To ask the Director of Services to request that Dublin City Council please look at ongoing problems with the operation of bottle banks in many of our communities. From my knowledge and observation, there appears to be a problem with proper maintenance and servicing of these facilities. Tesco Ballyfermot is a prime example and waste can be on the surface of the carpark for a couple of days before being sorted out.

<u>Reply</u>

Unfortunately, illegal dumping continues to be problematic at recycling facilities across the city. Since the pandemic began, we have been experiencing unprecedented and extraordinary levels of recycling and illegal dumping. Despite regular servicing, bottle and especially clothes banks often refill within hours and unfortunately people continue to dispose of items illegally as a result.

Rehab/Glassco endeavour to service and clean all bottle bank locations on a daily basis. However, this is not always possible due to the sheer volume of glass that is currently being recycled. Waste Management Services personnel also regularly clean around recycling facilities and continue to attend to reports of illegal dumping.

Unfortunately, our textile service provider has been experiencing difficulties due to the pandemic and we are currently working with them to address these issues. A review of our textile recycling service has just been completed and we intend to implement a number of changes on a phased basis beginning in Q1 2021.

Waste Management Services are also currently investigating the potential to introduce Quick Response reporting and details of collection schedules to on-street recycling facilities.

Reply

The Management Company responsible for maintaining the public areas is no longer trading and each unit is privately leased. Having spoken to the business community, it is my understanding that they keep their own premises clean however, there is a lot of littering from street drinkers and pedestrian traffic. Public Domain supported a clean-up operation in October to assist the hard pressed business community. The area most frequently littered is outside the remit of the Bye Laws for the prevention and control of litter(vicinity 50m either side of premises) however I will make further contact to garner support from the business community operating there to work together with Waste Management to alleviate the situation.

To ask the Director of Services has Dublin City Council sought possible cheaper options for the placement of mobile CCTV cameras to deter fly-tipping of waste in our communities. There is a small group who continually dump and it appears they do it with the knowledge they will never be caught. I and many others feel if a few were caught and mentioned in the media it will start a process of reversing this disgraceful practice of a few in our communities. Signage / a confidential line could be the start of empowering communities against this anti-social practice.

<u>Reply</u>

As a result of a tender competition for the provision of CCTV equipment for the purposes of capturing incidents of illegal dumping, a suitable contractor was secured and a Framework Agreement was put in place in December 2019.

In order to take enforcement action, it is necessary to be able to identify an alleged offender, which can be by either using vehicle registration details from CCTV footage or linking evidence from waste found to a name and address. GDPR prevents us from using private personal details in the media.

Can the Director of Services please explain how a Take-Away can operate without any proper storage facilities for waste? I am aware that waste is left in lane-ways outside shops etc. much to determinant of the local area.

<u>Reply</u>

There are many commercial facilities throughout the city that do not have distinct waste storage facilities. These generally avail of 7 day waste collection services available to them as commercial operations in order to dispose of their waste on an ongoing basis or they have the use of commercial bins that are stored in the immediate locality including where appropriate in rear access laneways for example. Where the storage of such commercial bins is not managed and maintained to an acceptable standard Dublin City Council may pursue action under its Waste Bye Laws.to have the commercial bins removed or managed in a way that does not lead to litter.

Commercial waste may be presented for collection after 5pm for collection on any day on which a collection is due that evening or in the next morning in the same manner that households may present their waste for collection prior to the designated collection day.

Waste should not be stored on the footpath indefinitely or in a manner that will create litter and if waste is stored in this way Dublin City Council may pursue action under the Waste Bye Laws or Litter Pollution Act as appropriate.

If there are specific premises that are of concern the Litter Prevention Officer can be contacted to arrange for these premises to be investigated by the Litter Warden Service.

To ask the Director of Services to request our Traffic Department to look at the following query. I have asked on a number of occasions what measures DCC can take to deter through traffic in Chapelizod Village. Over the past couple of years, the area has become a traffic bottleneck as people avoid using the M50 motorway with its toll charges. A local resident, a doctor, has mentioned to me a number of accidents as people fail to stop at pedestrian lights etc. DCC needs to look at operating a contra flow system in the village to discourage these heavy volumes of traffic and, as the OPW often close off the Phoenix Park to through traffic. This only adds to the problems for residents of Chapelizod Village.

<u>Reply</u>

There are no current plans to operate a contra flow system to deter traffic through Chapelizod village. However, there are proposals to provide safer cycling facilities along the route. This may necessitate the introduction of measures such as a shuttle system to create space for cyclists. Such measures would also result in making the route less attractive for rat-running. There are no details of the proposed cycling scheme available at this stage. With regards to people failing to stop at pedestrian lights, the pedestrian crossing will be reviewed in the coming weeks to determine if engineering intervention is required.

