Implementation of the Part VIII scheme (2008) by Bernard Seymour Landscape Architects and Shaffrey Architects and Saint Luke's Conservation Plan (2005) resulting in: New pocket park providing a new retaining boundary wall incorporating access ramp and steps.

Conservation of grave markers.





Virtual Heritage


