## Pay & Display Machine replacement programme



A further 100 new machines were rolled out in July bringing the total to 300 of the oldest meter stock being replaced

under the new leasing contract. A further 100 machines to be rolled out before year end ensuring that the Very High Demand Yellow zone is fully populated. The integration of real time parking data between the machine suppliers (UTS) and the Parking Tag

providers (Payzone) is ongoing with a view to developing enable a real time qqA to allow motorists view real time parking availability. Wave and pay technology and new multi-function meters to be trialled in December.

## Parking Tag and alternative methods of paying for parking

Memberships increased from 134,000 in August and 137,000 in September, 140,000 in October to 141,470 in mid November. Parking Tag transactions averaged at 85,000 per week up from 82,000 per week over the previous month. Paying in shop registered an average of 1,000 per week and the new once off payment facility from either mobile phone or debit card averaged almost 2,800 per week up from an average of 2,500 the previous month. Competitive dialogue tender process to commence in Q4 and will include all four Dublin local authorities together with Meath and Kildare County Councils.

## Car Clubs

Dublin's second car club operator, YUKO, has now set up on-street car club bases throughout the City. With the Council's support the launch of the first electric car club vehicles took place in October. There are currently 19 dedicated car club only bays in the City.

## Electric Vehicle Only Parking

There are currently 23 dedicated EV only bays in operation on the city streets and a further 8 sites being examined for suitability.



## Noise Mapping

The computation of the number of people and residential buildings exposed to various bands of sound levels have commenced and will be complete by mid December.

## Sound Survey – pre introduction of proposed Speed Limit Bye Laws

Sound measurements lasting 3 days, at 40 sites across the city have been completed and the data is currently being quality controlled and analysed.

## **ISCAPE Project**

The Horizon 2020 project called ISCAPE (Improving the **S**mart **C**ontrol of **A**ir **P**ollution in **E**urope), commenced on the 1<sup>st</sup> Of September, beginning with a first phase of six weeks. Dublin City Council is not involved with this first six week phase.

## **Air Quality Dispersion Modelling**

Work has been ongoing with our contractors in relation carrying out air dispersion modelling for the Parliament St/College Green areas. A final report will be produced mid November in relation likely Nitrogen Dioxide levels in these areas as a consequence of the College Green Plaza proposal, should it proceed.

## **Traffic Service Requests**

570 traffic service requests were received in September compared to 597 in July and ,472 in August. These requests include applications for the introduction of new residential parking schemes, pedestrian crossing, parking restrictions and many other traffic related issues.

#### Parking Enforcement Activity

A total of 5,203 enforcement actions were carried out in October up from 5,095 in September including 207 vehicle relocations. A total of 43 vehicles were impounded. Operation Open City runs from 4th-24<sup>th</sup> December with daily conference calls between all stakeholders. 24/7 Clearways will be introduced for the period at certain location to facilitate traffic flow.



## School Warden Service

There are currently 212 School Wardens employed throughout Dublin City, with 38 reserve wardens. Interviews were held in October with a further 17 wardens being put on a panel subject to Garda clearance.

#### Roadworks Control

There were 356 applications for licences for positioning of skips, cranes/hoists and scaffolding/hoardings.

## **Progress Report on Environment Projects**

## **Waste to Energy Project**

Construction remains on schedule for completion in Q3 2017 with all construction related activities currently programmed on a 24/7 basis.

The main focus of the civil and process system designers, PM Group Limited and Hitachi Zosen Inova respectively are:

- the installation and fit out of the floors of the administration building,
- works associated with the installation of the buildings' exterior cladding,
- the installation of the ramp to the tipping hall
- installation of the process equipment,
- inspection and review of process equipment manufacturing

## **Environmental Impact**

Environmental monitoring and mitigation measures continued to be implemented during the construction phase of the DWtE facility and the Construction Phase Environmental Report for quarter 2 (April–June) 2016 is available for download at the Dublin Waste to Energy Website.

To date the DWtE project environmental consultant has issued seven (7) quarterly environmental monitoring reports, which have examined the monitoring results associated with Noise, Dust Deposition and Suspended solids in Surface Water. All of the data has demonstrated that the facility construction is being undertaken in line with recognised national and international guidelines in order to avoid, or minimise, potential adverse impacts to the environment and local community.

## **Community Liaison**

## Local Office

The local information office for the Dublin Waste to Energy Facility continues to operate in the Ringsend Library, Fitzwilliam Street, Dublin 4. The office operates on Tuesday and Thursday mornings between 10:00 and 12:00.

#### Community Gain Liaison Committee (CGLC)/Community Gain Fund

The Community Gain Liaison Committee met on two occasions since the last update and visited the Waste to Energy facility in Poolbeg, Ringsend. Decisions on all 56 grant applications have now been made. 32 applications were approved in principle to a total value of €4,808, 215.95. All applicants have been notified of the outcome. Where funding has been approved in principle the successful applicant organisations have been informed of the amount approved and advised of the specific conditions that must be met in order to access the grant in each case.

As of the 14<sup>th</sup> December 2016 there have been six requests for drawdown of monies from the CGF totalling €43,185.39. The balance remaining for drawdown from the Projects Grant Scheme 2016 is €4,765,030.56. The CLGC are currently in the process of organising an independent audit and preparing an annual report which will be published in January 2017. The CGLC are scheduled to meet on the 26<sup>th</sup> January 2017 to review progress on the drawdown of grants approved. They will also review the Projects Grant Scheme 2016 and discuss the Projects Grants Scheme for 2017.

## **Ballymun Boilerhouse Repurpose Project**

The External Design Team led by ABK Architects worked extremely hard with the contractor Purcell Contracting to achieve Practical Completion on the 1<sup>st</sup> December 2016. The Rediscovery Centre (RDC) has moved most of its social enterprises into the repurposed boiler house and will commence fit out of the educational spaces and the café. An EU monitoring audit of the project was conducted in November on both DCC and the RDC and the auditors reported that they were happy with progress to date.

