Part-funded by the Centenaries Capital Projects fund. Guided by an expert advisory group. Now managed by the Dublin City Council Culture Company.









Páirc Lúcáis Naofa (2016 – 2020) Implementation of the Part VIII scheme (2008) by Bernard Seymour Landscape Architects and Shaffrey Architects and Saint Luke's Conservation Plan (2005) resulting in: New pocket park providing a new retaining boundary wall incorporating access ramp and steps. Conservation of grave markers. Creation of Biodiversity-rich graveyard garden. Green Schools facilities for neighbouring St Brigid's. Part M access and Fire Safety routes to/from church (now Thomas Burgh House).










County Dublin Archaeology GIS

Heritage Plan project (2016 (review), 2018) working with the City Archaeologist and County Dublin Heritage Officers.










Virtual Heritage

Animated sequenced were developed using VR technology.


Gardening for Biodiversity is free. It has been distributed to over 1000 homes in Dublin in 2020 since lockdown.