I am aware Chapelizod Residents Association are looking for co-operation from Dublin City Council Parks Dept. for the development of a wildflower garden for pollinators at the entrance to Liffey Valley Park at the bypass bridge. The area, whilst a wild area, is not used for any real purpose, however our Parks Dept. cut back the grass on a regular basis. The area is 55m long by 3 m wide. The secretary of Chapelizod Residents Association has approached three local schools to work on a project to plant sustainable pollinators and manage the facility;- St Patricks Chapelizod, St Raphaels Ballyfermot and the Model School Inchicore. I am aware DCC have promised a small grant towards the project, and our Parks Dept. has done some bulb planting recently at this location. I would ask that, if successful, DCC would consider 3 bee hives behind the metal railing, one for each school here to solidify the project and promote sustainability of the project called the <u>BEE LOUD</u> <u>GLADE.</u>

Reply

Parks are aware of proposals for the BEE LOUD GLADE. The strip in question is adjacent to a busy thoroughfare and Parks would not support the suggestion for school children to plant it. There were bulbs also planted inside the entrance to Liffey Valley Park from St. Lawrence's Road and Parks would suggest that this would be a more suitable location for children to carry out pollinator planting/enhancements. Given the current restrictions, this project may need to be postponed until later in the year. Similarly. while the proposal for a bee hive is one Parks would be in favour of, it may be better positioned in the nearby allotments on the north side of the river, also in Liffey Valley Park.

Can the Director of Services please ensure that the Drimnagh area does not have a repetition of the serious weed problem encountered in the community last year with the ending of weed spraying? I have never had so many complaints about a single issue as this issue and we need to be much more pro-active with the problem this year. I regret the same issue applies for many areas in the South Central Area.

Reply

The Weed programme rolled out over late summer and Autumn was innovative in using super heated foam spray to kill weeds and sterilise seeds reducing the next season's growth. This should have a positive impact in the Drimnagh area where efforts were concentrated. Many of the initial challenges associated with introducing a new method of control have been addressed and delivery of service should be more streamlined and timely for the successive years of the contract. It must be noted that there are contractual and budgetary constraints. The SCA has an allocation of 43km any additional treatments would require additional funding.

The following strategy will be employed in relation to the control of weeds on public roads.

Strategy for the Control of Weeds on Dublin City Council's Road Network 2020 to 2024

As part of Dublin City Council's commitment to eliminate its reliance on the use of 'glyphosate' based herbicide for the control of weeds on its road network, an assessment of alternative products and methods for weed control has been carried out and a plan has been developed to cover the period 2020 to 2024. This plan comprises three key elements:

Eliminate the use of 'glyphosate' based herbicide.

Use of alternative weed treatments on all **residential** roads approximately 800km over **a three year cycle**.

The development of a strategy to involve local communities in the removal of weeds from 10% of the road network.

A tender competition was undertaken in 2020. The contract award criteria for this competition was designed to encourage applicants to put forward innovative, environmentally friendly and cost effective alternatives for the treatment and removal of weeds from our roads.

Dublin City Council appointed a contractor (Greentown Environmental) for the purpose of removing weeds from the road network in 2020. There is an option in this Contract to allow use of this contractor for three further periods of one year to cover 2021 / 2022/ 2023.

Due to Covid 19 restrictions the contractor only commenced works on 30th July 2020. The contractor used an innovative process/ product called *'Foamstream'*. This involved the application of hot water, sugar and natural oils to the weeds and is an alternative to the use of 'Glyphosate' based products. Note in 2019 only 10 to 15% of roads were treated.

The appointed contractor is managed by the Area Offices, who will agree with the contractor a programme for weed treatment and removal and the particular methods to be employed on individual roads and streets across the City and its suburbs.

In 2020 Dublin City Council had a budget of €317,000 including VAT available for the treatment of weeds using this contract. This budget did not make it possible to treat every road in Dublin City Council.

As this plan represents a departure from the methods previously employed by the Dublin City Council to control weeds, its implementation and effectiveness will be monitored on an ongoing basis and if necessary, consideration will be given to revising the plan as appropriate and in the interest of maintaining the City Council's road network to a high standard.

To ask the Director of Services what measures have been agreed for School Zones in 50km/h areas and how quickly they can be rolled out.

Reply

The NTA do not support the installation of School Zones in 50km/h zones as outlined in the Section 5 of the NTA School Zone Design Principles:

5. Where School Zones treatments should be applied?

School Zones are suitable on the following roads:

- Local roads and some link roads as defined by DMURS;
- Roads with one lane or less in each direction;
- Where illegal parking at school time is an issue;
- Where vehicular speeds of 30kph are desirable;
- Where actual vehicular speeds are already 30kph <u>or</u> where School Zone traffic management elements are likely to bring speeds down to 30kph.