## Pay by Weight & Bags to Bins

The DOECLG made regulations that from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2016, waste operators must only collect household kerbside waste in approved receptacles which are designed for reuse (bins) and must use a weighing system to weigh every collection of this waste collected separately in receptacles designed for reuse. The department also set out minimum charges per kilo for each waste stream. A National Awareness Campaign was launched on the 18<sup>th</sup> May 2016. On the 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016 the Minister made new regulations removing the requirement for the introduction of pay by weight on the 1<sup>st</sup> July 2016 but left unaltered the requirement for designation of areas as only suitable for bag use.

The Council has completed a visual survey of all streets on which bags are currently presented for collection and has made Orders in accordance with the criteria from the Department designating the areas in the city which will continue to be bag collection areas post July 1<sup>st</sup> 2016. The waste industry, NWCPO, DOECLG have been informed of same and DCC website updated with the full list of designated streets.

## Establishment of a Special Committee of the City Council in respect of new Waste Management Legislation

The Committee has met regularly to discuss the new waste regulations which came into force on the 1<sup>st</sup> July and in particular has reviewed the lists being compiled by DCC on the proposed designation of streets as only suitable for bag collections after this date. The Committee has met with Greyhound management to discuss their dissatisfaction with the manner in which Greyhound is encouraging customers to change to bin collections in advance of the designation process being completed. The Committee has agreed to continue to meet to discuss litter related issues and has expressed a desire to engage with the waste industry to consider alternative waste receptacles to replace bags .

## Climate Change Strategy

The Environment SPC established a working group to review the Climate Change Strategy for Dublin City 2008-2012 and to prepare a new strategy. The working group has consulted with the other Dublin Local Authorities and they are agreeable to the new Strategy being prepared on a regional basis. A Regional Steering Group has also been established and relevant personnel identified across appropriate departments in each local authority for input to the strategy document.

Codema, the local authority energy consultant, is project managing the process on behalf of the 4 authorities as part of its annual work plan. The draft Strategy has been completed and the document has gone out for public consultation on a non-statutory basis. The closing date for submissions to Codema is 5.00p.m. on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> October. The draft will then be updated and brought back to the relevant SPC in each local authority for approval and noting by each Council in December. Detailed Action Plans will be prepared in 2017 for each local authority which will include Adaptation and Mitigation measures as required by EU and national legislation.

## **Dublin District Heating System**

The Technical Services Division is working to bring the Dublin District Heating System (DDHS) to the next stage of delivery, by advertising through the Request For Tender (RFT) procedures, for a suitably qualified and multi-disciplinary Service Provider to examine the strategies for managing, administering, developing and financing of the DDHS, based on an assessment of the costs, benefits and risk associated with each strategy, primarily focussing on the Docklands SDZ area. This service provider will make recommendations to senior Council management in relation to the preferred business model and strategy to implement the DDHS. It had been intended to advertise for stage 1 (Expressions of Interest) of the RFT process by the end of April; however following Internal workshops and consultation, extra work packages were put into the scope of the RFT, aiming to reduce the long-term timeline of the project. The ultimate goal is to have a contract awarded by the end of the 2016.

## Progress report on Litter Management Plan 2016 -2018

31 objectives are set out to be delivered over the lifetime of the plan. An update on each of these objectives is provided in the table below. In addition to these objectives the plan mentions a number of other areas where Dublin City Council seeks to make improvements to the management and reduction of litter in the city. These include the management of graffiti, combating the issue of dog fouling, the use of technology and the promotion of recycling.

Additional initiatives undertaken to date in 2016 that are not covered within the objectives set out in the Litter Management Plan include:

## Anti Graffiti Animated Video

Produced in cooperation with the South East Area Dept to combat the practice of tagging. The video is aimed children in the primary school age group and is due to be launched in October 2016

#### Graffiti Removal Framework

A new framework agreement has been put in place for the provision of graffiti removal services.

## Trial of Segregated Bins

An initial trial of on-street segregated bins beganat the end of Sept. 2 units with 3 waste stream receptacles will be trialled at high use locations in the north and south city centre at South King Street and Wolfe Tone Park.

## Smart Bin Technology

2 trials of smart bin technology are taking place within the city. In the South East Area 52 smart bin units have replaced bins on 2 routes to assess their suitability and increased efficiencies.

A further trial is due to commence shortly in the North West Area with the replacement of 20 bins with an alternative smart bin design

## Dog Fouling Enforcement Campaign

An enforcement campaign is underway across the city targeting enforcement of section 22 of the Litter Pollution Act. Area Office staff and Litter Wardens are carrying out enforcement patrols in green areas in cooperation with Local Gardai.

## **IBAL**

Working in cooperation with the Area Depts an analysis is carried out of all sites highlighted by the surveys that fail to meet a minimum standard of Grade B and efforts are made to improve these sites. This is an ongoing process in the North Inner City and is also underway in the Ballymun area following its recent inclusion in the areas surveyed.

The most recent results indicate that Dublin City continues to make progress in problematic areas of the North Inner City and that the City Centre has been returned to the Clean To European Norms standard.

An analysis of the results of the North Inner City Surveys shows that this approach has been effective to date.

## **Housing & Residential Services - Monthly Management Report**

## Policy issues:

1. Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2014:

Main Parts -

Repossession Procedure for LA dwellings (Part 2) regulations commenced April 2015

- The Rents Section is currently engaging with the Law Department in preparing possession applications for court hearings where tenants who have been issued with Tenancy Warnings are in breach of a rent related obligation.
- As of the 1<sup>st</sup> December DCC has issued 261 Tenancy Warnings for arrears cases.
- IS Project Customer Online statement which will allow tenants to view rent account statements online is currently being developed, the anticipated delivery date February 2017.
- Rent Scheme has not commenced. New circular to follow.

## 2. National Strategy for People with a Disability 2011 - 2016

Under the terms of the National Housing Strategy for People with a Disability 2011-2016 DCC has established a Steering Committee including officials from Dublin City Council, Health Services Executive and representatives from a variety of organisations including St. Michaels House for Intellectual Disability, The Irish Wheelchair Association, The Deaf Association of Ireland, Hail Housing Association, Respond Housing Association, The Irish Council for Social Housing and Focus Ireland. An operations group has now been established to implement the plan.

