Service & Digital Transformation

New Online Consultation Tool:

Tenderers have been informed of the outcome of the evaluation and it is anticipated that the contract will be signed in January 2024. A transition plan is in development to ensure a platform is available for statutory consultations in the early part of the year. Consultation training materials have been developed and will be available on the Councils eLearning platform. The team have engaged with the NDA in relation to training and are also working with NALA to seek support in relation to approving content.

Chief Executive Order's system

The rollout is now complete and a review of the project will be undertaken. The Council is

working with Fingal County Council in relation to improvements identified as part of the rollout.

Citidesk

- A number of new internal processes have been added, including mobile phone requests and the team are working on some solutions for DFB, Corporate Health and Safety Office, street cleaning, Fleet management, the ethics register and vehicle downtime analysis.
- It is anticipated that the new phonebook will go live in January 2024.
- Online collaboration tool procured for pilot to begin in January
- Staff awards review complete and a framework is being developed for the 2024 awards
- Website Governance working with the Law Department to finalise document on governance, privacy and accessibility standards to ensure our websites are compliant with legislation and regulations.

Citizen Hub

Climate Action Grants are now available on the platform and a facility to book tables and make a charity donation for the Lord Mayors Ball. A service through Irish is also available and work is continuing the development of a dedicated Councillor Portal.

Online Venue Booking – working with City Hall to provide a facility for citizens to book online.

Dublin City Council BETA

A Dublin City Council initiative to imagine, trial and scale solutions for a more liveable city.

Downpour Planters (formerly #RainBoxBETA)

Downpour Planters are a progressive and effective way to ease pressure on our drainage infrastructure and alleviate flooding while enriching neighbourhoods with verdant growth.

Collaboration with Protection of Waterbodies Office.

- This project funded via the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform '2023 Innovation Fund'.
- Pilot being developed.

Housing Maintenance 'Fixit App'

A depot app which allows depot management and tradespeople to access and manage repairs on the go on a mobile device, allowing real time data capture of the job status.

Positioned under Housing Maintenance.

- Rolling out across Housing Maintenance depots.

Corporate Data and Analytics Unit

Citizen Hub: There are 18 dashboards (Waste, Parks, E & T) completed and awaiting stakeholder signoff.

25 dashboards now in place including 4 additional dashboards created for customer services using Citizen Hub data.

Digital Services: There is 1 dashboard created for the communications team in order to help them with the DCC website analytics.

Open Data: Ongoing publication of Pedestrian & Cycle Counts, Pitch Playability, and New dataset published Culture data sets - Adult learning centres. Multiple data sets have been updated and published.

Dublin Fire Brigade: Work is ongoing in reviewing existing workflows and reporting systems with a view to improving data extraction, automated reporting and dashboards for incident management and mobilisation.

Environment & Transportation:

Work has commenced on road works licencing data into the Confirm system.

The development of dashboard for Rainfall gauges is in progress.

Annual Service Delivery Plan: The stakeholder engagement with CRES is almost complete and engagement with the Planning Department has now started. Approximately 85% of the metrics for the Annual Service Delivery Plan have been documented.

Gender Pay Gap: The analysis and reporting for the Gender Pay Gap is now complete with final figures ready for submission to the LGMA, they will be published shortly.

The Data & Analytics Unit has also engaged/supported projects in Tourism, HR, Communications, Climate, Housing, Planning and Learning & Development since the last report

Customer Services

- 11,068 calls were answered between 18th November and 13th December, with 34.71% of those calls answered in less than 30 seconds.
- 2,956 emails were sent out by Customer Services between 18th November and 13th December from the generic customer services email account.
- Customer Services have taken 2,790 payments between 18th November and 13th December.
- Customer Services have processed 1,590 Parking Permits between 18th November and 13th December.
- Customer Services have introduced one new parking scheme between 18th November and 13th December.
- The Reception Desk in Civic Offices continues to be busy, with 1,081 visitors greeted at the reception desk between 18th November and 13th December.

Improving Customer Experience Initiatives

Lustomer Experience and Customer Services have set up touchscreen technology to for customers in the Atrium of the Civic Offices. This will allow customers to self-serve using Dublin City Council's website, in areas such as Voters Reg. and Citizen Hub. Staff will be made available for customers who need help with these units. Two units are already in place and are just awaiting power and data points. Two further units will be put in place in the New Year.



- Housing Allocations have increased their phone service from 10:00 to 16:00
- Housing Allocations have increased the number of appointments by 33%. There are now 50 housing appointments available per day. Housing Allocations will continue to issue appointments.
- The Reception Desk will revert to a reception only function and non-housing and planning related customer business will be dealt with in the Customer Service Centre. This will reduce queuing and waiting times.
- Customer Experience and Customer Services have started the process to engage with the Public Participation Network to hold quarterly focus group sessions. The concept is to examine opportunities for improvement in service provision and the customer experience. The first area that will be looked at is Customer Services.

The Conservation Section of Dublin City Council will administer these schemes for buildings that are either on the Record of Protected Structures, Proposed Protected Structures or buildings within Architectural Conservation Areas (ACAs) within the Dublin City Council Area only.

Built Heritage Investment Scheme

The *BHIS* supports small-scale conservation projects and the employment of skilled and experienced conservation professionals, craftspeople and tradespersons in the repair of the historic built environment.

Historic Structures Fund