DCC and the NTA are working together to determine what is the most appropriate interventions for schools in 50km/h zones. Assessments have been carried out on a number of schools in 50km/h zones and the intervention measures proposed vary depending on the unique characteristics at each location.

We are also identifying those schools which lie within the 30 kph zones as per the 30kph consultation in 2020 which unfortunately was not accepted by the elected members. These schools will be included in the next round of consultation for 30 kph speed limits.

To ask the Director of Services for an update on solutions to the area at Pimlico culde-sac which is blighted with constant illegal dumping and if the rubbish has been forensically inspected for identification of the culprits - if CCTV can be utilised at Pimlico to deter this?

Reply

A flier with useful information has been posted to all households in the cul-de-sac and those fronting on to Pimlico giving householders an opportunity to familiarise themselves with their obligations and responsibilities under Presentation and Segregation of household and Commercial Waste) Bye-Laws 2018.

The next phase of compliance programme for this area is to request information from each householder on how they dispose of their domestic waste. This will be completed in due course. Pimlico cul-de-sac is inspected on a daily basis by the Litter Warden who has reported that two to three bags of illegally dumped waste are removed on a regular basis. The Litter Warden has searched the bags for evidence in order to link the bag with a name and address and has not been successful to date so therefore no enforcement action could be taken. Information available to Dublin City Council would suggest illegally dumped waste is emanating from local households and is mostly pedestrian in nature.

CCTV is generally deployed in areas where vehicles are used in the commission of an offence. In this location, a privacy impact assessment indicated that CCTV would capture images of private residences thereby breaching GDPR.

To ask the Director of Services that the Quaker burial ground and the Weir Home for Nurses at Cork St be designated an Architectural Conservation Area.

Reply

The Quaker Burial Ground and the Weir Home for Nurses at Cork Street, Dublin 8 is designated a protected structure on Dublin City Council's Record of Protected Structures (RPS). The reference number is 2054 with an address at 104 Cork Street, Dublin 8, and the description reads 'Former James Weir Home'

The Architectural Heritage Protection Guidelines for Planning Authorities publication <u>https://www.buildingsofireland.ie/app/uploads/2019/10/Architectural-Heritage-</u> <u>Protection-Guidelines-for-Planning-Authorities-2011.pdf</u> explains the appropriate application of the designation of Protected Structures and Architectural Conservation Areas

A structure is defined by the Planning and Development, Act 2000 (as amended) as 'any building, structure, excavation, or other thing constructed or made on, in or under any land, or any part of a structure'. In relation to a protected structure or proposed protected structure, the meaning of the 'structure' is expanded to include: a) the interior of the structure; b) the land lying within the curtilage of the structure;

c) any other structures lying within that curtilage and their interiors, and

d) all fixtures and features which form part of the interior or exterior of the above structures.

Architectural Conservation Area legislation may be used to protect the following: a) groups of structures of distinctiveness or visual richness or historical importance; b) the setting and exterior appearance of structures that are of special interest, but the interiors of which do not merit protection;

c) the setting of a protected structure where this is more extensive than its curtilage; d) designed landscapes where these contain groups of structures as in, for example, urban parks, the former demesnes of country houses and groupings of archaeological or industrial remains;

e) groups of structures which form dispersed but unified entities but which are not within the attendant grounds of a single dominant protected structure.

The site is also included on the Record of Monuments and Places (RMP) DU 0018-020503. The description reads; A walled burial ground, square in plan and accessible centrally from Cork Street is situated on the N side of the street. The E portion of the graveyard is utilised as a car-park for the adjacent property, formerly known as the James Weir Home for Nurses. Within the burial ground are small clusters of recumbent memorials, mainly mid-19th century in date, set in a lawn. A single upright grave marker survives close to the vehicular entrance to the site. Mature trees bound the parking area at the E and there are others along the wall at W. In 1901 a plan was drawn in advance of the construction of the Home for Nurses (see attached) referring to the Burial Ground of the Religious Society of Friends, indicating the then location of 18 gravestones and whom they memorialise. According to published sources (Butler, 2004) the graveyard was in existence in the 1690's.

The designation of this structure the former James Weir Home and its curtilage site which including the Quaker Burial Ground as a protected structure and listed on the RMP offers the most comprehensive protection for this historically, architecturally and archaeologically significant site.

The Conservation Section of DCC have been engaging with the site owner in recent times. We had an offer of Built Heritage Investment Scheme funding in place in 2020 to carry out essential structural conservation works to the burial ground's historic boundary. However, timescales relating to procurement prevented the owners from availing of this grant funding and we intend to engage with the owners to pursue grant assisted conservation works in 2021 in line with the conservation plan for the site.