The work is primarily operational and will include the transferring of people from congregated settings to regular housing, and the provision of disabled access housing in new build schemes, regeneration schemes, HAP, RAS schemes and through the adaptation of existing housing stock. In the Housing Needs Assessment currently being carried out by Dublin City Council's Housing Allocations Unit which is not yet completed, at least 540 people have been identified as having some form of disability.

## **Domestic Heating Section**

A boiler replacement programme is set to begin in 2017. The initial work of preparing tender documents is underway. 1,000 boilers or complete heating systems are planned for 2017. The capture of carbon / energy credits for both the replacement of boilers, and for the servicing of the domestic gas boiler stock will also be going to tender. This capture will be in conjunction with an energy partner and the award will be based on the most beneficial to

Dublin City Council.

## **HVAC Section**

The HVAC (Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning) Unit is a specialised unit which manages all HVAC equipment in Dublin City Council's Corporate and Communal heating sites including Senior Citizen Complexes. There are currently 230 maintenance contracts across 131 sites. The HVAC Unit are currently in the process of reviewing maintenance contracts / proposals for 2017 and contracts will be awarded for the coming year.

## **Energy Efficiency Section**

Phase I of the Energy Retrofit Programme (also referred to as the Fabric Upgrade Programme) is now fully complete. We are currently in the process of compiling tender documents for Phase Two of the programme, in conjunction with REIL. 2017 targets for Phase II will be set on indication of available budget.

In an extension to the Phase 1 programme, €500,000 additional funding was made available for attic insulation and ventilation. 517 Properties benefitted from these measures.

Energy Upgrade for Block 1 at Cromcastle Court was completed in October 2016. Phase 1 of the energy upgrade of the block was carried out in 2015 and consisted of installing air to water heat pumps with weather compensated controls with remote access. The windows were upgraded to high-performance double glazed upvc windows. Phase 2 of the energy upgrade consisted of installing 120mm of rockwool external wall insulation. The average BER rating improved from an E1 before works, to a B3 after Phase 1, to a very impressive B1 after Phase 2. In terms of percentage savings, this equates to a saving of 65.9% savings after Phase 1, and 77.5% savings after Phase 2.

The calculated running cost savings resulted in the running costs being reduced from €18,606 to €7,797 after Phase 1, and to €4,589 after Phase 2. Actual measured energy performance data will be analysed and reported on in due course, as data becomes available.

Housing Maintenance Out of Hours Service operates for emergency repair requests Monday-Friday 5-9 and Weekends 9-5. On average 150-160 emergency repairs are responded to per month.

## **CARETAKING AND MOBILE CREWS**

Housing Maintenance Attendants look after the cleaning & waste collection service for nearly 200 Flat Complexes and Senior Citizen Complexes in the Dublin City Area. An estimated 200 tonnes of waste is collected each week.

The Housing Attendants are supported by two Mobile Crews. The mobile crews consist of five men plus a supervisor providing support for the South Side of the city and five men plus a supervisor on the North Side. The mobile crews have dedicated transport and equipment.

Their typical duties include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Pest control and fumigation,
- crime scene cleaning,

- general deep cleaning,
- removal of high volumes of house hold waste and rubbish,
- tree cutting and removal of shrubbery and vegetation,
- graffiti removal.

## **BEDSIT AMALGAMATION PROGRAMME**

Quality of the built environment and sustainability are two central platforms in the provision of successful housing developments. There are approximately 114 Senior Citizen's Complexes and over 3,000 units throughout the City of Dublin. A number of these complexes consist of bedsits with a floor area of approximately 23-26 sqm. The Council's Housing and Community Services Department is successfully carrying out a programme of amalgamation and refurbishment of these bedsit units in order to provide a better quality building fabric to enhance comfort levels for the occupants and, improve spatial and building standards, and sustainability of the built environment. We would expect a total of 125 amalgamations to be complete by early spring 2017.

## **ENGINEERING/INSPECTIONS UNIT**

## **Engineering site Visits:**

In total 275 inspections or site visits have been carried out in the third quarter of 2016 assisting the depot staff on technical issues. The majority of these visits required some follow up work and/or consultation.

## **Roof Repairs**

The multi party framework agreement for roof repairs is now established by Managers Order for a two year period to September 2018. The scope of this framework is the re-roofing of larger scale flat complexes, generally four to five storeys high, varying roof types such as gullwing roofs, flat roofs and parapet roofs.

#### **Stairwell Repairs**

The stairwell in Liberty House and Ballybough Court are substancially finished.

#### **Miscellaneous Precinct Works**

There are a number of miscellaneous precinct works ongoing to address various items that have become defective due to wear and tear over several years.

#### **Roof Fall Arrest Systems**

It is hoped to continue the programme to install fall arrest systems at other locations due 2017.

## Lead water supply service connection replacement and/or relining

A higher proportion of DCC units was constructed before 1970 and is therefore at risk of having lead piping. There is an ongoing survey of the housing stock to determine the extent of any lead pipework or plumbing.

The objective is to identify such properties based on age, history of renovation and relevant material garnered by Irish Water during the national domestic metering programme.

Based on this survey a programme is under development to mitigate the risk by targeting action in areas where the risk of exceeding the chemical parameters of the EU Drinking Water Regulations is highest. An initial group of four hundred and forty DCC units have been identified by Irish Water as having lead water service connections.

A pilot scheme of relining lead water service connections was carried out at Kilkieran Road, Cabra in co-operation with DCC Water Services and Irish Water.

This scheme includes sampling and testing the water. There are three water samples tested for each property. The first sample represents the existing scenario prior to any work, the second sample is taken following the replacement of the section of lead service connection on the public side of the boundary box by Irish Water and the third sample is taken following the relining of the lead service connection on the customer side of the boundary box by DCC Housing Maintenance.

The test results for the third set of samples taken in the pilot scheme indicated that the lead was successfully reduced to less than the 10  $\mu$ g/l parameter for lead set out in the EU drinking water regulations in all cases. It is hoped to roll out a tender for similar work on a larger scale (i.e.) 125 houses in the New Year subject to funding.

## **Housing Assistance Payment (HAP)**

HAP will be introduced to Dublin City Council's area with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> March 2017. The roll out of HAP to the Dublin region requires close collaboration among the key parties in the delivery of the scheme, including the Dublin local authorities, the HAP Shared Service Centre, the Department of Social Protection and the Department of Housing, planning, Community and Local Government, to ensure successful delivery. It is proposed that DCC will have a HAP team in place in January 2017 to administer the scheme. Training will be provided by the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government, the Housing Agency and the HAP Shared Services Centre in Limerick to all appropriate staff. A National Communications Strategy is being developed and is due to be implemented alongside the roll-out of the scheme to the Dublin Region.

## **Housing Allocations 2016**

Housing and Allocations aim to ensure an efficient selection of households and offers of accommodation so as to ensure that households are notified and ready to move into dwellings as soon as they become available. These arrangements should seek to avoid inadvertent delays in letting dwellings, and dwellings being left vacant for lengthy periods due to refusals of offers of accommodation. The use of choice based lettings is being used in areas throughout the City for a limited number of properties.

The number of allocations made by Dublin City Council to end of November 2016 is **1224** which includes 36 RAS lettings.

## **Housing Needs Assessment:**

In accordance with section 21 of the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2009 (No. 22 of 2009), as adapted by the Environment, Heritage and Local Government Order 2011, Dublin City Council are carrying out a general revision of the Housing Waiting List. The purpose of this revision is to update our records and to remove the names of those applicants from the List who are no longer interested in, or who no longer qualify under the Allocation Scheme 2013 to be housed by the City Council. A total of **26,290** applicants were subjected to a fully completed assessment for the purposes of determining their qualification for social housing. This Assessment is almost complete and final figures will be released by the DHPC&LG shortly.

#### **Tenants Handbook:**

A draft version of the revised Tenants Handbook has been received from the printer and sent to various interested parties for comment. It is hoped to start distributing this Handbook in early 2017.

## **Traveller Accommodation Update - November 2016**

#### **ALLOCATIONS:**

As of October 31<sup>st</sup>, there were 14 Traveller Priority lettings to Standard Housing (target is min 20 p.a.).

## **FIRE REVIEW:**






## Chart: Families in ALL EA – Trend: October 2015 to November 2016

The Dublin City Comhairle na nÓg AGM took place in Croke Park on 18<sup>th</sup> November with 166 young people participating. The National Showcase took place a week later on 24<sup>th</sup> November also in Croke Park with 15 Dublin City participants. The theme for discussion for Dublin City Comhairle members for 2017 is Homelessness.

## **Welcoming Cities**

The EU funded Welcoming Cities project involving 6 EU cities (Dublin, Amsterdam, Brussels, Copenhagen, Gothenburg and Hamburg) held its final meeting in Gothenburg on 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> December. Gráinne Kelly from the Social Inclusion Unit attended. The purpose of the project was to create a welcoming environment in the cities and support the EU migrants in the integration process by removing barriers to mobility, enhancing the full participation of EU Mobile citizens in political and civil life, promoting intercultural dialogue and implementing a monitoring and evaluation process.

#### **City Hall Migrant Information Fair**

As part of the City Council's undertaking to facilitate and promote access to information, the Social Inclusion Unit organised a migrant information fair in City Hall on the 28<sup>th</sup> November, in conjunction with the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) which is the leading inter-governmental organization in the field of migration.

The Migrant Information Fair was attended by 20 statutory and voluntary service providers working in the field of migrant rights and information.

The Fair was the first of a planned series of events designed to promote migrant access to information, which it is hoped will be run in 2017 in partnership with Dublin City Library Services division.

## **Dublin City Volunteer Centre**

A member of the Social Inclusion Unit attended the Strategic Planning event organised by the Dublin City Volunteer Centre on 7<sup>th</sup> December.

## Smithfield Christmas tree lighting ceremony - 24<sup>th</sup> November



The Smithfield Christmas event attracted larger numbers than in previous years. It included market stalls and music acts and attracted a lot of very positive attention for the area. The Events Section also worked with the Dublin Film Festival, who gave children and adults an opportunity to sit in a director's chair on the stage and talk about their favourite Christmas film, while being filmed and shown on the big screen. Up to 4,000 people attended the event and enjoyed the festive atmosphere on the plaza. businesses in the Smithfield area have welcomed events on the Square as they promote the area and bring an increase in footfall.

## Lord Mayors Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony, O'Connell Street – 27<sup>th</sup> November



The O'Connell Street event was more challenging this year as a result of ongoing Luas Cross City works, but with the cooperation of all of the statutory agencies, the event worked well in its new location and was enjoyed by all who attended. The event featured Irish music acts and pantomime cast, along with Al Porter and Dustin the turkey carrying out MC duties. The event attracted approximately 9,000 spectators over the course of the event.

## Moving Crib and Christmas Wonderland, Mansion House 6<sup>th</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> December



The forecourt of the Mansion House was turned into a Winter Wonderland on the 6<sup>th</sup> December, with the live crib getting more visitors than ever this year. Visitors were shown around the attraction by helpful elves, which also featured many other festive elements. Weekends were particularly popular, with thousands of visitors availing of the free family experience. Adults and children alike enjoyed taking photos in the magical Wonderland setting and posting letters to Santa while visiting the crib.

## NYF Dublin 29<sup>th</sup> – 31<sup>st</sup> December



is year's New Year's Festival saw revellers ringing in the New Year at the 3Countdown Concert at St. Stephens Green South and enjoying the incredible "Sky Dance at the Custom House", a spectacular aerial outdoor performance by Fidget Feet. Luminosity 3D animations were also enjoyed at the Custom House over the three days. New Year's Day also saw further celebrations with a free family concert at St. Stephen's Green. Other free events, as part of an additional Arts Programme, included the NYF Dublin music trail, walking trails, pop up street performances and amazing cultural events throughout the city.

## Filming Update

The Film Liaison Officer is working closely with the Irish Film Board to promote Dublin City as a great film location.

## Dublin City Riverfest, Tall Ships Regatta 2018, The Voyage 3 Cities Initiave

## **Dublin City Riverfest**

Following on from the success of the Tall Ships Races event in 2012, Dublin Port Company



introduced an annual Dublin Port Riverfest to animate the river, encourage visitors to the Port and Docklands area and to strengthen links between the port and the city. Dublin City Council have joined Dublin Port Company as an organisning partner of the event, that will be re branded Dublin City Riverfest from 2017 onwards.

## The Voyage - 3 Cities Initiative



A number of cities on the Irish Sea host Tall Ships events and river festivals annually. Most notably among them are Belfast, Dublin and Liverpool. The 3 Cities share common goals of promoting and growing their maritime and river festivals, highlighting and celebratig their maritime heritage, attracting visitors to their Port and Docklands area of their cities and supporting sail training initiatives for young sail trainees. The 3 Cities have collaborated on a joint brand and engagement partnership to encourage the attendance of more tall ships at the festivals, more trainees and funding for trainees, sponsorship and joint marketing and promotion.

**Note:** As a social benefit legacy from the 2012 Tall Ships Races event, Sail Training Ireland have been hugely successful in advancing a sail training programme for sail trainees from across ireland, securing trainee opportunities for them on a number of tall ship voyages including those who can accommodate trainees of varying physical abilities.

Tall Ships Regatta 2018



Following on from the success of the Tall Ships Races in 2012, the growing support for the Dublin City Riverfest, the development of greater links between the port and the city and the 3 Cities Initiative, Dublin City Council and Dublin Port Company have agreed to jointly host a Tall Ships Regatta in 2018. The event while not as big as a Tall Ships Race event will be a significant event in the city with the potential to attract a large audience including international visitors. The Regatta will visit 3 ports – Liverpool, Dublin and

Bordeaux and will take place in Dublin on the June Bank holiday weekend in 2018. The Regatta will be hosted by the Dublin City Riverfest, taking place the same weekend. Preparatory work for the event will commence in 2017.

## **DUBLIN CITY GALLERY THE HUGH LANE**

Following the gallery's centenary theme - of *the Artist as Witness in Society* - the exhibitions programme for 2017 will examine the artist's contribution to historical and social issues under the broad theme of *Migrations*. Migration has become the pertinent topic of discussion in the globalised modern world and in 2017 we will examine both historical immigration and emigration and the impact of migration as a principle of nature.

In developing and interrogating our Migrations theme, we will engage with diverse audiences through our inclusive in-house programme of exhibitions, talks, lectures and workshops; and our community and schools outreach programmes.

## Strategic Plan

The Strategic Plan for the gallery is being finalised and will be presented to the Arts, Culture, Recreation and Community Strategic Policy Committee in early 2017. Extensive consultation took place with stakeholders in order to determine the vision, mission and objectives of the gallery for the next five years.

#### **Visitor Numbers:**

The number of visitors to the gallery continues to rise year on year. Visitor numbers in 2016 exceeded 180,000, compared to 156,373 in 2015, which represents a 15% increase in footfall. Through innovative programming of exhibitions and inclusive outreach projects, we aim to continue to build on our visitor numbers throughout 2017.

## **Capital Programme**

Tenders for the award of Design Consultancy Services in relation to the renovation and environmental systems upgrade works to the gallery will be evaluated shortly and it is anticipated that the successful consultant will commence work on a design brief in the first quarter of 2017. Works remain on-target for commencement in Q1 2018, with completion expected late 2018/January 2019. Full closure of the 1930's wing will be required for the duration of 2018, with some more short term closure of other areas of the gallery being likely over the period of works.

## Off-site storage

Dublin City Council is the owner of 2052 fine artworks plus the Frances Bacon Archive of approximately 7,500 items. The collection is re-hung annually, and works not on display are stored under controlled environmental conditions in the gallery archive spaces.

However, these spaces are limited and as we expand and develop our collection for the enjoyment of future generations, addressing the lack of suitable storage space has become a priority. Suitable space has now been secured in premises which are currently being leased by the OPW, where part of the National Museum collection is currently stored. A lease agreement is being finalised and we will commence the transfer of selected works in early 2016.

#### Café

A preferred bidder has been selected to operate the gallery café. That party has been notified, and upon expiration of the standstill period, contract negotiations will commence.

Artistic Migrations: Frank O'Meara and Irish Artists Abroad (new display) As part of our theme for 2017 *Artist as Witness: Migrations* a new display of twenty paintings drawn from the Gallery's collection has been curated and is now on view.

The display will also include a self portrait by Frank O'Meara, recently acquired by the gallery. The painting is in our conservation studio for technical examination and research on its history. Work on the painting will give us the opportunity to learn more about the painting technique of the artist and his creative process. The technical examination will inform the conservation treatment plan for the painting.



## Francis Bacon: Art Books (new display)

This selection of art related books is drawn from the many art historical publications that belonged to Francis Bacon. In addition, multitudinous paint smudged loose leaves torn from books and exhibition catalogues were found among the items in his studio. On view here are exhibition catalogues on Picasso, Matisse, Cézanne, Giacometti, Richard Hamilton and Marcel Duchamp among others. The catalogues of paintings by Irish artist Louis le Brocquy are indicative of a mutual artistic regard.

**Sir Hugh Lane: 'That Great Pictured Song'** is an illustrated book of essays exploring Hugh Lane's life and achievements. Currently at the design stage, it is due for publication in January 2017.

**CREATE and Dublin City Gallery The Hugh Lane:** Dublin City Gallery The Hugh Lane and Create, the national development agency for collaborative arts, as part of the Collaborative Arts Partnership Programme funded by Creative Europe are issuing an open call in December 2016 for a Socially Engaged Commission at Dublin City Gallery / The Hugh Lane (CAPP). The deadline is 27<sup>th</sup> January 2017 and the Commission budget is 50,000 euro.

## **Returning Loans**

Preparations are underway for the return in January 2017 of loans from the collection to the exhibition *Francis Bacon Invisible Rooms* in Stuttgart, Germany and to the *Creating History* exhibition at the National Gallery of Ireland.


great Belgian artist. *Port Life* is a visual account of the pulsating life of Antwerp Port at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

A community education programme is being developed to respond to the themes in the exhibition.

THE OCEAN AFTER NATURE - 6th September 2017 till 7th January 2018

## Transfer of property

The transfer of Coláiste Mhuire to the ownership of the City Council has been completed.

## **KEVIN STREET LIBRARY - REFURBISHMENT**

Following completion of the tender process a contractor has been appointed. Discussions on the programme of works and schedule are underway, following which a revised timetable will be available. Our current expectation is that we will reopen the library in September 2017.

## LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT PLAN - PUBLIC MEETING IN TERENURE

In preparation for the drafting of a new library development plan in 2017, the first of a series of area-based public meetings was held in Terenure Library on the 29<sup>th</sup> November. The aim was to engage with the local community and public representatives about library services and how those services can be improved.

## LIBRARIES MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (LMS)

Dublin City Council is the project manager for the implementation of a new Library Management System, Sierra, in all public libraries in Ireland. Seventeen library services, including Dublin City, are now live on Sierra.

Phase 3 of the project is now underway with the remaining thirteen library services due to join the system by the beginning of March 2017.

## 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Gilbert Lecture

The 20<sup>th</sup> annual Sir John T. Gilbert Commemorative Lecture will be held at Dublin City Library & Archive on 25th January 2017. It will be given by Dr Bernadette Cunningham (Royal Irish Academy) on 'Gentlemen's Daughters in Dublin Cloisters: the social world or nuns in early 18<sup>th</sup>-century Dublin', and will be chaired by the Deputy Lord Mayor, Cllr Rebecca Moynihan.

## Swift 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Preparations are underway for the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Jonathan Swift's birth. An exhibition will be launched at Dublin City Library & Archive on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> January 2017 focussing on Swift's involvement with the City, using many original books and documents associated with Swift.

## **DUBLIN UNESCO CITY OF LITERATURE**

Children across Dublin will take part in the Citywide Reading initiative from January to March 2017. *Knights of the Borrowed Dark* by Dave Rudden is the chosen book for the 6th annual reading campaign which encourages children to read for pleasure.

## **PROGAMMES**

## **Home Energy Toolkits**

In response to the popularity of the Home Energy Toolkits, the toolkits will be available in all branch libraries from February. The increased availability is supported by CODEMA and the Sustainable Energy Authority Ireland.

## **COMMEMORATIVE NAMING**

The Commemorative Naming Committee was established by Dublin City Council in 2013 to make recommendations regarding the naming of key infrastructure and the selection of individuals or events which will be commemorated through the erection of civic monuments or plaques. Proposals for the naming of infrastructure and dedication of memorials and plaques must be formally submitted through an agreed process.

To date the Commemorative Naming Committee has overseen the process, including a lengthy public consultation process, to name the Rosie Hackett Bridge in May 2014. The East Link Bridge was officially named "The Tom Clarke Bridge" in May 2015. There is currently a request to name the Drumcondra Bridge over the River Tolka "The Frank Flood Bridge" which is going through the official process.

The Commemorative Naming Committee along with the Arts and Cultural Advisory Committee are currently considering a proposal from the Liam Mellows Memorial Committee to commission a life size statue of Liam Mellows in Mellows Park. This request is also going through the official process.

The Commemorative Naming Committee adopted an official Dublin City Council Commemorative Plaques scheme in 2013. The text on the plaques is in Irish and English.

There are frequent requests for commemorative plaques to be erected under the scheme, particularly during the 1916 commemorations.



# **Dublin City Parks Strategy**

A consultation draft of the Dublin City Parks Strategy is currently available for consultation at dublincity.ie. Comments will be accepted until the end of January 2017. The strategy reviews and assesses the resources and services provided by Dublin City Council, Parks and Landscape Services and formulates policy and intended actions for them into the future.

Following public consultation a revised draft of the Strategy will be brought to the Special Policy Committee (the draft was previously presented and discussed at the March 2016 SPC) and subsequently put for adoption to the City Council.

## **Play Development**



**Dublin City Play Plan 2012 - 2017**A review of the above plan and work on drafting the next Dublin City Play Plan will commence in 2017.

# 1916 Commemorative Play Garden.

Following an assessment of 5 locations in the city centre, St. Audoen's Park has been selected as the preferred site for the creation of the 1916 Commemorative Play Garden. Elements of Action, Landscape Architects have been appointed for the preliminary inception, feasibility and design stage of the project and Róisín de Buitléar, artist, has been appointed to work in collaboration with the landscape architects. At a Project Steering Group meeting held on the 6<sup>th</sup> December last, the Steering Group met with the design team and work will progress and be completed on this project in 2017. The project is a joint initiative between the Department of Children and Youth Affairs and Dublin City Council.

# Dublin Bay Biosphere Biodiversity Conservation and Research Strategy 2016 – 2020





Following public consultation the finalised Strategy document is now available at <a href="https://www.dublinbaybiosphere.ie">www.dublinbaybiosphere.ie</a>. A working Group established to assist in developing the Strategy will meet annually to review the implementation of the Strategy. Numerous actions are already underway at various sites including North Bull Island, Dalkey Island and Ireland's Eye. In addition a UCD led research project Acclimatize, in which Dublin Bay Biosphere Partnership is participating was recently awarded EU Interreg funding.

# **ARTS OFFICE**

# **Review: Interim Findings**

In keeping with other Sections in the Department the Arts Office has undergone a full internal review with external oversight. This review focused on Governance, Purpose and the relevance of the Arts Office work in a local National and International Context. A new Vision Document was discussed by all staff and the duties of Arts Officers will be recalibrated in 2017 based on this collaborative approach.

The Lab Gallery Review concluded in April and among its recommendations is the appointment of a Curatorial Panel and a Visual Arts Strategy for the Cit. Curatorial Panel meetings have been arranged for 2017. A new purpose for the Arts Office has been agreed by staff to be approved by City Council.

#### **PURPOSE OF THE ARTS OFFICE**

Dublin City Council recognises the unique and transformative role of the arts in the life of its residents, businesses and visitors. The arts are a critical component of Dublin City Council's cultural strategy and a key pillar of Dublin's cultural identity and international reputation.

The City Arts Office is a developmental unit within Dublin City Council. It supports quality, access, participation, learning and innovation in the arts through collaboration and strategic partnership at local, regional and international levels.

## **ARTS IN LOCAL AREAS**

46 Community Groups and 16 Artists are working together as part of The National Neighbourhood, a partnership between the National Cultural Institutions and City Neighbourhoods.

Arts Grants this year will by approval of Dublin City Council seek to adopt a partnership approach to Neighbourhood Grants on a trial basis. €10K per Area €50K in total will be available. Five partnership grants are before the Council at this meeting for approval and a sixth in the Central Area will be developed in 2017.

#### **ARTS GRANTS**

Upwards of 200 Applications received in three categories Revenue, Project, Neighbourhood and Voluntary. These Grants were assessed by Externs and Arts Officers and a subcommittee of Councillors approved the recommendations that are before Dublin City Council for approval tonight.

Additional support for Arts projects in the North East Inner City will be available in 2017. The Lab Rehearsal Studios: Over 12,000 people will have used the Studios in Foley Street in 2016. The Lab Gallery also hosted major commemorative exhibitions. Dance house licensed by Dublin City Council on Foley Street also hosted a comprehensive Dance Programme of classes, workshops and performances. The allocation of 15 Bachelors Walk to The Architecture Foundation has resulted in a very busy year for that building in 2016 with a strong programme of talks and events including the administration and promotion of Open House.

The Arts Office has hosted multiple residencies by Artists at Albert Cottages and St Patricks Park in 2016. Aiken Promotions have been appointed by tender to head up the MusicTown festival in April 2017. Boxroom Productions have been appointed by tender to provide general management services for the Dublin Chinese New Year Festival and The International Literature Festival Dublin.

The Dublin Chinese New Year Festival continues to expand in 2017 with support from The Embassy of the People's Republic of China and sponsorship from Kildare Village, Brown Thomas, and the Dublin Chinese Business Association among others. A comprehensive programme includes a Spring Fair at CHQ and visiting Chinese artists at the National Concert Hall with stand up comedy, a major business conference and much more.

# Dublin City Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP) - 2016 -2021

A national launch of the LECP's of each local authority was held as part of the Ploughing Championships in September. Economic Development staff have commenced a consultation process designed to identify a series of economic actions for the 2017 Action Plan that will be delivered solely or jointly by named stakeholders. The format of the consultation allows for group discussion and individual consultations with senior managers of organisations identified as part of the economic community in the city. 3 workshops were held in late October, with a different speaker setting the context for each focussing on a single goal. Facilitated discussion at each workshop led to a series of new actions being identified. 23 individual meetings have been held to date with senior managers from key organisations. Members of the Economic Development and Enterprise SPC have been requested to forward actions for inclusion in the Action Plan. Feedback from the consultation process will be written up and captured in a series of actions for the 2017 plan.

An update on progress achieved on the 90 Economic Actions identified in the 2016 Action Plan will be presented to the November meeting of the Economic Development and Enterprise SPC. The 2017 Action Plan will be worked on in December bringing together the economic and community actions into one document. Following agreement reached with the Chairs of each of the SPC's it was agreed that each ACE will nominate an Executive Manager to liaise with Bernie Doherty and Mary Mac Sweeney to update the Community and Economic aspects of the LECP.

The Eastern and Midlands Regional Assembly held a workshop with representatives of the Economic and Community areas of the four Dublin Local Authorities in October. At this meeting the local authorities gave feedback on the process of developing the LECP's and they were informed that the Department has not yet put in place measurement mechanisms or guidelines to capture details of what has been delivered under the LECP's in 2016.

#### **Dublin Economic Monitor**

The seventh edition of the Dublin Economic Monitor was launched in Swords by Fingal County Council in October 2016. This office is actively promoting the monitor and has developed a distribution list for hard copies of the monitor.

#### **Uprise Festival for Start Ups**

The Uprise Festival which was held for the first time in Dublin in October 2016 with the support of Dublin City Council. The promoter has held similar festivals in Amsterdam on three occasions brought this unique festival to Dublin with a focus on staff, networking and investment for innovative start up businesses.

Following the success of the Dublin Festival the promoter is considering holding a similar event in Dublin in 2017. The Office of the Dublin Start Up Commissioner and the IDA also supported the Festival.

# Show & Tell Creative Festival – 18th November 2016

This office is supporting the Show and Tell events in its second year. Show & Tell will be held in Smock Alley attracting a wide range of creative businesses and providing them with an opportunity to showcase and sell their produce and to network and learn. This office will be providing mentors to provide talks on financing, social media and marketing and will also be offering a speed mentoring service.

# **CHRISTMAS MARKETS**

Plato Dublin Christmas Market – College Green Friday 9<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> December Plato Dublin is holding its annual Christmas Market in front of Bank of Ireland, College Green supported by LEO Dublin City. The stall holders are selected by Dublin Plato and represent small craft businesses providing them with an opportunity to promote and sell their products. A brass band and choir will provide music at midday on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> December 2016.

# **Dublin Christmas Flea Market – Point Depot**

A three day Christmas Market will be held in the Point Depot on Friday 9<sup>th</sup>, Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> of December 2016. Over 100 staff holders will be selected from Irish Craft-Makers, Designers and artists not found on the high street. The event will also see a number of food stalls providing food and drink for the 15,000 plus visitors anticipated. Economic staff are working with events staff to support this event along with the Dublin.ie team. The event which is free of charge to attend will showcase some of the best locally handmade, artist-designed, up-cycled or second hand good in the city.

#### Grangegorman Development – Business and Enterprise Sub-Committee

Mary Mac Sweeney is a member of the Business and Enterprise Sub-Committee who hosted a Breakfast Briefing for local businesses on the 12<sup>th</sup> October. The event was attended by the Lord Mayor Brendan Carr. Ger Casey CEO gave an overview of the development and future plans that was well received by the business owners who turned out in large numbers for this seminal event, feedback was gathered on what future events would be attractive to local businesses.

# **St James Hospital Enterprise Sub Committee**

Greg Swift is a member of the St James Hospital Enterprise Sub Committee. Work is progressing to develop the innovation potential of the new National Children's hospital development.

#### Dublin.ie

The Dublin.ie website launched in March 2016 has won a Web Award for the best government/local government website. The site acts as a city branding website and promotes living, working, learning and events in Dublin. The Dublin.ie branding will be included along with the Dublin City Council branding for events supported by Economic Development. Following a tendering process McCannBlue were awarded the Chief Writer contact for the site, which publishes three new articles each week. The Dublin.ie team are actively building collaborations with organisations to raise awareness of the site and build alliances and ensure the best material on Dublin is captured on the site.

## Action Plan for Jobs - Dublin Regional Action Plan

This office provided updates on a series of actions that Dublin City Council was responsible for delivering under the Dublin Regional Action Plan for jobs. A number of meetings were held with the four Dublin local authorities with the person appointed to co-ordinate the capturing of information on the actions with each of the stakeholder organisations. The Minister for Jobs, Enterprise and Innovation attended the first meeting of the evaluation committee established to oversee the implementation of the plan. Greg Swift is a member of the implementation committee.

By 2020 the Dublin Regional Action Plan for Jobs aims to:

- Have 66,000 more people in employment and reach an unemployment rate of 6 percent;
- increase the number of start-ups in the region by a minimum of 25 percent;
- increase the survival rate of start-ups in the first five years by a minimum of 25 percent;
- deliver a minimum of 430 FDI investments for Dublin over the period 2015-2019;
- improve the capacity of Irish owned agency supported enterprises to grow to scale by a minimum of 30 per cent across a number of turnover thresholds;
- increase RD&I performance within enterprises, with an increase: of 20 percent in RD&I expenditure in foreign owned entities (by 2019); of 20 percent in numbers of Irish owned enterprises engaging in RD&I activities; and more collaborative activity involving enterprises and state funded research institutes, delivering at least one third more collaborations and seeding intensified clustering activities;
- double enterprise investment in training and up-skilling for employees:
- deliver a 7 percent increase year on year in visitor numbers to reach 6.2 million; and
- \* achieve a doubling of spend by visitors to reach a total of €2.5 billion5.

## Design4Growth

The Design4Growth project has now progressed to Stage 4. An evaluation has been carried out on the Design4Growth project which connected businesses with a panel of Design Strategist who worked with them on applying design thinking to business challenges. The evaluation report was presented by the Design and Crafts Council of Ireland to the Minister in October. The 6 businesses who completed Stage 3 of the project are in the process of commissioning the work identified in their design briefs and applying for the Design Voucher valued at €2,500.

## **LEAN Business Programme Dublin**

A tendering process is currently underway to select a provider to provide this training in quarter 1 2017. The programme will consist of three half days of workshops training to provide an introduction to LEAN concepts, and mentoring support in undertaking a short incompany LEAN assignment. This Training will be delivered over three half days (8:00am – 13:00pm), with one week between the training days and will cover the following topics.

#### The training workshop must cover:

- Introduction, overview and benefits of LEAN principles.
- Outline of content for each workshop.
- LEAN tools and techniques and how they relate to your business.
- Proposed methodology for transferring knowledge of LEAN concepts to participants.
- Road map for LEAN in your business.
- Understanding the nature and scope of LEAN projects.
- Project selection and scoping for your business.
- Identification of an in-company LEAN assignment for each participant.

#### The in-company LEAN assignment must cover:

- Potential cost savings and benefits to participants.
- These savings and benefits must be identified and finalised during the workshops.
- The programme provider will work with participants to achieve cost savings and benefits outline.
- Following the conclusion of each participant's LEAN assignment the programme provider must submit a report of actual savings and benefits incurred by the participant.

## **Export Programme**

A programme aimed at building craft and design companies as a precursor to market entry to assist in establishing if the target market is suitable. The businesses that will benefit from this programme are jewellers, fashion designers and craft businesses who produce a low volume of high quality good with export potential. An event will be held on the 6<sup>th</sup> December in Smock Alley.

# Food Academy

A programme for those looking to develop and grow small-scale food & drink production businesses.

Programme Objectives

- Develop an in-depth knowledge of the tools which can be used to assess market background
- Understand core technical issues facing your food or drink business
- Learn how to grow sales for your product range through better branding and packaging design
- Gain the tools and knowledge necessary to launch and build a successful food business in Ireland.

<u>Programme Format.</u> Mentoring is a significant aspect of the programme with one mentoring visit taking place after each module, in conjunction with the content delivered during the previous training day.

# **Human Resources Department**

#### **Workforce Numbers**

The total number of employees at 30<sup>th</sup> November 2016 was 5,685 (headcount). The full time equivalent (FTE) number (i.e. taking account of worksharing arrangements) was 5,356.95.

The total workforce number of 5,685 represents a reduction of 22.1 per cent since December 2008. The greatest reduction in resources has taken place in management grades where numbers have reduced by 34 per cent and in the professional technical grades (eg. engineer, planner, architect grades) where numbers have reduced by 24 per cent. Numbers in operational grades have reduced by 224.3 per cent and in firefighter operational grades by 8.3 per cent.

Throughout recent years, and on a continuing basis, managers and staff have undertaken restructuring, reassignment and prioritisation of work to continue service delivery to citizens and customers despite reduced workforce numbers. Managers and staff are continuing to review how services are delivered to optimise customer service, within constrained resources.
